RCSC Director Bill Pearson Named "Sun City Citizen of the Year"

Bill Pearson is a man that believes in Sun City. When his parents arrived in Sun City in the mid-1990s, he decided "in about 17 minutes" that this was where he would be coming for his retirement as well.

Pearson's commitment to the community has been ongoing since the day he arrived. Believing that Sun City is the "sum total of its parts," he started out at the Sun City Visitors Center. From there he's gone on to volunteer at the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum, served on the board of the Sun City Homeowners Association, and currently devotes a majority of his time as a Director for the Recreation Centers of Sun City and President of the Sun City Foundation. He was also a member of Sun City's 50th Anniversary Committee back in 2010-11.

So it's no small wonder that the Surprise Regional Chamber of Commerce named him "Sun City Citizen of the Year" this past February, acknowledging the countless hours he has given back to the community. "While the recognition is nice, I don't really need the accolades," Pearson stated. "It's not only me. There are thousands of people here who know you have to give back to the community, and that's exactly why this place works. Give back as much as you want or as little as you can and we accomplish great things."

Pearson speaks with much compassion when talking about Sun City, including its history. With his in-depth knowledge of how we got to where we are today, he writes extensively and has authored many articles and publications regarding the place he now calls home including the first Best of Sun City AZ yearbook.

In his spare time, Bill is a staunch lawn bowler and an avid reader. He and his wife, Lori, relocated to Arizona from St. Paul, MN.

North Golf Course Renovation Project Architect's Report

One of the challenges the RCSC Board(s) has given us was to try and establish a unique bunker style on each golf course to help distinguish them from each other. The bunkers at South are different than Willowcreek and Lakes West and the bunkers at North will be different than all three of these. At North, the bunker style will have a steeper sand face on the greenside bunkers as well as the sides of the fairway bunkers (keeping the line of play out of the fairway bunkers softer). All of the bunkers will still have easy access in and out of the bunkers for the golfers.

To date, the bunkers have only been shaped, but you can start to see the form of the bunkers if you really look close. We are excited about the shape the bunkers at North have started to take and look forward to the upcoming detailed construction. We are very involved in bunker construction painting every new sand line on the golf course, paying close attention to site lines, playability and maintainability. After we establish the new sand lines the golf course contractor will have a specialized crew build the bunkers.

In my opinion, we have one of the best bunker guys in the business to lead the bunker crew and he will be very important in the success of the bunkers at North. After we have painted the proposed bunker edge the crew will begin to cut the edge and core the bunker. We are constantly monitoring this making any small changes we need to maintain the vision of the bunkers for North. After the establishment of the bunker edge and preparation of the bunker core the contractor will begin to install the bunker drainage. The discharge line has been stubbed into the bunker and the contractor will tie the new bunker drainage into this point. Once the drainage is complete the contractor will line the bunker and then install the new bunker sand. The contractor will typically keep the sand about six to ten inches from the edge of the bunker during the grow-in so any contamination that may come into the bunker during grow-in can be easily removed from the bunker and keep the balance of the bunker sand clean. Once the grow-in is complete the sand will be placed and the maintenance staff will begin to get the bunkers ready for play.

When the golfers return they will definitely see something different from what existed previously and the new bunkers will now define the style and strategy of the North Golf Course.





From its early beginnings it has been recognized Sun City AZ has residents who live here year-round and many others who prefer to maintain residency in other states and spend only several months in Arizona each year.

Our active senior adult community allows for all cardholders to enjoy our

wonderful amenities on an equal basis. Sun City's clubs, including sports groups, adapt to the ebb and flow of the attendance of those interested and returning residents are easily integrated into their regular activities. During the winter months the increased (seasonal) population of Sun City is readily apparent by increased traffic on our streets and the increased demand on our recreation centers, golf courses, lawn bowl facilities, and other aspects of the communities.

Most organizations in Sun City, including the RCSC, welcome the increased population by planning many more activities during the prime fall through spring seasons. RCSC provides a number of special events during these times when the maximum number of residents are here to enjoy them. These events include the free Sun Bowl concerts, weekly Sundial shows, events such as our annual meeting, Del Webb Days, fun fairs, weekly farmers markets, special club events, golf mixers and tournaments, and many other activities. There must be more opportunities for all from October through March than there are during the other six months of the year.

The business of Sun City's RCSC Board of Directors and Management Team, however, is a 12-month affair. It is necessary to manage all aspects of our community including over 300 employees, seven recreation centers, eight golf courses, two bowling facilities, multiple snack bars, the Viewpoint Lake facilities, cardholder services, the clubs' office, etc. must go on for 12 months. Attention must be given to maintenance and improvement of our facilities for the long-term benefit of our residents.

Updates

Financial Report:

So a new year has started and we have ended our first month of 2014 well within our operating and capital budget.

Golf is certainly not having a repeat performance of 2013 as it ended January with a positive variance in gross revenues of \$68,938. It is obvious that nice warm weather makes a difference! Matter of fact, golf's positive variance in its net operating excess is impressive and if this trend continues, we may see one of the best years ever in the golf division!

We had a few individual expenses that hit earlier than budgeted, but will not produce a negative variance from budget in the end. The Board and Management team are always looking for ways to do it better, different, more efficient and more economical. Sometimes we try things that work really well right out the gate and other times we have to continue to work on a better solution. The continuity in the management team has brought great long-term solutions that continue to produce positive effects for Sun City and its homeowners. It is not unusual for me to be contacted by other communities who ask how we are doing it. How are we continuing to improve our facilities and amenities and barely raise our annual property assessments and remain debt free? They say it makes no sense. It makes perfect sense to Sun City AZ: we pay cash for everything, we never stop looking for ways to do it better and more cost effective; we have the Preservation & Improvement Fund which provides us the capital needed to make major improvements; and we provide our staff with reasonable pay, good benefits and fair treatment, which provides Sun City with continuity and lack of turnover. A winning combination that other communities are wanting to copy!

Bowling Centers:

Installation has been completed on the two tier racks for spare bowling balls at both bowling centers. The new racks will accommodate twelve spare bowling balls and the table tops will provide an area for bowlers to place towels, accessories etc.

The bowling department has begun to expand its "Learn to Bowl" lesson program. Previously classes were held twice each year. Recently, changes were made to the program where classes are offered to beginning bowlers and intermediate bowlers separately. Both classes will be held three times during the fall/winter bowling season. In addition to the classes, individual lessons are offered for only \$10 per person for all RCSC cardholders (including lineage). All of the bowling lessons and classes are headed by the Bowling League Coordinator, Di Tormanen. Di has over twenty five years coaching experience and is a certified USBC Bronze Level coach.

Cardholder Services:

The payments on past due assessments increased considerably in January; above the monthly averages for the past year by 21%. December billings went past due at an increased rate of 8.9% which is well above the average for the past 12 months. November balances returned to average 60 day past due rate after the seasonal increase in October for these balances. Total accounts receivables started the year off well by decreasing by 3.5%. This was the first decrease since September and the largest decrease in a year. Outstanding balances related to property transfers decreased by 2.6% in January and now represent 57% of all receivables due and 56% of past due balances.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties increased slightly to 48 for the end of January and the number of properties owned by lending institutions decreased by 10% to 61 this month.

Resale transactions were strong in January resulting in Preservation and Improvement Fees being collected in January totaling \$565,100, which is \$313,100 more than budget. Remember that we intentionally budget PIF fees conservatively to assure that sufficient cash is on hand when PIF projects are scheduled so we

can pay as we go and remain debt free.

Human Resources:

The IRS codes have allowed flexible benefit plans to be designed in a manner that saves the employee and the employer tax dollars. In order to comply with all the regulations set by the Internal Revenue Service, the plan must be tested to help eliminate any top heaviness similar to a Pension Plan. A final testing of RCSC's Flexible Benefit Plan in February shows the plan has passed all 3 tests to conform to Sections 125 and 129 of the IRS code for the 2013 plan year. RCSC's plan has consistently passed all tests.

Project Updates

General Centers Projects/Information

Card Access equipment is currently on order for all club room doors and the East entrance door for Fairway Center. Once the equipment arrives I will schedule meetings with the dedicated clubs at Fairway to discuss the new systems and their room access needs and concerns. The East entry door will also be addressed at that time and cardholders wishing to use that entrance will be notified about how to obtain their access clearance. Contractor is Multi Card. (Phase 1 Cost – \$ 52,000)

Mt. View Center

Grading of the new (7) court pickleball site is completed and trenching is underway to install underground plumbing, electrical and drainage lines. The fence posts within the courts are being installed and light pole bases are being poured. Forming of the courts will occur in the next couple of weeks. All seven courts will be constructed using post tension concrete. Please note that after the post tensioned concrete is poured, there is a 28 day waiting period for the concrete to cure before the final colored top coatings can be applied. The two tennis courts at Mt. View will remain open for tennis play, and pickleball players are asked to use the Marinette Center courts during construction. Contractor is Sunland Sports and CCBG Architectural. (Cost – \$243,681)



Oakmont Center

The Oakmont pool, spa and equipment room project began January 27, 2014 and is progressing nicely with demolition work and new pool plumbing work completed. The rough-in underground plumbing and drainage piping for the equipment building is now completed. During this work it was discovered that the North canopy wall of the pool area has internal damage and some construction concerns. In addition, the fire system piping which runs through this area is a concern to the fire department and the work required to replace the (8) supporting posts and footings is extensive. Due to these conditions the RCSC has decided to remove this North canopy wall and install a block and steel wall in its place.

Lastly, on Thursday February 13, 2014, I attended a Maricopa County Environmental Services variance hearing in order to obtain permission to install exercise

rails inside the pool. While I was unable to convince the committee to approve the railing inside the one swim lane I did get approval for all rails inside the general use area of the new pool. Contractors to date include CCBG Architectural, K.L. McIntyre Construction and Aquatic Builders. (Cost – \$529,416)



Lakeview Center

Construction of the upper and lower ramps for the east (red) entrance at Lakeview Center continues. Presently the footings and walls for the lower ramp and walkway to the lift are completed. Work is now focused on getting the actual ramps prepared for concrete. The new ramps will have a much more gradual slope, making it easier for cardholders and guests to access the facility. Contractor is Ken McIntyre Construction. (Cost – \$120,975)



Quail Run Golf Course

Replacement of the leach field for the Quail Run golf course septic system is underway. The repairs to this system will not affect play on the course. Contractor is A-American. (Approximate Cost – \$6,000)

Bell Center

Planning and architectural work is now completed for the Bell Tennis project. Architectural drawings will be submitted to Maricopa County Planning and Development in about 2 weeks. The Bell tennis project includes demolition of the current (8) tennis courts and pushing out some of the existing block walls in preparation for (10) new tennis courts. The new complex will also include a shaded gathering area, courtside canopies with benches, water and electric to each court, tables and benches for spectators and planters in the common areas. Contractor to date is Lloyd Sports Engineering.

The replacement of (7) monument signs and installation of (2) additional monument signs is underway. The signs are positioned around the center in front of each activity area. Each sign has a rock base and attractive lighted display. Contractor is Tag Team Signs. (Cost - \$39,710)



Marinette Center

The Marinette expansion project plans have been returned to the RCSC from Maricopa County Planning and Development with their required changes and corrections. The RCSC has made the necessary County corrections and has added a few additional changes to the drawings. Re-submittal of the plans to Maricopa County Planning and Development will occur the week of March 3, 2014. Contractor to date is CCBG Architectural.

Skilled Trades Department

The RCSC Skilled Trades department completed 140 work orders during the last half of January 2014 and the first half of February 2014. This total does not include other routine and specialized work completed outside of the work order system.

Water: It Pays to Keep it Clean

Due to an unseasonably dry winter, Williams, Arizona is currently experiencing strict water regulations because the multiple reservoirs they use for city water are critically low. Three of the town's five reservoirs are empty or simply too dirty to treat at their low levels.

Close examination of the fact that the water we have now is the only water we will ever have is the first step in water conservation. The problem lies not in the amount of potable water on our planet, but rather our ability to clean it fast enough to keep up with human consumption.

Water takes in all sorts of materials as it moves along in its hydrological cycle. The large space between atoms allows water to absorb or dissolve practically anything. Therein lies the problem: we must reuse what we have. We need to remember that every time we use water, it absorbs contaminants and

that nature can no longer keep up with removing pollutants. Try to picture, with our planet's multitude of people, the inconceivable amount of chemicals and pollutants that water is exposed to in just one day. When it rains, even air pollution turns into water pollution. Once ground water becomes contaminated, it can take years, even decades, for it to clean naturally.

So instead of thinking of water conservation solely as being the frequency in which we water our lawns or how long we leave a faucet or toilet run uncontrolled in our bathroom, perhaps we need also to consider what chemicals we use, how we dispose of them and what we can do to prevent some forms of water pollution. Phosphates in soaps, shampoos and cleaners cause eutrophication, a form of water pollution that deoxygenates lakes and streams. So when you wash your car, where does that soapy water in your driveway go? Down our storm drains, right? And where does the storm drain empty? Into our lakes and rivers – untreated!

It only takes one liter of oil to pollute 250,000 liters of water. Used cooking oil poured down a kitchen drain causes problems by accumulating in sewer pipes and creating clogs that eventually cause wastewater back-ups, which in turn, overflow into storm drains. And where does that oil leak that dripped on your driveway go when it rains...?

Here are some simple tips for minimizing water pollution:

- Inspect and maintain vehicles regularly. Use kitty litter to clean up oil and antifreeze leaks in your driveway. Never hose these chemicals into the gutter.
- Run dishwashers and washing machines only with full loads. This not only conserves water, but reduces the amount of detergents entering sewer systems.
- Use minimal detergents when washing your vehicle and wash them on the lawn or gravel. Better yet, go to a carwash where water is treated and recycled.
- Apply pesticides and fertilizers sparingly and never when rain is in the forecast. Try to buy products that are environmentally safe.
- Take all unused chemicals, paints, pesticides etc., to a recycling center.

Pollutants have harmful effects on drinking water supplies, wildlife and recreation. If everyone practiced these small steps in water pollution prevention, how much clean water could we save for tomorrow?

Nearly 200 golfers came out to see the lastest in clubs, golf bags and more recently at Riverview Golf Course.

Manufacturers represented included Wilson, Mizuno, King Par, Cleveland and Orlimar.

Total sales for the day totaled \$2,707. Each vendor had success in selling, including 2 sets of irons, 2 drivers, 4 individual clubs and a golf bag.






