

Solar Projects Break Ground

Ground breaking began last month as construction of photovoltaic solar projects began at both Oakmont and Marinette Recreation Centers. It is anticipated that once completed, these will generate approximately 4 million kWh annually. The new solar electric systems will eventually be installed at all seven Recreation Centers, Bell Lanes, Lakeview Lanes and some of the golf maintenance facilities.

Once completed, all solar electric systems will not only save RCSC an estimated \$937,255 over the next 15 years but most will also provide shade for automobiles underneath the carport structures when completed. The new solar energy systems will include an estimated 14,000 solar panels and produce the same amount of energy it takes to power 347 homes. Wilson Electric was chosen as the contractor for the project. Mark Holohan, Wilson's Solar Division Manager, is also the President of the local chapter of the Arizona Solar Energy Industries Association.

In addition to the photovoltaic solar electric systems above, the RCSC will install new "thermal solar" systems. These thermal solar systems will be used at Bell and Oakmont Recreation Centers to assist in heating swimming pools. The solar water heating systems will reduce natural gas heating expenses by saving over \$900,000 in 15 years by employing 351 unglazed solar thermal panels. Global Renewable Energy has "teamed" with Priceless Plumbing as the installation contractor to provide the solar water heating systems for this project, which should be installed and online by March 31, 2013.

These projects were made possible through Federal, State and APS incentives and this project is currently being heralded as the largest solar commitment by any community in the state.

Annual Membership Meeting

Numerous breaks throughout the day also allowed for one-on-one exchanges with both Directors and RCSC Management.

The closing act for this magical day was Craig Davis, whose quirky mix of juggling, magic and comedy had the audience smiling - until they had to go back out into the rain.

Updates

Financial Report:

While we have ended the year well within our budget for 2012, for those of you who were in attendance this last Saturday, January 26, at the Annual Membership Meeting, during the 2013 budget presentation I pointed out how both capital and repairs & maintenance (R&M) projects work which is important to understand. The money budgeted for capital and R&M projects is held for that project until the project is either completed or cancelled. While we have been able to complete an enormous amount of projects in 2012, some of these projects were budgeted in previous years. Likewise not all projects budgeted in 2012 were able to be concluded this past year. However, the money budgeted will be held for those projects until they are either finished or cancelled. Therefore, we typically will have, and should have, a net excess and positive variance from budget. Remember also, that excess is intentionally budgeted to fund the capital (not Preservation & Improvement Fund) projects.

Bowling Centers:

Recently, the Bowling Department hired Di Tormanen as Bowling League Coordinator for the RCSC Bowling Centers. Di's duties will include soliciting, organizing and coordinating all summer and winter leagues. Di will also coordinate promotional programs, tournaments and events in addition to developing plans for starting new leagues and strengthening existing leagues. Di will report directly to the Director of Bowling Operations, Randy Johnson, and together they will be meeting with all league officers starting in February.

Di retired after thirty-one years at Glenfair Lanes and is current President of the Metro Phoenix USBC. Di is well respected in the bowling industry and the RCSC bowling staff is looking forward to working with her.

Cardholder Services:

Payments made by property owners in outside collections totaled \$9,076 in December with payments from 11 property owners. During December our internal collector processed payments from past due property owners totaling \$46,081 and property related transfer fees totaling \$190,551.

The payments on past due assessments in December were the lowest amount for the year. November billings went past due at a 7.0% rate, which is 10% below average. The rate for October balances

After working closely over several months with Member representatives and the outside marketing firm Catapult Strategic Design, RCSC Management and the Board of Directors proudly unveiled the new Sun City logo at the Annual Membership Meeting in January to kick off a spirited and renewed sense of pride and vision for Sun City. Attendees reacted with much enthusiasm and applause.

Several brainstorming sessions were held with a community focus group last year to develop a brand positioning statement that included the values and vision to take Sun City into its next half century as new marketing strategies are implemented to attract new residents. This process also included an email survey of new logo designs and was decided by popular vote. Survey participants were equally divided

between males and females, and the majority of the voters were aged 60 to 80.

This publication, SunViews, has also undergone changes with an updated



masthead reflecting the new logo design and marketing concepts.

The renewed marketing efforts, together with added events and entertainment, will be a driving force to "bring back a real sense of community and belonging,"

said General Manager Jan Ek. "Existing residents are our best sales people and we look forward to providing them with many opportunities and events to share with friends, family and neighbors."

In an effort to enhance resident participation and enjoyment, events and entertainment will take on a new and exciting quality. A new department has been created which will be responsible for enhancing existing events while bringing new attractions and entertainment venues into the community such as the upcoming "Dancing with the Sun City Stars" and a weekly Farmer's Market that will include fresh, produce, grass-fed meats, breads, and the like, while also offering clubs the opportunity to recruit new member and sell their wares.

According to Theresa Cirino, Director of Events and Entertainment, gourmet food trucks will be at all Sun Bowl performances this spring for your dining pleasure. Planning is also underway for a fireworks celebration the first weekend in July at Lakeview Recreation Center over Viewpoint Lake in addition to the traditional "Ring That Bell" ceremony on the 4th of July. More details will be made available as events are finalized.

Parking Impacts at Center Lots

As construction work on solar projects commences, several parking lots will be affected over the next several months. We anticipate all centers to be completed by the end of April. Every effort is being made to minimize these impacts by staggering construction phases, but RCSC members should be prepared for limited parking availability at the following locations as of press time:

- Lakes East/ West and Talisman: Center of lot east of Talisman Hall unavailable through 3/31;
- Fairway – Phase 1: Entire lot north of bowling greens remains closed through mid-March;
- Fairway Phase2: Construction of southwest parking lot not yet scheduled.
- Fairway Phase 3: Parking lot south of lawn bowling greens not yet scheduled.
- Bell – Phase 1: South parking lot near fitness center closed through March.
- Bell – Phases 2 – 4: Construction schedule still pending.

Project Updates

General Centers Projects / Information

Installation of the Photo Voltaic (PV-Electricity producing) systems is now underway. The first locations to receive the new carports and solar panels will be Marinette and Oakmont Centers. At the present time all building permits except Lakeview and Sundial centers have been received. We expect these two locations will receive their permits very soon. Contractor is Wilson Electric.

The two Bell thermal solar projects and Oakmont thermal project were delayed slightly in early January but are expected to be up and running by the end of January 2013. Contractor is Priceless Plumbing.

Mt. View Center/Sunbowl Ballpark

Installation of the Mt. View pool lighting system will begin as soon as the building permit is obtained. The project includes induction type lighting around the swimming pool and two pole lights in the mini golf area. Contractor is Accel Electric. (Cost – \$40,000)

As soon as the construction permit is obtained, induction type pole lights will be installed at the Mt View pickleball courts. Contractor is ATS Electrical. (Cost – \$23,422)

On January 3, 2013 the large 2.4M BTU Raypak pool heater went down due to a burner flame out, which in turn melted the control panel and associated wiring. Since Raypak is a Canadian manufacturer, the RCSC had to order a new custom made control panel from North Carolina. Once the panel was received it was installed in a different location and the

control wiring was put into conduit to prevent this problem from occurring again. The heater was also serviced and put back on-line January 25, 2013.

Bids have now been received, and a contractor selected for the Sunbowl Ballfield project. The project will include a new irrigation system, grading and leveling of the infield and outfield, new infield and warning track materials, some new fencing and new Mid Iron Bermuda grass. At the same time the ballfield is renovated, the retention / park area to the South of the field will receive a new irrigation system, re-leveling and new Mid Iron Bermuda grass. Contractor is Wadsworth Golf Construction Company. (Cost – \$159,385)

South Maintenance

The building drawings for the new South Golf Maintenance building are completed. To date the RCSC is responding to the 3rd round of comments from Maricopa County Planning and Development Department as we secure a building permit for this project. Project plans and other construction information have now been distributed to contractors and bids are expected back soon. Once the bids are received the project will be sent to the RCSC bid commission for final approval. Contractors to date include Bunker Steel, Inc and CCBG Architectural.

Lakeview Center

The Lakeview lawn bowl greens lighting project is now completed. The new light fixtures are working as planned and the RCSC has received some very positive comments.

Contractor was Wilson Electric. (Cost – \$55,880)

The mini golf restrooms at Lakeview are currently being remodeled. Two portable toilet units with hand washing sinks have been placed while the remodeling takes place. Contractors for this project include: Marlin Mechanical, Interior Logic and the RCSC Skilled Trades Team. (Cost – \$16,000)

The East men's and women's restrooms at Lakeview Lanes are being remodeled. The remodel will include the addition of ADA accessible toilets for the bowling lanes building. Contractor is Ken McIntyre Construction. (Cost – \$28,000)

Bell Center

The Bell Wood & Metal shop expansion project is moving forward with demolition and rerouting of a natural gas line. Contractor is Ken McIntyre Construction. (Cost – \$435,561)

Exterior painting of Bell Center is progressing as planned with about 75% completed. Contractor is Quality Painting. (Cost – \$86,971)

Commencing sometime in April, both lawn bowl greens at Bell Center will be completely renovated. Work will include new backboards and plinths, new drainage systems, some concrete walkway work, new Bermuda grass and a new irrigation system including a booster pump. Project information is currently being prepared so construction bids can be requested. In addition, the backboard and plinth board materials have been ordered as they are a special order item requiring a long lead time. Once bids are received the project

will be sent to the RCSC bid commission for final approval.

Sundial Center / Riverview Pro

Two replacement signs for the Riverview golf course are scheduled to be installed. One sign has been installed on the pro shop building and the other will be installed by the #10 tee box sometime in February. Unfortunately, this project has been delayed due to some health problems with the contractor. Contractor is Apollo Signs. (Cost – \$13,898)

The elevator at Sundial broke down on Tuesday January 22, 2013. The elevator is an old model Dover DMC and new parts and software are no longer available. The elevator company is working with the manufacturer and an outside circuit board repair company to prepare temporary electronics for the elevator before it can be made operational again. At the same time the RCSC is determining cost and upgrade requirements for the current equipment so future repair parts will not be a problem.

On Monday January 28 the large swimming pool's re-circulating pump went out due to the failure of the main housing seal. The RCSC Aquatic Technician and our pool company began making repairs to the pump the same day.

Skilled Trades Department

The RCSC skilled Trades department completed 132 work orders during December 2012 and January 2013. Among many other non-work order tasks, the RCSC the Skilled Trades team is doing some of the Lakeview Mini Golf restroom remodel work.

going over 60 days past due was up at 6.1%, and is 36% higher than the monthly average for 2012. As a result of the lower payment rates in December, past due balances increased 2.4% in the last month. Although traditionally not the case, December was a very poor month for collection of assessments due.

At the end of December, outstanding balances related to property transfers decreased by almost 10% and represent 52% of both receivables due and past due balances. The most significant area of accounts receivables increase are the fees related to past due accounts which increased by \$35,130, or 17.2%, over the 2011 year end balances. While we have continued our internal efforts in collection of past due accounts, we have begun working with an outside collection firm that specializes in the collection of assessments. The fees charged for this external collection process will be paid by those who require this service, and as a result the cost of not paying your assessment to RCSC in a timely manner will be considerably higher.

Overall accounts receivables due at the end of 2012 decreased by a mere \$81 compared to the end of 2011 balances. Past due balances increased \$93,562, or 9.8%, over the end of 2011, while the number of property owners with past due balances decreased by 4.5% Most notably we have seen a shift from under 30 day balances to the over 60 and over 90 day categories from 2011 to 2012.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties remained the same in December and the number of properties owned by lending institutions decreased to 77 which is down almost 25% from the end of 2011

The Preservation and Improvement Fees collected in December were \$257,000 over budget. For the end of the year the total Preservation and Improvement Fees collected were \$2,839,075, or 72%, over budget. Again, it is important that I remind you

that we conservatively budget PIF and transfer fees intentionally to insure that funds are available for PIF projects, as RCSC does not incur debt; we pay for all projects as they are completed.

Human Resources:

Effective January 1, 2013, the amount employers may pay their employees for business travel was increased by the IRS to 56.5 cents per mile from the previous 55.5 cents per mile. RCSC increased travel reimbursement to the new rate for employees who must use their own private vehicles for business purposes and have revised the Travel Reimbursement policy.

At a public meeting held on October 17, 2012, the Industrial Commission of Arizona determined that Arizona's minimum wage of \$7.65 per hour would be increased by \$0.15 cents to \$7.80 for calendar year 2013. RCSC employees whose hourly rate was below the new Arizona State minimum received an increase to that amount for work performed as of that date and thereafter. Arizona voters enacted the Raise the Minimum Wage for Working Arizonans Act in 2006. The Act provides for an annual increase based on the increase in the cost of living.

Seven states announced minimum wage increases on January 1 including; Arizona, Florida, Montana, Ohio, Oregon, Rhode Island, and Washington. Colorado, Missouri and Vermont were pending. State minimum wages range from \$7.79 to \$9.19 per hour. Federal Minimum wage remains at \$7.25 per hour.

RCSC implemented the revised pay ranges that went into effect on January 1, 2013. As previously reported, the new pay categories and pay ranges were approved after an extensive review of comparable wages. Employees paid less than the new starting rates were increased to that amount on January 1.

Golf Report

Pro Shops

December revenue finished \$10,000 ahead of last year, representing an increase of 3.1 percent. Green Fee and Cart fee revenue carried the month, with an increase of \$12,000 over prior year. Merchandise sales were down \$1,600 and driving range sales were down \$1,200.

Lakes East/Lakes West is hosting the 5th annual Teal Ribbon Tournament January 31. They have 200 players registered; net proceeds will benefit the AZ Cancer Center, specifically Ovarian Cancer Research. The event consists of four separate 9 hole events played over both courses. Texas Roadhouse has sponsored the event this year and is providing a lunch following play.

Get Golf Ready classes have been very popular this season. Do to the increased demand , an additional class was added to the February/March schedule. There are still a few openings for March and April available, the classes are perfect for those that wish to take up the game or for current golfers wishing to sharpen their skills. The March classes begin March 11 and March 13, the April class begins April 8. Each class consists of four lessons designed to provide a beginning golfer with the basics of golf. The classes finish with a 9 hole round of golf attended by the teaching professional.

Golf Courses

Golf courses have completed the application of a pre-emergent herbicide. The primary targeted weed is crabgrass; however the product does control may other weeds.

The 2013 aerification/overseed dates are now available and will be posted on the sunaz.com website soon. Based on feedback from our members we will be aerifying Lakes West greens only once this year. We will still be removing the same amount of organic material. This will be accomplished by using larger tines in a tighter pattern. Overall recovery will be longer, for this reason the Lakes West aerification will not begin until July, to provide better growing conditions. If the trial is successful we will incorporate this process to all the courses in subsequent years.

Absent from the aerification/overseed schedule is North. The absence is due to the upcoming renovation. North will be available for play until December 1, at which point it will close. We expect the renovation of North to last through Fall of 2014. We are busy working through play schedules of the men's and ladies group that play North as their home course and will provide them alternate venues.

Snack Shops

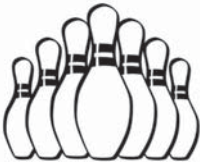

Frequently Asked Questions - What is RCSC?

What is RCSC?

The Recreation Centers of Sun City, Inc. ("RCSC") is a private, non-profit corporation which owns and operates approximately \$90M of recreational facilities in Sun City. RCSC manages a \$20M annual budget and employs over 275 employees, both full- and part-time. Over 70% of RCSC employees are Sun City residents.

What is RCSC's mission?

While all Sun City residents are not RCSC Cardholders and therefore may not be able to use the recreational facilities offered by the Recreation Centers of Sun City, it is the mission of RCSC to provide for all Sun City residents (should they choose to participate) the broadest range of recreational and social facilities possible to enhance their active lifestyle and well-being.

What does RCSC do?

RCSC operates seven recreational centers (Mountain View, Fairway, Oakmont, Lakeview, Sundial, Bell and Marinette), eight golf courses with five snack shops (South, Quail Run, North, Lakes East, Lakes West, Riverview, Willowbrook & Willowcreek), two bowling centers (Lakeview & Bell), two full-service restaurants which are leased (JiMichael's at Lakeview bowling center & Memo's at Bell bowling center), and one outdoor amphitheater (Sunbowl).

What doesn't RCSC do?

RCSC does not regulate or monitor private residences, streets, or medians in Sun City. Streets and medians are maintained by Maricopa County, although our local volunteer group, the P.R.I.D.E.S., certainly assist in the maintenance of the medians and the appearance of our community. RCSC is commonly mistaken as a governmental entity possibly because Sun City is not a city but an unincorporated part of Maricopa County.

Who regulates private residences?

The Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions ("CC&Rs" or "deed restrictions") for Sun City were revised and restated in 1998. Though not a part of RCSC, the Sun City Homeowner Association ("SCHOA") is responsible for enforcing these deed restrictions in Sun City. Because membership is voluntary and not mandatory in this homeowners association, SHCOA is not governed by Arizona Revised Statutes Title 33. Although membership is not mandatory, compliance to the CC&Rs by every Sun City property owner is required.

What are Sun City's age restrictions (Federal Age Overlay)?

Sun City is an active retirement community; the age limitation is built into the deed restrictions under the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 and the Arizona Fair Housing Act, collectively known as the "Fair Housing Acts." At least one occupant of each residential unit must be 55 years of age or older and no person under 19 years of age shall occupy or reside in a residential unit for more than 90 days in any 12 month period. SCHOA is responsible for enforcing the age restrictions.

What is a Facilities Agreement?

The Facilities Agreement, executed by each Deeded Real Estate Owner in Sun City, obligates Owners to pay annual property assessments to the RCSC whether or not Owners occupy the Sun City property or use RCSC facilities.

What is a RCSC Member?

RCSC Members are Deeded Real Estate Owners of property located in Sun City. Members must be a Sun City property owner 55 years of age or older (unless qualified under spousal exemption) and occupy the Sun City property as his/her primary Arizona residence unless his/her other Arizona residence is farther than seventy-five (75) miles from Sun City. If there are more than two Deeded Real Estate Owners per property who meet the qualifications for a Member Card, such Owners must decide which two of the Deeded Real Estate Owners shall be classified as Members. Up to two Member Cards may be provided for each property, provided there are two persons who meet the qualifications. Each individual qualified as a Member shall be issued no more than one Member Card, regardless of whether more than one Sun City property is owned and assessments and fees are paid. A multiple property Owner is not considered to occupy more than one property at a time. Each individual qualified as a Member is entitled to only one vote on each matter voted on by the Members.

What if the owner of the Sun City property is not an individual?

If the Deeded Real Estate Owner is a Trust, no more than two of the Grantors / Trustors / Settlers, or if deceased, no more than two remainder beneficiaries of the Trust may be deemed to be Members, provided that they meet the individual Member qualifications. If the Deeded Real Estate Owner is a Corporation, LLC, Partnership, LLP, or any other entity ("Company") that may represent non-individual ownership other than Trusts, the Company may select two of its shareholders or partners to be Members, provided that they meet the individual Member qualifications; and further provided that said individuals have an ownership interest in said Company.

What is a RCSC Cardholder?

RCSC Cardholders include two categories: Members and Privilege Cardholders. RCSC Members are defined herein. Non-Owners, renters, tenants, lessees, and/or occupants of property located in Sun City may be entitled to a Privilege Card

What is a Privilege Card?

A Non-Owner may be issued an 30 day, 60 day, 90 day or annual Privilege Card for a fee, as determined by the Board, provided: (a) at least one Owner or Non-Owner who occupies the property is 55 years of age or older; (b) the Non-Owner occupies the Sun City property as his/her primary Arizona residence unless his/her other Arizona residence is farther than seventy-five (75) miles from Sun City; (c) the Non-Owner is not under 19 years of age, and; (d) the property assessments and fees, where such Non-Owner resides, are current.
