Foundation takes first step in new direction

The Sun City Foundation has been a wonderful asset to Sun City residents for the past 27 years. We have been assisting those who have outlived their finances by paying assessment fees and helping them to continue to be able to use RCSC facilities.

On Saturday, June 8, the Foundation will begin a whole new chapter in its existence and purpose. Board members have been looking at additional ways to make an impact on the community. The first leg in that journey will be a joint venture with two other organizations that function within the walls of Sun City: Banner Olive Branch Senior Center and Operation American Patriot.

The Foundation is hosting the Helping America See program at the Sundial Auditorium. The doors open at 7:30 a.m. and we will be tackling what is being called the "Blue Light Epidemic." It is especially germane to Sun City residents, given the extraordinary number of eye problems that already exist.

In this case though, it goes well beyond just the usual cataract and glaucoma issues we routinely find. Doctors have now identified a new strain to our eyes coming from all of the latest technical advances we have made. Flat panel TVs, computer screens, many of the mobile phones, the tablets, several of the light bulbs now available - all create a cumulative lifetime exposure to blue wavelength light. Add in the amount of time those of us living in Sun City spend outside looking into those sun's rays and one quickly comes to understand why this program is so important.

All of the above factors are producing a frightening increase in the number of Macular Degeneration cases eye doctors are seeing across the country. So much so that these same doctors are moving to education as a way to combat the growing numbers of those losing their sight to this insidious disease.

On hand for this program will be several of the preeminent specialists in the field of macular degeneration. The four hour session will be filled with an amazing amount of information, testing will be available on a first-come first-served basis and several products will be available to help you minimize the chances of contracting macular degeneration.

While the Sun City Foundation is the host, the event is being put on by Banner Olive Branch Senior Center located at the corner of Sun City Boulevard and 107th Avenue. On site as well is the newly created Operation American Patriot. This remarkable organization was formed to assist veterans who are struggling. In their first year and half, they have come to the aide of more

than 5,000 veterans from virtually all eras. A portion of the sales from this program will be shared by both organizations.

This is an event you will not want to miss if you are having eye problems, are an athlete that spends time outdoors or are a frequent user of all of the latest technological gizmos that make

our life easier. Virtually every one of these things increases the potential for macular degeneration.

The Sun City Foundation has in its charter language regarding the education and enhancing the quality of life for Sun City residents. Clearly this program fits perfectly, and as the Foundation begins to grow in fulfilling its role in the community, we look forward to more programs of this nature and caliber.

Please join us on Saturday, June 8 at the Sundial Auditorium. The doors will open at 7:30 a.m. with refreshments and the program will run from 8:30 a.m. until noon. On-site testing will be available throughout the morning and doctors will be present to answer your questions and concerns.

Updates

Presented on April 25 at the RCSC Board of Directors Meeting

Financial Report:

While we have operated overall within our budget year-to-date, we have finished the first quarter with one division not meeting budget year-to-date. The golf division, suffering from \$149,347 less than budgeted income y-t-d, which compares to \$124,775 less income than last year for the same period, has ended the first quarter with a bottom line before depreciation of \$134,008 negative variance from budget. While the food service division experienced \$11,276 less than budgeted income y-t-d, they have been able to manage their expenses accordingly and have ended the quarter with an overall positive variance from budget of \$2,581. The opportunity to cut golf operating expenses in response to less income is very small, as whether or not there are 10 golfers or 200 golfers playing golf today, the cost to operate the pro shop and golf course remain fairly consistent. With that being said, the entire \$149,347 deficit in income was not brought to the bottom line in golf which means that management made adjustments to operating expenses wherever possible, reducing the net effect to the bottom line by \$15,339.

Bowling Centers:

Contracts have been signed to upgrade both RCSC bowling center’s back office software at a cost of \$23k. The software upgrade is necessary in order for the bowling centers to be Payment Card Industry (PCI) compliant when accepting credit cards and debit cards for payment. PCI compliance is necessary to ensure that all data transmitted and stored is secure. The upgrade will be performed late in May or early June by the Brunswick Corporation.

Bowling pins usually have a life of sixteen to eighteen months; the bowling pins currently in use at both centers have nearly reached the end of their life and are scheduled to be replaced in late July.

Cardholder Services:

Payments made by property owners in outside collections totaled just \$2,686 in March with payments received from 8 property owners. While the collections payments were lower in March due to the boarding and notifications process, the payments in the pipeline have picked up.

The payments on past due assessments improved slightly in March but were still 13% below the monthly average for the past year. February billings went past due at a rate of 5.7% which is the lowest

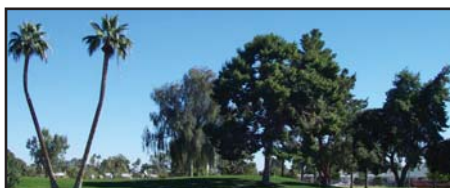
A Moment with President Brasher - Sun City's Unique Golf

What is now known as North Golf Course opened as Sun City's first 18-hole course in August 1960. Although nine holes of the course had been open since earlier that year, the full 18-hole course opening was a significant event. During our history of over 50 years and the opening of more courses to our present eight, the first one was a highly important event. Throughout this time, golf as a Sun City trademark has withstood the test of time and is a tribute to the forward-thinking of our community's builders and early residents.

Sun City is unique for a number of reasons, not the least of which is our dedication to maintaining our signature presence as a golf destination for active senior adults. The history of golf in Sun City has been stormy at times and it is a tribute to our residents that great traditions live on in our community. An early tradition of Wednesday for ladies in the morning and men in the afternoon has become the current Tuesday Ladies Day and Wednesday Men's Day.

Sun City Men's and Women's Golf Organizations date back to the early 1960s. Pro shops and snack bars were

built by Del Webb at each course. During those early years more Sun City golf courses were built until a memorable event occurred on May 31, 1977, when apparently "for \$10 and a cup of coffee....the Rec Centers now owned seven golf courses covering 968 acres, a water district with accompanying wells - worth well over \$12 million," thanks to the generosity of the Del Webb Corporation



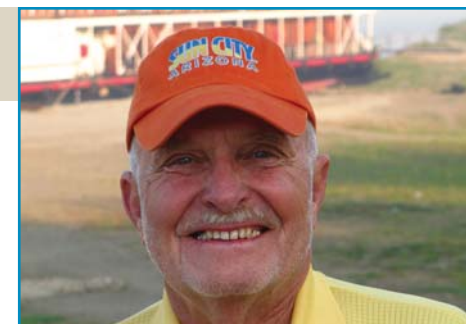
(as quoted from "Jubilee," the 25th Anniversary of Sun City, Arizona). Quail Run Golf Course was built one year later and deeded to Sun City, bringing the total number of golf courses to eight.

The history of golf in Sun City has evolved over the years to include a number of unique practices; the origin of some are not clear but all are well accepted. For example, the group of five golfers (fivesomes) became customary here to ensure that all golfers would

be accommodated in a day's play. The custom of "split-sheet" has become standard practice in golf play scheduling allowing two groups to start at the same time, one on the front half; the other on the back half. The origin of this practice is less clear but still common. Currently, some courses are also reserved for conventional scheduling with all golfers beginning play on the first tee. The tradition of playing in individually created "groups" one or more days of the week (in addition to Tuesdays and Wednesdays) has apparently become a valued tradition for many Sun City golfers. All of these practices continue today.

Outside (non-resident) play has been a factor in Sun City golf since at least 1961. It continues to be an essential role to help defray expenses for our residents.

Annually, we contract with the USDA for one of their agronomists to visit and evaluate the condition of our courses - tees, fairways, bunkers and greens. We value this evaluation and the comments it generates. We remain confident that Sun City's Golf Division is doing its best to maintain our courses to the highest of standards.

First Quarter 2013 Investment Report

On February 12, 2013 the Investment Commission interviewed five investment brokers/firms, including the current investment firm, UBS, where RCSC funds had been maintained for the past few years. Upon completion of the interview and review process, the Investment Commission chose local Sun City broker, JR Rotchford of JR Rotchford & Associates, and selected the investment firm, Franklin Templeton Investments, to receive the funds currently held at UBS.

At the end of the first quarter, the Franklin Templeton Investments unrestricted money market account had an ending balance of \$10,213,785.44. This account has earned a total of \$193.62 in interest year-to-date.

The restricted Franklin Templeton Investments money market account for the Preservation and Improvement Fund had an ending balance of \$10,677,410.41, with a total of \$237.92 interest earned year-to-date.

The restricted Franklin Templeton Investments money market account for the Capital Reserve Fund had a balance of \$1,000,041.44, with a total of \$10.80 interest earned year-to-date.

On March 28, 2013 the Investment Commission met with RCSC's broker, JR Rotchford, regarding a proposal for investing RCSC's \$2.5M unrestricted cash reserves and \$1M restricted capital reserve with Franklin Templeton Investments, as both of these funds can be invested without concern for withdrawal for a period of 18 months or longer, which is required to avoid penalties. RCSC's Investment Policy (Board Policy 33) is stringent in its requirements with the priority of investment objectives to be placed in this order: 1) safety, 2) liquidity, and 3) yield. The Investment Commission unanimously approved the investment proposal and investments were made accordingly as follows:

On April 1, 2013 the \$2.5M unrestricted cash reserve was invested as follows:

\$700k into Franklin Adjustable U.S. Gov't Securities Fund Class A
\$550k into Franklin Ltd Maturity U.S. Gov't Securities Fund Class A
\$550k into Franklin Low Duration Total Return Fund Class A
\$700k into Franklin U.S. Government Securities Series Class A

On April 1, 2013 the \$1M restricted capital reserve was invested as follows:

\$280k into Franklin Adjustable U.S. Gov't Securities Fund Class A
\$220k into Franklin Ltd Maturity U.S. Gov't Securities Fund Class A
\$220k into Franklin Low Duration Total Return Fund Class A
\$280k into Franklin U.S. Government Securities Series Class A

The Investment Commission requested options available for shorter term investment requirements (less than 18 months) that would meet the Investment Policy criteria with safety and liquidity and still allow for a better yield than a money market account. The Commission will meet with RCSC's broker in the near future to discuss the options.

Restrictions for FDIC Standard Maximum Deposit Insurance Amount has been changed back to \$250k per depositor per insured financial institution, which makes money management in banks much more restrictive than it has been in recent time. The Investment Commission will consider such options as Repurchase Agreements which sweeps funds nightly from bank accounts to assure no accounts are in excess of the \$250k insured limit and invests the overages in low yielding, high security Federal funds that have immediate liquidity.

Project Updates

General Centers Projects/Information

• Installation of the Photo Voltaic (PV-Electricity producing) systems is well underway. All RCSC Center locations now have carport and solar panel construction either in progress or nearly completed. Marinette solar is now producing electricity.

• Duffeeland Dog Park was inspected by Maricopa County officials in response to a complaint from an area resident. County officials confirmed that the park is clean and well maintained.

• Budgeted fitness equipment has been ordered. The new equipment includes a new Cybex rotation machine for Bell which is already installed, new hammer strength back extension machines for Bell and Fairway, several treadmills and some other miscellaneous equipment. Most of the new equipment is for replacement of worn out cardio units at various locations. (Cost – \$64,974)

Mt. View Center/Sun Bowl Ballpark

• The Mt. View pool lighting system is now submitted for permit with Maricopa County Planning and Development and equipment has been ordered. The project includes induction type lighting around the pool and two pole lights in mini golf area. Contractor is Accel Electric. (Cost – \$40,000)

• The Mt. View pickleball court lighting project has been put on hold while a cardholder requested court expansion study is conducted.

• The Sun Bowl Ballfield project is well underway with the old infield material removed and special infield mix installed. Trenching is underway for the new irrigation system and grading of the outfield has begun. While the ballfield is being renovated, the retention/park area to the south of the field will also receive a new irrigation system, re-grading/leveling and new Bermuda grass. A new 20’ high outfield fence will also be installed. Contractors are Wadsworth Golf Construction Company and Western Fence. (Cost – \$200,848)

• The Sunbowl Amphitheater project has been approved by the RCSC bid commission. Once all fall shows are over, the work of smoothing the terraced areas and installing a new irrigation system will commence. Contractor is Wadsworth Golf Construction. (Cost – \$148,947)

Quail Run Pro Shop

• New windows for the pro shop are on order and will be installed soon. A light for the flagpole will also be installed. Contractors will be Jocoran Glass, RCSC Skilled Trades Department and Accel Electric. (Estimated Cost – \$8,500)

South Golf Maintenance

• The building permit for the new 6,000 s.f. maintenance building has been received and the steel building has been released for fabrication. The RCSC bid commission approved the project and the general contractor has been hired. Work on this

facility will commence in early May 2013. Contractors to date include Bunger Steel, Inc, Jokake Construction and CCBG Architectural. (Est. Building Cost \$632,645)

Fairway Center

• A short section of steel fencing and a gate were installed along the north end of the patio. The fencing was needed to discourage people from walking across the golf course and from tracking grass and mud into the lobby. Contractor was Sav-On-Fence. (Cost – \$3,250)

Lakeview Center

• The waterfall pump and motor are still in for repairs. The rebuilding of the 25 HP motor is complete and the new pump ordered but there is a long lead time for delivery. Once the new pump arrives all equipment will be installed ASAP so the waterfall will be flowing again. In the meantime a portable pump is being used to fill and circulate water in the lagoons. Contractor is Phoenix Pumps, Inc. (Est. Cost – \$23,000)

• The mechanical equipment (HVAC) which serves the Women’s Social Club failed and was replaced. Contractor was Rainforest Plumbing & Air. (Cost – \$5,941)

• A replacement water fountain has been ordered for the 103rd Ave location on Viewpoint Lake. Contractor is Waterworks By George. (Cost – \$10,159)

Bell Center

• Wood & Metal shop expansion project continues with roof work, mechanical work and framing underway. This project is currently about 50% completed. Contractor is K.L.McIntyre Construction. (Cost – \$435,561)

• Exterior painting is nearly completed. RCSC inspections of the painting project will occur the week of April 22, 2013. Once all touch up work is completed the project will close. Contractor is Quality Painting. (Cost – \$86,971)

• The complete renovations of the two Lawn Bowl Greens is now in full swing with demolition complete and work on the drainage system and concrete backboards bulkheads in progress. Contractors include: Ken McIntyre Construction, National Turf and Wood Bay Turf Technologies. (Cost to Date – \$484,308)

Sundial Center/Riverview Pro Shop

• Two replacement signs for the golf course are scheduled to be installed. One sign has already been installed on the pro shop building. Unfortunately, after several attempts were made to contact Apollo Signs we have heard nothing back. The replacement sign for the #10 tee box is now being assigned to another company for completion. Contractor was Apollo Signs. (Cost for both signs – \$13,898)

• The elevator at Sundial is currently scheduled to be upgraded. Some of the upgrades include: electrical control panel changes, new hydraulic pump, fire system upgrades, installation of sump pump and ladder in the bottom of the shaft, and dedicated mechanical equipment to maintain the elevator equipment room temperature. This project will commence during the summer of 2013 and last for approximately four weeks. Contractor is Otis Elevator. (Cost – \$95,781)

• The Pro/Snack shop building will be receiving a new standing seam metal roof to replace the existing worn out and broken tile roof. The contractor is Starkweather Roofing. (Cost – \$29,882)

• Exterior painting of the Pro Shop and Cart Barn buildings will commence after the roof is replaced. The contractor for the project will be Silverado Painting. (Cost – \$5,345)

Marinette Center

• The Marinette building expansion project has received final approval by the Board of Directors. Drawings of future improvements and changes are currently being prepared by our architect and will be posted at several locations, including Marinette very soon.

Skilled Trades Department

• The RCSC skilled Trades department completed 135 work orders during March and the first two weeks of April 2013.

rate in 18 months, while January balances went over 60 days past due at the average rate of 4.6%. At the end of March, outstanding balances related to property transfers increased by 2.8% but represent a lower percentage of account receivables. This is due to the significant increase in March billings which is the largest monthly amount for the year.

For the first quarter, Cardholder Services has printed new cards for 9,913 cardholders. This compared to 1,358 for the same time period last year. As reported last month this increase is expected but significant nonetheless.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties went down to 76 for the end of March. The number of properties owned by lending institutions remained steady at 80 during this month. These figures continue to be lower than last year and are most likely affected by the increase in property sales we are continuing to experience this year.

The Preservation and Improvement Fees collected in March were \$585,000 with the resale activity continuing to increase this year. Year to date PIF fees collected are \$1,626,000.

Human Resources:

We are organizing a training session, Interviewing and Selection: Successful and Legal Practices, to be presented in early May to RCSC Managers and Supervisors who have hiring responsibilities. The presentation will include laws and guidelines that affect interviewing and assist in the selection process.

Managers and Supervisors need to be aware of the many and various employment laws and related court decisions which impact the Corporation. As laws and compliance requirements change or new ones are created, it is important to communicate this information. Laws that impact hiring include the Federal Civil Rights Act, The Arizona Civil Rights Act, The Age Discrimination in Employment Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act and many others.

Participants in the training session will be provided with a list of lawful and unlawful interview questions that can guide them through the interview process. This will be a great refresher course for those with hiring authority.

We are in the process of reviewing and updating some job descriptions. This is an ongoing process when job responsibilities and/or requirements change not only due to changes in the laws but also for company requirements. A job description is a helpful and necessary tool in the interview and selection process.

Events & Entertainment:

The RCSC Event Volunteers, at the events in the orange vests, are sought after by residents and guests when they need assistance. Golf Report

Pro Shops

With good weather, we were able to post positive results over prior year, for the first time this year. Green Fee/Cart Fee Revenue was \$4,716 ahead of budget, a 1% increase. Merchandise was \$1,802 ahead of budget, a 7% increase and Driving Range revenue was \$519 ahead of budget a 2% increase. Total revenue was \$7,155 or 1% ahead of budget.

The small gains to budget brought our first quarter revenue deficit down to \$149,348. Total operating expenses for the quarter were down \$7,929.

On March 4 and 5, South hosted Glendale Community College and several other community colleges from the Arizona Community College Athletic Conference. Fifty-four golfers put their skills to the test during the event. Scottsdale Community College was the first place team, followed by South Mountain Community College. A score of 68 was the lowest round recorded for the two day event. This is the second consecutive year South hosted this event which generated \$4,074 in revenue over the two days.

The free March clinics, hosted by our local professionals, were well attended. The lowest attendance of 38 golfers was on March 9, which suffered from poor weather. The highest attendance was March 16, with 58 golfers. Total attendance for the month was 197 golfers.

Snack Shops

As is usually the case, Snack Shop revenue mirrored Pro Shop performance, posting positive gains to budget. For the month Snack Shop revenue was \$4,102 ahead of budget. As a reminder, beginning April 29, the snack shops will begin closing at 3:00 p.m.

Maintenance

With a stretch of above normal temperatures, Bermuda grass began growing and the rye grass began showing signs of stress. In an effort to maintain playing conditions watering has been increased throughout the courses. Unfortunately, increased watering will result in wet spots, particularly in low lying areas and/or areas that are mown to a higher height. Green banks and slopes are the first areas to show signs of stress, excess water from these areas collect in low areas creating additional standing water.

In conjunction with the monthly green committee meetings, the course superintendents are conducting formal course visits attended by myself (Brian Duthu) and the owner of Mojo's (formerly NGM) Jeffery Omahen. Items discussed by the Green Committee's are given priority, followed by items identified during the visit. Any items needing correction are recorded and marked for follow up. Currently the focus is on developing consistent playing conditions from course to course.

Green aerification begins May 2 at Willowbrook and continues through May 13 at Quail Run. Golfers are encouraged to check the schedule to find a course that meets their needs. Due to the upcoming renovation the greens at North will not be aerified this year. Lakes West will not be aerified in the first round of courses. In an effort to reduce the number of aerifications, we will be aerifying Lakes West in July using larger tines and tighter spacing. The aggressive nature of this aerification will, most likely, lead to a longer recovery time for Lakes West.

The bunker renovation at Willowbrook will begin on May 6. Initially only the back nine will be closed, leaving the front nine open for play. The first part of June the front nine will close, leaving the entire course unavailable for play. Construction will continue through the end of July and the course opening will be determined at a later date, based on turf recovery.

How Beneficial is Aerification?

The greens are looking as good as they have all year, then why do we choose to disrupt the surface and aerify?

Aerification is the most frustrating agronomical practice - for golfers, management and superintendents. Then why do we do it? The answer is for the long term health of the greens.

Without aerification, greens develop a thick thatch layer that makes them spongy, difficult to mow and more susceptible to disease. Excessive thatch also results in putting surfaces that are slower than desired. Aerifying also creates air pockets that supply the grass root systems with oxygen.

Normally, RCSC will aerify greens twice per year, once in May and the second time in July/August. The first aerification removes approximately 5% of the organic matter, the second removes 10% of the organic matter. This year we will be attempting to remove our total goal of 15% organic matter at Lakes West in just one aerification in July. The success of this trial will be determined by the length of time required for the greens at Lakes West to heal together with golfer comments and feedback.

Since North will be undergoing an extensive renovation beginning December 1, the greens will not be aerified this summer, nor will the North course be overseeded this fall. Golfers at North can expect near normal conditions up to the time of closure.

Tips for Seniors from Daily Fitness...
Myths & Misconceptions about Exercise



Daily Fitness trainer, Jane Fortier, clarifies stretching technique and usage with client, Linda Montgomery

“When we work with clients, we often hear misconception about exercise,” states personal trainer Jane Fortier. The ones heard most often include:

#1 Stretching before exercise is important! – “Warming-up” is important before exercise because it increases blood flow to the muscles. This can be done with simple leg lifts & arm circles, or a 5-minute casual walk on the treadmill. Stretching is more effective and safer if done after exercise when muscles are warm and pliable. Static stretching lengthens and destabilizes fibers, making them less prepared for the strain of exercise.

#2 Ab Crunches will get rid of belly fat! - Doing ab crunches will firm up abdominal muscles, but will not burn belly fat. Building muscle anywhere burns fat everywhere. In order to burn fat, use a workout program that incorporates both strength training and aerobic elements.

#3 You have to lift a lot of weight to build muscle! – As an aging adult, the technique and form you use when lifting is more important than the amount of weight you lift. Taking muscle fibers to fatigue properly requires an understanding of the concentric, isometric and eccentric motions of the lifting muscle. As muscle gains strength and mass, additional weight can be added to challenge it further.

#4 Exercise turns fat into muscle! – Changing body fat and muscle mass are individual processes. These processes can occur simultaneously, if an individual is exercising correctly. A well-designed strength training and aerobic program results in more “lean weight” and less “fat weight” over a period of time.

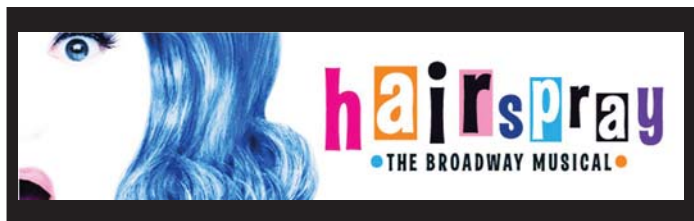

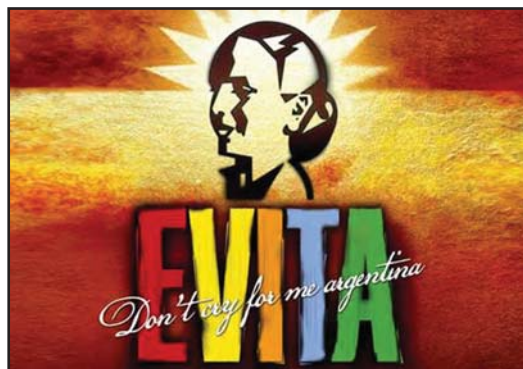

Duffeeland Dog Park Update

Improvements continue at Duffeeland Dog Park in an effort to make the park more user-friendly and an asset to the neighborhood.

An inspection by Maricopa County officials in response to complaints from area residents confirmed that the park is clean and well maintained. Sam Jorgenson, inspector for the Maricopa County Environmental Services Department, found the property located at the southwest corner of Thunderbird Road North and Del Webb Boulevard to be free of feces and there were no signs of rodent activity or infestation. The only concern mentioned was lack of covers for trash receptacles; however it was noted that all waste was enclosed in plastic bags.

In response, RCSC has placed lidded trash containers at several locations on the site and replaced an open top dumpster for one with a lid. Other improvements include receptacles for bags in order for users to keep the property free of waste and debris. Signage has been installed listing the rules and regulations that must be adhered to by park users including that the facility is for RCSC cardholders and their invited guests only.

Duffeeland continues to be monitored and maintained weekly by RCSC grounds staff to ensure that the park is maintained to acceptable standards. RCSC also wishes to thank the many dog park volunteers who assist in keeping the park clean. The park is open daily from 6:30 a.m. to sunset and these operating hours have been posted. Dogs are not allowed at any other RCSC facilities, including the Sun Bowl, Lakeview Hillside Park and golf courses.

New Pickleball Courts Slated for Mountain View

In response to cardholder comments, RCSC will be adding three new Pickleball courts in addition to rebuilding the existing pickleball courts and installing new lights at Mountain View later this year.

With plans underway to begin renovations at Marinette in 2014, players and supporters of the popular sport spoke at the April 8 Board/Member Exchange to express their concerns. The Board agreed that additional courts would lessen the burden expected once renovations are underway.

Thanks to cardholder input, some additional space and one additional shower has been added to the women's shower/locker room. Marinette project display boards are new at Marinette and other Centers for cardholder review. This renovation project is scheduled to begin in 2014.

RCSC appreciates the input received from cardholders and remains committed to receiving suggestions and feedback from members on projects and improvements to our facilities.
