

Fishin' for information?

Viewpoint Lake Town Hall Meetings



Some Sun City residents spend years never knowing that the Recreation Centers of Sun City has a 33-acre man-made lake directly adjacent to the Lakeview Recreation Center.

Along with the beautiful recently re-landscaped hillside park, walking trails, lagoon and waterfall, RCSC has both row boats and pontoon-style paddle boats available for Cardholder use. In addition, a boat launch is available for personal watercraft (no longer than 16 feet with a maximum 10hp motors only).

To further enhance this "jewel in the desert," RCSC has enlisted the services of fisheries and aquatic systems specialist Eric Swanson to prepare a 5-year plan which will include lake management guidelines and fish habitat construction and maintenance. Swanson has 20 years experience with the Arizona Game and Fish Department.

RCSC Cardholders are invited to attend one of two town hall meetings scheduled for Tuesday, June 3, 2014. Both meetings will be held in the Lakeview Social Halls at 2:00 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. RCSC encourages all Cardholders to attend this event as we are certain you will thoroughly enjoy listening to Eric Swanson's Lake Management and Fish Habitat presentation.

"Those of us who reside in Sun City know all about this wonderful community and the many activities available to every Cardholder. My hope is that Sun City will take this opportunity to learn about the upcoming lake improvements and fish management program," said RCSC Assistant General Manager Jim Wellman.

North Golf Course Renovation Project Architect's Report

Bring on the hot weather! I know that is not what you want to hear but Bermuda grass really likes the hot, humid weather and that is exactly what we need to have the best grow-in of the North Golf Course.

With the exception of bunker construction on the last few holes of the back nine, the major construction work has been completed. Bunker sand has been stockpiled in the completed bunkers to help protect the bunker liner. The wind row of sand that you might see around the edge of the bunker is to allow any contamination that might come into the bunker during these final stages to be confined to a small area and then after grassing is complete the contractor will come in and clean all the contaminated sand out of this area, put in new sand and then check the final sand depths.

Wadsworth Golf Construction has started to put the finishing touches on the areas of work in preparation for grassing. The final preparation of the golf course prior to grassing requires a lot of detailed hand work to meet the project specifications and our requirements. This involves the final setting and leveling of the irrigation heads, installation of all the required lids and drain grates, final compaction of trenches, final finish of all tie-ins, and hand raking/cleanup of the entire area in anticipation of grassing. Currently grassing is scheduled to begin in early June and go through mid-July.

Once a golf hole is planted those holes will need a lot of water and will remain very wet in order to create the best environment for the establishment of the Bermuda grass. It is very important for everyone to stay off of the golf course during this time as any footprints (including dogs), tire ruts, etc. that might occur are costly to repair as we then have to wait for the golf hole to be completely grow-in and then come back in and repair the damage and sod these areas.



According to Senior Golf Architect Gary Brawley, it will be very important for everyone to stay completely off of the North Golf Course once grassing begins since it will be very wet and any footprints (including dogs) and/or tire ruts will be extremely costly to repair and could delay course opening.

- Never use loosened turf for repair.



WRONG!

Pulling up or lifting on the center or the sides will tear the roots and result in brown spots taking weeks for the surface to heal.

Do not pull up or twist with tool. This will only bring sand to the surface and tear the root system



RIGHT!

Insert tool and push back and sides forward to center. No damage to root system. Healing starts immediately.

Candidate Packets Available June 4

RCSC Board of Director elections may be months away, but the Elections Committee has been hard at work talking to prospective candidates for the December election. There will be three vacancies to fill, with each vacancy a 3-year term.

Candidate packets will be available starting on Wednesday, June 4. Those interested in obtaining a packet must make this request in person at the Corporate/Board Office at Lakeview Center (lower level) and present their RCSC Member card. The deadline for packet submissions is no later than noon on Wednesday, October 1, 2014.

Requirements to become a candidate are:

- Must be at least fifty-five (55) years of age;
- Must be a Deeded Real Estate Owner of property in Sun City, Maricopa County, Arizona;
- Must be a resident of Sun City for a minimum of two (2) years prior to December 1, 2013:
- · Must be a Member in good standing;
- Must reside in Sun City, Arizona and be available at least ten (10) months of the year;
- Must meet the requirement to hold an Arizona liquor license (RCSC holds liquor licenses which require Board officers to be included on the licensing); and
- Must be eligible and available to serve a three (3) year term.

Candidates must also submit a fully completed RCSC petition, signed by 100 or more Members in good standing, and the other forms provided in the RCSC Candidate Packet.

A successful candidate will:

- · Have a strong desire to serve Sun City;
- Be fair and courteous;
- Use good common sense;
- Have good communication skills;
- Be willing to work as part of a team;
- Ability to prioritize policy and projects; which will have the greatest benefit for the most members; and
- Be willing and able to dedicate the necessary hours to be an effective Director.

Candidates will be introduced at both the October and November Board meetings (4th Thursday) and two candidate forums will be held in the fall. Dates will be announced at a later time.

Updates

Financial Report:

We have completed our first quarter of 2014 within our operating and capital budget year-to-date. We have been working with APS to get all the credits due us for our solar production and APS rebates and although that has yet to be totally resolved, we are making progress and hope to have it all completed very soon. Once completed, we will have some adjustments to our utility expenses of a positive nature from these March financials. We also show that our assessment income is under budget yearto-date. However, it is a budget timing error that will level out over the summer. Along that same line, remember this is the time of year when we have the largest monthly billings for assessments so cash does tend to accumulate as it is needed for the summer months with smaller billings. The golf division continues to exceed budget expectations considerably! We have ended the first quarter \$100k better than budget in gross income despite the closure of the North Course, so obviously all these houses that are being sold are being occupied by some more golfers!

Cardholder Services:

Payments on past due assessments ticked up in March and were at the monthly average for the past year. February billings went past due at a rate of 5.6%, which is the lowest rate in the past three years. January balances went 60 days past due at a rate of 3.7%, which is the lowest monthly rate in the past year. Total accounts receivables decreased for the third straight month for a total reduction of 7.3% for the first quarter. This was the first consecutive three months of accounts receivable reduction in over 4 years and is reflective of successful third party collections efforts. Outstanding balances related to property transfers decreased by 8% in February and now represent 55% of all receivables due and past due balances.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties stayed the same at 39 properties at the end of March. The number of properties owned by lending institutions increased slightly to 75 this month. Even with this increase, the total accounts receivable attributable to lending institutions decreased by 15% in March.

Strong resale transactions continued in March resulting in Preservation and Improvement Fees being collected in March totaling \$741,368, which is \$333k more than budget. Year-to-date PIF fees are \$1,831,468, which is \$823,468 over budget for the year.

Bowling Centers:

The 26th annual Sun City Open Bowling Tournament starts this weekend at both

RCSC bowling centers and continues the weekend of May 3. The tournament is open to all bowlers fifty years of age and older statewide and beyond.

Starting the last Sunday of May, Bell Lanes will begin the monthly summer No-Tap bowling tournaments. The tournaments will be held the last Sunday of each month and end the last Sunday of September with a Scotch Doubles tournament.

Recently Lakeview Lanes hosted a demo days with ball manufacturer Columbia 300. Nearly forty bowlers attended and were able to try out the latest offerings from the manufacturer and get tips from the representatives.

Human Resources:

The first quarter of the year has required HR to focus on hiring as a result of bringing Golf and Grounds Maintenance back in-house, filling newly budgeted positions for 2014 and turnover as some employees

leave RCSC. Since January 1, 2014, we have added 102 employees to the staff with sixteen of those resulting from turnover.

Processing 35 returning Golf and Grounds employees as compared to newly hired individuals was a less complicated task since background checks were simplified and the returning employees had a history with RCSC. Regardless of where the hires came from, HR was required to follow the same due diligence process including background checks, work history verification, new hire orientation, benefit enrollments, etc.

In mid March, HR received a telephone call from the U.S. Department of Labor informing us that the Secretary of Labor was scheduling a limited review of RCSC's Employees 401(k) Plan for mid-April. We agreed to an April 15 audit date and a follow up letter dated March 17 was received shortly thereafter with a list of requested documents causing us to question their

definition of "limited" review. With ample time to assemble and copy all requested documents, the audit took place and ended timely. We are awaiting the DOL's opinion of our work papers and the Plan. We expect a positive response.

Project Updates

General Centers Projects and Information

The card access equipment and software for the Fairway card access system is installed and tested. RCSC employees have received software training. Distribution of access devices to dedicated clubs and migration from keys to the new system will occur the week of April 28. After the dedicated clubs are put onto the new system, RCSC will set up a table at Fairway for the distribution of access devices to those cardholders wishing to use the East Fairway entrance. The dates and times for this distribution will be announced shortly. Contractor is Multi Card Company. (Phase 1 Cost – \$52,000)

Mt. View Center

The seven (7) new Pickleball courts at Mt View are nearing completion. The current plan is to open the new courts for cardholder play in early May 2014. Contractors are Sunland Sports and CCBG Architectural. (Cost – \$288,580)

Oakmont Center

The re-routed fire line feeding the clubs buildings and the pool shower room is completed, tested and back on line effective April 16. During the removal of the south and west block walls it was discovered that Cox Communications had a "Trunk" cable



crossing this wall area and under the old wall footing. Cox will be digging up their cables on April 22 so the footings for the new block walls can commence that same day. This problem pushed out the digging of the spa until April 2. In addition, a required inspection for the first 4' lift on the block building wall was called into Maricopa County on April 15 and due to

County staff shortages, the inspection could not occur until April 21. Contractors to date include CCBG Architectural, K.L. McIntyre Construction and Aquatic Builders. (Cost – \$620,855)

Lakeview Center

Irrigation replacement on the Lakeview Hillside Park commenced April 17. The park is now closed to cardholders and guests (including fishing) for about six weeks. The irrigation improvements will ensure that water reaches all plants and trees in the park thus making this setting more beautiful than it already is. Contractors are AAA Landscaping and Marvin Mills Irrigation. (Cost – \$100,000)

Bids are currently being received for the replacement of the Lakeview waterfall lights. Once bids are obtained, cardholders will be notified as to the day the waterfall will be shut down for this work.

Riverview Pro Shop

The new standing seam metal roof on the Riverview cart barn is now completed. The new roof matches the one put on the pro shop last year. Contractor was Starkweather Roofing. (Cost - \$12,198)

Bell Center

Bell Tennis building plans have been submitted to Maricopa County Building and Planning Department for permit. Construction bid packets have been sent out to contractors and proposals are expected back very soon. Once received, the project

will be submitted to the RCSC bid commission for final approval. The project includes demolition of the current 8 tennis courts and pushing out some of the existing block walls in preparation for 10 new tennis courts. The new updated complex will also include a shaded gathering area, courtside canopies with benches, water and electric to each court, tables and benches for spectators and planters in the common areas. Contractor to date is Lloyd Sports Engineering.

The single pane glass wall on the east side of the Bell Table Tennis room is being

replaced with shaded dual glazed energy efficient glass upper panels and solid thermal lower panels. The new glass wall will greatly improve the ability to cool this space

in the summer. The Table Tennis area will be closed to cardholders and guests on April 28 and remain closed for approximately 7-10 days. Contractor is Precision Glass. (Cost – \$16,900)

Plans are being finalized to scarify and replace the entire cool decking at the Bell pools. In addition, both pools will be acid washed, the interior damage in the walking pool repaired, new rope anchors installed in the lap pool and all water line tile deep scrubbed and re caulked. Contractors are Spartan Concrete and Aquatic Builders. (Esti-

mated Cost - \$92,000)



One of the compressors failed and had to be replaced in a 20-ton mechanical (HVAC) unit at the Bell Library. Contractor was Custom Cooling. (Cost – \$5,800)

Two new shade sails were installed on April 13 at the Bell Lawn Bowl facility. The labor and materials cost for these shade sails was generously donated to the RCSC. Contractor was Sun City Awning. (Cost – \$9,057)

The Bell Lawn Bowling greens

were re-opened to cardholders on Monday, April 14. The new greens were constructed using Tiff Dwarf Bermuda grass and are expected to offer many years of lawn bowling enjoyment to Cardholders and their guests.

Marinette Center

The Marinette expansion project plans have been returned to Maricopa County Planning and Development Department with the required changes and corrections and the RCSC is waiting for approval and our permit. Contractor proposals have been received

and the project will be forwarded to the RCSC bid commission for final approval. Contractor to date is CCBG Architectural.



A new roof will be installed on the Ballfield restroom building. The new roof is needed due to water infiltration and poor venting. Contractor is Starkweather Roofing. (Cost – \$3,458)

Skilled Trades Department

The RCSC Skilled Trades Department completed 108 work orders during the last half of March 2014 and the 1st half of April 2014. They were also instrumental in helping the RCSC grounds team in setting up the Bell Lawn Bowl facility prior to its re-opening on April 14. I

am currently searching for a new Project Manager since Bob Teske resigned his position effective April 14.

Grounds Department

The RCSC Grounds team has been working very hard this month keeping all Sun City properties looking great. They were instrumental in setting up the Bell Lawn Bowling facility in preparation for its re-opening. Since the Bermuda grass has come out of dormancy on all lawn bowling greens, the grounds department will be very busy with aerifying, verticutting, fertilizing, rolling and mowing these activity areas. The grounds team will be performing their monthly maintenance work at Duffeeland Dog Park on April 30, including the application of Biozyme Enzyme urine eliminator, a non-toxic 100% pet friendly and environmentally safe product. Lastly, the grounds department will plant some trees and shrubs on the Lakeview Hillside Park once the irrigation project is completed.

Reducing Water Loss from Pools & Spas

Wind. Evaporation. Backwashing. Leaks. What do they have in common? Consuming high volumes of water in your pool or spa. As more than 50% of potable water used by Arizonans is outdoors, a variety of methods can help diminish this preventable loss of water. In Phoenix and Tucson, the average evaporation loss rate is approximately six feet per year. Add this to the water lost from refilling and backwashing and you roughly lose the equivalent of filling a 16' x 36' pool every year. Makes one thirsty just thinking about it...



Normal sun and wind exposure alone can cause an average size pool to lose up to 1,000 gallons of water in a month which is as much as a family of four consumes in drinking water in a year and a half! A simple 7mph wind at a pool's surface increases evaporation loss by 300%. Trees, shrubs and other windbreaks such as decorative fencing can greatly reduce evaporation caused by wind.

There are many simple water conservation ideas for swimming pools. Refraining from unnecessary backwashing or installing timers to standardize backwash cycle durations and frequency is helpful. Cartridge filter systems instead of sand/diatomaceous earth filters can reduce water usage in half due to the fact that the need to backwash is much less frequent. Consider installing a filter between the sand filter and the main return line which allows clean water to be returned to the pool instead rather than wasting backwash. And don't let good backwash water go to waste - redirect it to plants or use for other beneficial purposes.


90 to 95% of pool and spa water lost to evaporation can be saved by installing a cover. Conventional pool covers also help keep out debris, thus reducing the need to backwash. Reflective pool covers decrease heat retention; solar covers claim to warm pool water faster and extend swimming seasons, cutting heating bills and easing evaporation loss. Liquid pool covers, produced with a biodegradable alcohol containing a chemical that creates "mono-



molecular" film over water surfaces, are growing in popularity. The thin film increases the surface tension and prevents evaporation, but need to be replenished.

Be sure in designing a pool that you place the overflow pipe where it can easily be plugged or blocked when large groups are swimming, preventing water loss from splashing. And make sure that splash troughs drain back into the pool system!

If your pool is losing water at a rate greater than you feel it should, there is a simple test that can help determine if there is a leak in the system. Simply place a five gallon bucket on the second step or a bench seat and fill it with water until it is exactly the same level as the pool. Evaporation will drop both the pool and the bucket at the same rate. If the bucket drops faster, you probably have a thirsty dog; but if you have a leak in the pool, the water level in the pool will fall faster than that in the bucket. Though there



are a few more tests that can be done to determine where the leak is coming from, now is a good time to call in a professional leak specialist.

Remember that using community pools is a more conscientious choice than building a private pool, and installing a spa is an even more conservative option. What a sensible advantage we have in Sun City with all the beautiful pools and spas that are available to RCSC Cardholders at our recreation centers!

Tips for Seniors from Daily Fitness -Improve Osteoporosis with Exercise

Jean Basinais became concerned about bone health, when she was diagnosed with osteopenia, a precursor to osteoporosis. She knew that exercise could have a positive impact on bone health, but was confused about what to do. Jean consulted with Daily Fitness trainer, Jane Fortier, and decided to move forward with some personal training sessions.

"Osteoporosis causes bones to become weak and brittle — so brittle, that a fall, simple body movement or coughing could cause a fracture," states fitness professional Fortier. Heredity, age and lifestyle all have an effect on bone health. Bones are very active biologically. They are made up of cells that are constantly dying and being replaced. "Osteoblasts" are the cells that replace lost bone. Stimulating the production of osteoblasts is imperative for someone with osteoporosis. Whether you already face bone-density problems, or simply want to avoid having them, regular weightbearing exercise is a must."

"Not just any old workout gets results," notes Fortier, who personally deals with osteoporosis. "Resistance exercise that requires muscles to work against gravity has the most bone-building benefit. Bone responds to intensity, not duration. It reacts to a force greater than what it is used to, not a repetition of the same force. Strength exercise has the ability to progressively and continually challenge muscles that are connected to bones, thus activating osteoblasts. Strength exercise that involves as many different muscles groups, in as many different functional movement patterns as possible, is the best."

Fortier has created two distinct workouts for Jean Basinais that address load, intensity and variety – key elements for activating osteoblasts. Daily Fitness trainers custom design programs to fit individual needs and issues. 





Telling the Truth - A Lesson from My Dad, Du Wayne F. Klein

My father taught me many life lessons through my growing years

He was a very special man, my mentor, my confidant, and in my adulthood, my friend.

A wonderful husband to my Mom, a wonderful Grandpa to his Grandchildren, and a great Grandpa to his Great Grandsons, is the best way I can describe

He worked hard throughout his life, as a teen supporting his Mom and his siblings, and later in life supporting his family monetarily, example wise, with honesty and integrity, always available for my sister and myself.

Upon Dad's death at 95 years, on June 19, 2012 the words I heard most about him was "he was such a good and honorable man."
