On January 2, 2013, the RCSC Board of Directors selected its slate of officers for the New Year.

James Brasher was chosen to lead as president for 2013. Brasher served a one-year appointment on the Board last year and won a three-year term in the most recent election. The Board chose Dan Hill to serve another year as vice president. Hill is in the third year of his first term on the Board of Directors.

Cord Angier also returns to the secretary role for another year. Angier is in the final year of his three-year term.

Finally, Larry Klein was picked to serve a second year as treasurer. Klein is in the final year of his first Board term, as well.

Jan Ek presents P.R.I.D.E.S. with check

On behalf of the RCSC Management Team, General Manager Jan Ek presented the P.R.I.D.E.S. with a check for \$7,252.53, reflecting 2012 fund-raising efforts and personal donations.

This year, RCSC's Management Team has selected Sun City Community Assistance Network as its fund-raising beneficiary. SC CAN acts on behalf of the community and surrounding area in matters affecting utility rates, taxes and legislation.

RCSC Chartered Club or Sun City Musical Group?

On December 5, 2012, the RCSC Board of Directors provided two options to the musical clubs who had expressed concerns about being able to continue if guests (non-RCSC Cardholders) were required to pay a \$2 guest fee. Their decision is to be provided, in writing, by February 1, 2013.

1) Become a Sun City Performing Arts Group instead of an RCSC Chartered Club. In lieu of rental fees for the use of the music room, each Sun City Performing Arts Group would be required to provide four musical performances free of charge.

2) Remain an RCSC Chartered Club which requires adherence to Board Policy 12, which includes a guest fee for all participating guests.

Why are these musical clubs so concerned about the \$2 per person, per day guest fee? How many of their participants are from outside of Sun City?

As you can see from the chart below, the Concert Band has 89 of its 144 total band members from outside of Sun City (62%), which would mean that more than half of their band would have to pay a \$2 guest fee in order to use the music room at the Fairway Recreation Center for practice. The approximate annual cost (based on a 36 week practice schedule) to any one of these musicians who reside outside of Sun City would be \$72 per year. The Sun City annual property assessment is \$1.24 per day, or \$450 per year as of February 1, 2013, whether the residents use RCSC facilities or not.

If the Concert Band requests donations at every "FREE" concert and cannot survive without them and charges for entry into the Sousa concert, where does all of their money go?

The RCSC Board of Directors has been informed that "all the monies collected by the band (Sousa Concert and others where donations are received) is given to the Sun City Concert Band Society." Through the AZ Corporation Commission we were able to confirm that the non-profit corporation, Sun City Concert Band Society, Inc., was formed on 11/25/09. Their charter is "to sponsor concert bands and ensembles in retirement communities in Arizona." According to the Commission's records, Charles Musgrave was one of the original incorporators. It has also been reported to RCSC that the Society has "between \$15,000 and \$20,000 in its accounts."

When Concert Band President, Ed White, was questioned about this at the December Board/Member Exchange meeting, he confirmed that the Society did exist but insisted that only the monies from the Sousa concert (the Concert Band Club's annual fund raiser) were given by the Concert Band Club to the Society and that the donations received at the "free" concerts were used to purchase new music. The fact is that if what Ed White reports is correct, the Concert Band Club is in violation of Board Policy as BP12A stated: "Cash contributions made by clubs to outside organizations shall not exceed the total donations made to RCSC."

If the Concert Band Club de-chartered would RCSC take or sell their assets?

Absolutely not! RCSC does not have any interest in the Concert Band's, or any other Club's, assets. There is protection written into Board Policy 12 ("BP12"), as was previous BP12A, so that no one can disseminate a de-chartered club's assets without others approval.

If those assets are abandoned without taking due process, then they

Updates

Financial

We have ended November 2012 well within our operating and capital budget year-to-date. All divisions have met their net operating budgets excluding golf and food service. Food service has met all their operating objectives, however, the expenses incurred in the remodel and equipment repair/replacement in the café at Lakeview Lanes has created a budget variance in that division. While the golf division has not met all their operating budget objectives this year, they have, in fact, operated \$44k better than last year, so overall the financial operation of the golf division has improved considerably.

Outside Collections

Payments made by property owners in outside collections were up in November and totaled \$7,446 with payments from 14 property owners. During the month our internal collector processed payments from past due property owners totaling \$38,402 and property related transfer fees totaling \$124,790. These have both increased slightly from the summer months.

Past Due Balances

Payments on past due balances in November were the same as last month, continuing to be down approximately 20% from the monthly averages over the past year. October billings went past due at an 8.9% rate, which is which is almost 20% more than average. The rate for September balances going over 60 days past due was down to 4.7%, and is right at the monthly average for the past year. As a result of the lower payment rates in November, past due balances increased almost 2% in the last month. At the end of November, outstanding balances related to property transfers remained unchanged and represent 55% of receivables due and 53% of past due balances.

Property Trustee Sales

Property trustee sale notices on Sun City properties went down to 97 at the end of November and the number of bank owned properties increased to 89 properties owned by lenders.

Preservation and Improvement Fee

The Preservation and Improvement Fees collected in November were \$510,000 and were 55% over budget. Year to date PIF fees are \$2,582,075 over budget. Remember that the PIF budget is extremely conservative to assure that there are sufficient funds available for

will revert to the RCSC. BP12 states: "When a club is de-chartered, equipment and supplies may be sold to other clubs, club members or outside sources with approval of the club's Executive Board, RCSC's Board of Directors and RCSC's Assistant General Manager. If the club cannot or does not wish to sell the equipment or supplies, it may donate them to similar chartered clubs with RCSC's Assistant General Manager's approval. The club may sponsor a final closing event for its members, after such, all assets will revert to the Recreation Centers of Sun City, Inc."

Can the Concert Band Club claim all performers who are non-RCSC Cardholders as Independent Contractors?

It is apparent in the language of BP12, that an independent contractor is someone that provides a service to a club and is paid for those services, not someone who participates in a club, and performs with a club.

BP12 states, "Clubs using independent contractors to provide club related services; i.e. dance callers, instructors, etc. shall define positions and duties in their club rules and regulations. All monies paid for services, including but not limited to instructors, callers and card club directors, must be paid and recorded by check or signed receipt. Clubs that hire independent contractors must comply with federal and state tax regulations and laws."

The RCSC Board of Directors would not

want the actions of one club to put any other clubs in jeopardy, therefore, would be likely forced to restrict the number of independent contractors that could be hired annually by a club.

Is RCSC charging the Concert Band \$1,500 for setup and rental fees even when the concerts are free?

The Players Club has paid setup and rental fees for years for all of their performances, why should the Concert Band be any different? The Concert Band rental and setup fees would actually be about \$765, not \$1,500. The Concert Band Club has made no request for a sanctioned event; however, there may be a conflict as their "free" concerts include solicitations for donations and a sanctioned event cannot produce any income for the club.

BP12 states: "An open club event is any event to be attended by the general public and not just RCSC cardholders and their guests. Clubs shall pay RCSC rental and setup fees for the facilities assigned for open club events unless the club's annual donation to RCSC is \$17,500 or greater per year or the event is sanctioned as an RCSC sponsored event. To request that RCSC sanction an event, the club must submit the request to the RCSC Board of Directors in writing (boardoffice@sunaz.com)."

Would the non-Sun City residents have to pay to perform in a concert?

No, so long as they are open club events

or if they became a Sun City Performing Arts Group. Since all concerts are open to the public, guest fees do not apply as per BP12, "Guest attendance registers (FORM BP:12-4) nor Host Punch Cards are required for open club events."

How is an RCSC Chartered Club to serve the Sun City community?

RCSC Chartered Clubs are for RCSC Cardholders to both join and participate in as stated in Board Policy 12 (BP12): "A chartered club must operate primarily to further the common good and general welfare of the people of the community." "Chartered club membership shall be open to all RCSC cardholders in good standing."

Why are there no "Special Clubs" anymore?

In previous Board Policy 12A regarding Chartered Clubs there was a provision for Special Clubs, which stated: "Any one of these clubs may require a non-RCSC cardholder performing club guest to complete a club's basic requirements."

The intent of this provision was never to create an avenue for non-Sun City residents and non-RCSC Cardholders to make up more than half of those participating in an RCSC Chartered Club and using RCSC facilities without compensation.

The RCSC Board of Directors has eliminated this section in BP12 so that all guests are treated the same.

Project Updates

Solar Projects

Installation of the Photo Voltaic (PV-Electricity producing) systems is planned to commence in January 2013. The first locations to receive the new carports and solar panels will be Marinette and Oakmont Centers. At the present time all building permits except Lakeview and Sundial centers have been received. We expect these two locations will receive their permits in the next few weeks.

The two Bell thermal solar projects and the Oakmont thermal project are going through the start-up phase and should be up and running by the end of 2012.

Lawn Bowl Greens

A 60-foot lawn bowl rolling machine was recently purchased from Woodbay Consulting Group. The new rolling machine will help flatten the greens and improve the bowling speed of the greens. A donation was given to the Recreation Centers of Sun City to cover the \$10,429 machine cost.

Holiday Celebration

On Friday December 14, 2012 the annual holiday event was held at the Lakeview Recreation Center. Although cool evening weather conditions reduced attendance somewhat, the event was a success with fun activities for everyone, good food and a terrific decorated boat parade. This year's holiday event donation was given to the Sun City P.R.I.D.E.S.

Mtn. View Center/Sun Bowl Ballpark

Installation of the Mountain View pool lighting system will begin as soon as the

building permit is obtained. The project includes induction type lighting around the swimming pool and two pole lights in the mini golf area. Contractor is Accel Electric. (Cost – \$40,000)

As soon as the construction permit is obtained, induction type pole lights will be installed at the Mt View pickleball courts. Contractor is ATS Electrical. (Cost – \$23,422)

South Maintenance

The building drawings for the new South Golf Maintenance building are completed. To date the RCSC is responding to the 3rd round of comments from Maricopa County Planning and Development Department as we secure a building permit for this project. Project plans and other construction information is being distributed to contractors for bidding purposes. Once the bids are received the project will be sent to the RCSC bid commission for final approval. Contractors to date include Bunger Steel, Inc and CCBG Architectural.

Lakeview Center

The Lakeview lawn bowl greens lighting project will commence as soon as the light deflectors are received from the lighting vendor. The new light fixtures will supply additional light while keeping energy costs down. Contractor is Wilson Electric. (Cost – \$55,880)

Bell Center

The Bell Wood & Metal shop expansion project is rolling along with building plans completed, the building permit secured and the project approved by the RCSC bid

commission. This project was awarded to Ken McIntyre Construction. Project is scheduled to commence January 2013. (Cost – \$435,561)

Exterior painting of Bell Center is well underway. Contractor is Quality Painting. (Cost – \$86,971)

Sundial Center / Riverview Pro Shop

Two replacement signs for the Riverview golf course are nearing installation. One will be placed on the pro shop building and the other by the #10 tee box. Unfor-

tunately, this project has been delayed due to some health problems with the contractor. Contractor is Apollo Signs. (Cost – \$13,898)

Six new ceiling fans were installed in the Sundial men's club room. Contractor was Kuhl's Electric. (Cost – \$3,500)

Skilled Trades Department

The RCSC skilled Trades department completed 160 work orders during November and December 2012.

budgeted PIF projects which are required to be greater than \$300,000 with a life expectancy of 15 years or greater.

During November the installation of Wi-Fi services at the remaining RCSC locations were completed, with the exception of the Bell Center. Some additional wiring is needed at this location for services to be fully functional there. This is expected to be operational in the next several weeks.

Information Technology

The RCSC IT team also recently completed the replacement of the telephone system at the Lakeview campus. The new system implementation was completed without downtime and provides improved functionality and integrates Lakeview Center and Lakeview Lanes. During the installation courtesy phones were installed in each office for cardholders to use as needed.

Human Resources

The past few weeks HR has been involved in coordinating the implementation of RCSC's new employee benefits program effective January 1, 2013. We have coordinated the enrollment process which includes; assisting in creating a benefits booklet and announcements, benefits and enrollment meetings and processing the enrollment forms to assure that all eligible employees are enrolled and receive their I.D. cards prior to the effective date.

During the past month, we have seen an increase in the number of individuals seeking employment and have dedicated time to processing job applications utilizing Great Plains software for applicant tracking. The system works efficiently. We have a large number of applicants in our active files. Since turnover numbers have been low, our applicant files are full. We use these files in filling open positions when they occur and as a result, found it unnecessary to advertise this year.

They help seniors who qualify obtain a freeze on property taxes; do benefit checks to help get residents benefits through various state and federal programs.

One of their biggest benefits is, with the help of AARP, preparation of tax returns (free) for any resident. Any resident in need of any kind of financial assistance can go to SC CAN and receive a free evaluation and resources.

Golf Report

Pro Shops

Final financial information was not available as of the writing of this report; also green fee revenue reflects income of \$3,600 from the Beat the Pro's event that will be adjusted on December financials. Total revenue for November was 1% ahead of budget, not including revenue from the Beat the Pros.

Racing Ducks sales are now complete. Pro shops managed to sell 1,560 through Friday, December 7. Lakes West, once again, led sales with 1,040 ducks sold.

The "Beat the Pros" event surpassed its fundraising goal of \$2,000, with over \$2,400 raised for the Sun City PRIDES. The event was well attended and lived up to its name, with 82% of the field "Beating the Pros." With the success of this year's event a sequel to this event will be planned.



We have begun to see a greater number of no shows and double bookings on our tee sheets. We ask for your cooperation in ensuring that: times that you cannot make are cancelled, and that people that may be booking on your behalf are aware of your intention to play or not to play.

Failure to do so is considered a Category II offense and is subject to fines.

Golf Courses

Golf courses have begun applying an herbicide, to control winter weeds in non-overseeded areas. The primary weed we are trying to control is Poa Annua. Weeds that are sprayed will turn brown and die.

Following the application of herbicide, courses will begin fertilizing fairways. Golfers can expect to see spray equipment on the courses over the next couple months. The sprayers leave drops of foam behind, to indicate areas that have received an application.

Following the advice of our USGA consultant, brushes have been attached to our green mowers. The warmer weather we experienced through the beginning of December has allowed our greens to mature faster than usual. Brushing will be used on an as needed basis during the cooler months and will become an almost daily practice during the warmer months. The advantages to brushing are:

- Grain reduction.
- Raising stolons and shoots, which produce a better cut.
- A less injurious technique than vertical mowing or grooming, and therefore can be used more frequently and during periods when growth is not aggressively active.
- A method for *Poa annua* seedhead reduction.

Snack Shops

Sales in the snack shops exceeded budgeted revenue by \$5,900. We once again thank everyone for the support the snack shops have received this year.

Frequently Asked Questions - RCSC Corporate Documents

What are the Articles of Incorporation?

The RCSC Restated Articles of Incorporation (“Articles”) define the general nature of business in which the corporation is engaged and certain powers of the corporation and its Board of Directors and Members.

How are the RCSC Articles of Incorporation changed?

An amendment to the Restated Articles of Incorporation may be proposed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by petition signed by at least ten percent (10%) of the total membership of the Corporation as of the first day of the preceding July. The proposed amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the Members at a regular or special meeting called pursuant to the provision of the Bylaws. Contrary to the RCSC Articles, however, the proposed amendment cannot be adopted or rejected by a majority vote of the Members, present or represented by proxy, because Arizona Revised Statutes Title 10 requires a two-thirds vote of the Members.

What are the Corporate Bylaws?

Corporate Bylaws are formally adopted governing regulations for the administration and management of RCSC. Bylaws address such topics as:

- Requirements for membership
- Requirements for membership meetings
- Voting rights of Members
- Procedures for electing the Board of Directors
- Procedures for the Board of Directors to elect officers
- General powers and duties of the Board

How are the RCSC Corporate Bylaws changed?

The Board of Directors is given the power to amend the Corporate Bylaws in the Restated Articles of Incorporation. Members have two methods by which they can amend the Corporate Bylaws:

- 1) Members may present a timely notice (at least 10 days prior to a Board meeting) to the Board of Directors a proposed Bylaw amendment. At the Board meeting, a majority of the Board of Directors could vote in favor or against the Member’s Bylaw amendment.
- 2) A Member could petition for a special membership meeting to have the Members consider the proposed Bylaw amendment. Special meetings of the Members may be called by the Board of Directors, President of the Corporation or by petition of the Members having at least one-tenth (1/10) of the votes entitled to be cast according to the Corporation’s records as of the preceding July 1. The reason for the meeting shall be stated in such call and petition. After receiving the petition and validating the signatures thereon, the President shall set a date for such meeting, which shall be held within sixty (60) days after validation of the signatures is completed.

With respect to a special meeting called by petition of the Members for the purpose of amending the Restated Articles of Incorporation or the Corporate Bylaws, the Board, after validation of the petition, shall set a special meeting. A written notice shall be posted in RCSC facilities and/or published in the RCSC newsletter

(SunViews) and/or on the RCSC website (www.sunaz.com) not less than ten (10) days, nor more than fifty (50) days before the date of the meeting.

What are the Board Policies?

Board Policy Resolutions enact rules and regulations or formalize other types of Board decisions. RCSC has two basic types of Board Policy resolutions:

- 1) Policy: These are resolutions that affect RCSC Members, Cardholders and Sun City property owner’s rights and obligations. (For example – rules for the use of the recreational facilities, golf courses, and Chartered clubs.)
- 2) Administrative: These are resolutions that address the internal operations of the corporation. (For example – bid procedures, collection procedures, financial management.)

How are Board Policies changed?

The Board of Directors have authority to establish, change, and/or delete Board Policies, Cardholders and Guest Code of Conduct, and any Rules and Regulations of the Corporation as deemed necessary and within the authority as outlined in RCSC Restated Articles of Incorporation and Corporate Bylaws. (Corporate Bylaws, Article IV, Section 7)

Such matters, being solely within the powers delegated to the Board in accordance with the Corporate Bylaws, Members may recommend an amendment to Board Policy at a membership meeting, the disposition of which may be announced at the next regular Membership meeting. If the disposition of the amendment is determined by the Board not to be in the best interest of the Corporation, the Board shall announce its decision and such proposal or matter shall not be considered further. The Members may, by petition signed by at least ten percent (10%) of the total membership of the Corporation as of the first day of the preceding July, bring the proposal or matter before the Membership for a majority vote of the Members present or represented by proxy at a duly called and noticed Regular or Special Membership meeting.

How do Federal, State, and Local Laws affect RCSC corporate documents?

Obviously federal, state and local laws supersede any of RCSC corporate documents which is evidenced in how the RCSC Articles of Incorporation are changed as the documents are not consistent with State law. To that end, RCSC is regulated by Arizona Revised Statutes Title 10 as a private, non-profit corporation.

Why isn’t RCSC regulated by Title 33 for planned community associations?

RCSC does not qualify under Title 33 as a planned community association, because not every property owner in Sun City is required or can qualify to be a member of the Recreation Centers of Sun City. A planned community association is a common interest organization to which all the owners of lots in a planned community must belong. The four defining characteristics of a planned community association are: 1) all owners are automatically members; 2) governing documents create mutual obligations; 3) mandatory fees or assessments are generally levied against owners and used for the operation of the association; and 4) owners share a property interest in the community.

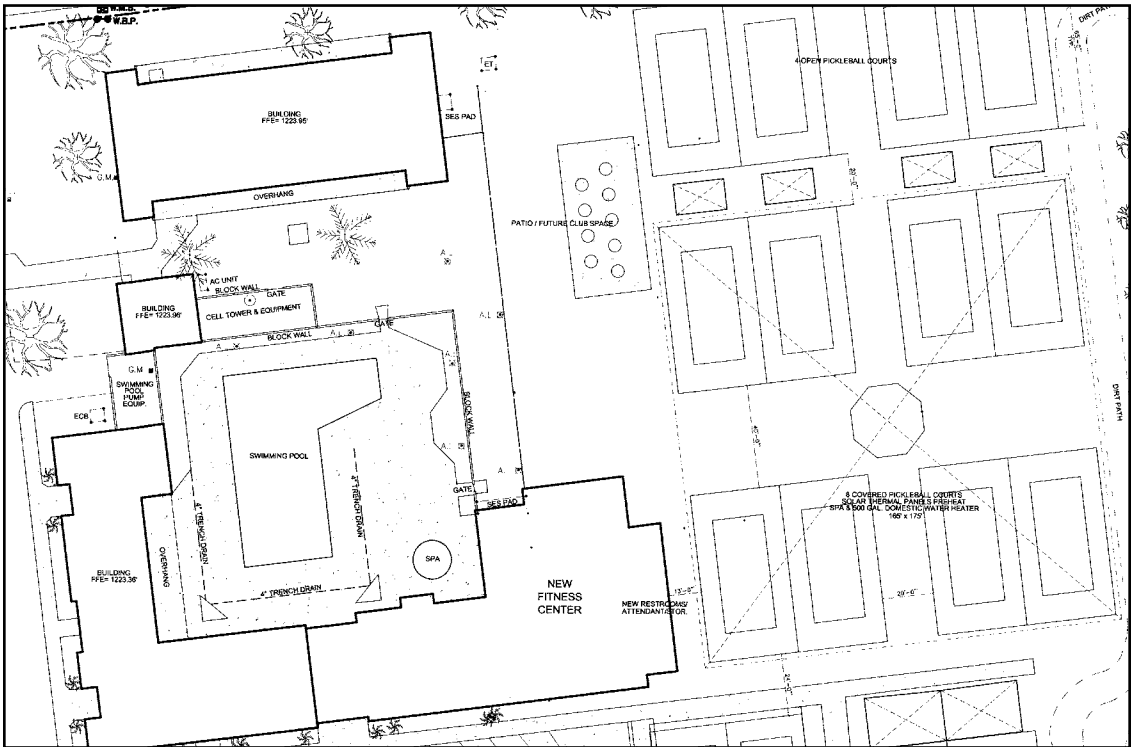

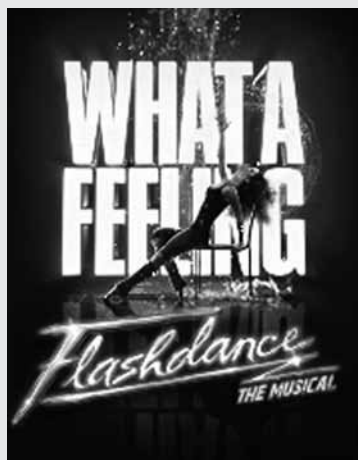

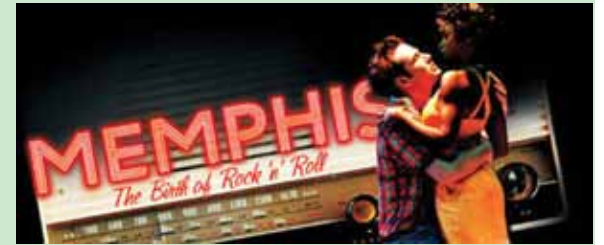
