

North Golf Course Renovation Project Architect's Report

Over the past couple of weeks, Tripp Davis has made two visits to the North Golf Course to review the ongoing renovation work

During the first visit Tripp Davis and Senior Golf Architect Gary Brawley spent much of the time working with Wadsworth Golf Construction's specialized bunker crew on the methodology and concept for the bunker edges, sand faces, points of access, desired finished look and long term maintenance of the bunker edges. Wadsworth Golf's crew leader started by taking the direction provided and building a portion of the bunker under the eye of both Tripp and Garv and then followed up by building the rest of the bunker for review by Tripp and Gary at days end.



During the second visit, Tripp Davis and Kyle Downs came from the Norman, Oklahoma office to join Gary Brawley and the TDA team worked to finish the front nine greens. Finishing the greens is a unique attribute that Tripp Davis personally does on every project, believing that the execution of the minor details in a green are what make the difference between good and great greens. Gary and Kyle work alongside Tripp and are constantly checking sand depths on the greens to insure that the science behind the construction method of the green is not compromised. In addition, Gary and Kyle are checking the percentage of slope on the greens to make sure that the desired slopes are being constructed and the designed strategic variety of future hole locations is being achieved.

Upon completion of the green surfaces by Tripp Davis, Wadsworth Golf will begin to work on the placement of the bunker liner, bunker sand and then the finish preparation of the areas of work in anticipation of planting.

Next month we will provide an updated summary of construction and provide additional information regarding the amount of work involved in the finish preparation of the golf course prior to planting.

Riverview Golf Course Closure Announced

Closely following the timeline of the North Golf Course project, Riverview will close this coming December for renovation.


The Riverview green committee had approved the master plan developed by Gary Brawley of Tripp Davis and Associates in 2012, prior to the decision to move up the North Renovation project.

The major focus of the renovation project will be the greens at Riverview. Prior to the development of the master plan, the greens went through an extensive surface analysis, using GPS technology a 2' x 2' grid was set up on each green. The GPS unit was programmed to take a ground shot every 2' or approximately every second. Upon collection of nearly 1,500 points per green, the data was imported into the most advanced surface modeling software on the market for analysis. This data was used in developing plans for greens that will allow for 60% of the putting surfaces to be suitable for pin locations, which is the USGA recommendation.

One of major changes will be hole #12. The green on this hole will be moved farther west, which will bring the lake more into play.

In addition to green work, bunker renovation will also be a major focus. The bunkers will be redesigned, drainage redone and new bunker sand added. Tees will be renovated as well.

To honor our commitment agreement with the Arizona Department of Water Resources, the entire irrigation system at Riverview will be redesigned and replaced. This will ensure that water will be used in the most efficient manner possible.



In this artists' rendition of the proposed hole #12 at Riverview, the fairway will be expanded to leave room for a second shot to be played away from the water and golfers will have the opportunity to save par with a chip and putt.

Upon proposing, Marlene questioned if she would need to give up golf. "No, I'll just learn how to play," was Don's reply. There was also a stipulation that she would never ask him to play cards, which she continues to do on a regular basis with her lady friends.



At the ripe young age of 90, Don decided to get serious about golf and took a few lessons with a Pro. He now spends three days a week on the courses here in Sun City – and does quite well. He does sit-ups every morning and climbs 17 flights of stairs for exercise during the months they're in Colorado.

A Moment with President Brasher - Miracles Without Debt

When I was fortunate enough to become one of the nine Directors on the Board of RCSC in 2012, I had no idea of the fantastic organization in which I was to contribute my time and effort. Having lived in Sun City full or part-time since 1999, I knew of the many amenities. Great golf courses at reasonable fees were becoming even better;

the seven recreation centers spread throughout the community offered pools, fitness centers, athletic opportunities; club facilities, and more things of which I knew nothing. As perhaps the majority of Sun City residents did, I had never given much thought to what was behind all of these opportunities to enjoy our leisure time.

After joining the Board of Directors I learned of what greatness an organization can accomplish with proper direction and leadership. Past Boards had formulated a plan to institute a Preservation Improvement Fund which was based on a fee charged to every new property purchase and/or transfer. For nearly fifteen years this PIF fund has been responsible for the many major improvements to the infrastructure of Sun City. The Fund has netted millions of dollars which the RCSC Board of Directors and Management have used judiciously to renovate and improve our facilities. PIF funds can only be used to fund improvements which cost over \$300.000 dollars and have a life expectancy of 15 years or more. Using these funds resulted in the remodeling of Bell Recreation Center; construction of our new Fairway Recreation Center; the current Oakmont pool renovation project; the expected improvements to Marinette Recreation Center and the Bell Tennis Center to be undertaken this year; and the soon to be reopened Bell Lawn Bowl Greens project.

In addition, due to problems with Viewpoint Lake leakage and our negotiations with the Arizona Department of Water Resources, PIF funds are being used annually to replace irrigation systems to improve water utilization on our golf courses. What a better usage of funds than trying to once again replace the lake's liner (which didn't work well the first time!).

All of the above major reconstruction projects would have necessitated a major debt or assessment of residents without our Preservation Improvement Fund. In Sun City's over fifty years of existence, special assessments have been avoided – a credit to managerial excellence.

In addition to the Preservation Improvement Fund for major projects an organization the size of the Recreation Centers of Sun City must have an operating budget to carry on the business of the Corporation on an annual basis. Funds for operating expenses are based primarily on the annual assessment levied on every Sun City property. These operating expenses include items such as utilities, maintenance expenses, salaries of our over 300 employees, repairs, vehicle and equipment expenses, operating supplies, and a myriad of other expenses necessary to conduct operations of a large non-profit corporation.

A recent publication of RCSC entitled "The Best of Sun City AZ 2013/2014" which has been distributed since January contains on Page 21 a comparison of community fees for similar senior adult communities. One can readily see that the Board and Management are using our residents' fees judiciously and that we continue to have the most amenities for the most reasonable fees of similar communities.

Attention to detail by RCSC Management and Staff will ensure that we who live here will continue to enjoy the "Miracles of Sun City Without Debt."

Updates

For those who heard/read my report last month, I talked about the interest other communities have shown in how we are accomplishing all that we are without incurring any debt. We plan to tell many others as well about Sun City's success as we are working on a marketing project at this time which will produce a 3-4 minute interstitial video of interest used to fill between programs to be broadcast over PBS throughout the next year. Plus we will also produce a 30 second TV commercial which will be broadcast primetime 50 times in select cities and a 5-6 minute education documentary about Sun City AZ which we can use however we choose to promote Sun City AZ. We want others to know that our sense of community that was the foundation for Sun City AZ for the past 50-plus years is the spirit that still thrives here today!

Financial Report:

While I make this comment consistently every month, I doubt that anyone gets tired of hearing that we have ended the month well within our operating and capital budget year-to-date. The fact that we do this month after month, year after year has a lot to do with our ability to state that we have the most facilities for the lowest annual property assessment of any community in the U.S. today! Last month I reported: "Golf's positive variance in its net operating excess is impressive and if this trend continues, we may see one of the best years ever in the golf division!" This month is even more impressive! Thanks to good weather and good management, our golf division has ended February with the largest positive variance to budget in my tenure.

Cardholder Services:

January billings went past due at a reduced rate of 5.9% which is the lowest rate in the past year. December balances went 60 days past due at slightly higher than average rate, although as a percentage, less of the 30 day balances went to 60 days past due than average. Total accounts receivable balance decreased again in February and is down by almost 5% for the year. This was the largest two month decrease in total accounts receivable in 2 years. Outstanding balances related to property transfers now represent 58% of all receivables due and 57% of past due balances.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties decreased in February due to a decrease in foreclosure activity and now is 39 for the end of February. The number of properties owned by lending institutions increased to 71 this month.

Resale transactions continued to be strong in February resulting in Preservation and Improvement Fees (PIF) being collected in February totaling \$525,000, which is 51% more than budget. Year-to-date PIF fees are \$1,090,100, which is \$490,100 over budget for the year. Remember that we intentionally budget PIF fees conservatively to assure that sufficient cash is on hand when PIF projects are scheduled so we can pay as we go and remain debt free.

Bowling Centers:

The bowling department is in the process of issuing contracts to all fall leagues to reserve lanes for the upcoming season, lock prices for the season, and ensure that all RCSC policies are understood. All leagues will see an increase of \$0.15 per game per bowler. At \$2.40 per game, RCSC still has the best value in the Phoenix metropolitan area.

The bowling department is also in the process of preparing for summer league startups which primarily start in May. This year several different types of leagues will be available: a pattern league where bowlers bowl on different lane patterns, a No-Tap league where if bowlers knock down nine pins it counts as a strike, and a Flex league where bowlers can bowl anytime lanes are available and not be committed to bowl at a certain time or on a certain day.

Columbia 300, a bowling ball manufacturer will have a Demo Day at Lakeview Lanes on April 12. Bowlers will have the opportunity to test new equipment and speak with representatives from Columbia 300. More information is available at the bowling centers.

For the past 25 years, the RCSC bowling centers have hosted the Sun City Open Bowling Tournament. This year, the 26th annual Sun City Open will be held at both RCSC centers on the weekends of April 26 and May 3. The tournament is open to all bowlers fifty years of age and older statewide and beyond.

Human Resources:

The March safety meeting focused on the new Globally Harmonized System of Classification & Labeling of Chemicals. As part of the Right to Know Standard (HCS), employers must have a written program, a list of hazardous materials in the workplace, Safety Data Sheets (SDS) for each chemical and acknowledgement of employee training. HCS Pictogram posters of hazardous chemicals were distributed to each work location for required on-site posting.

We have begun the 401(k) Plan valuation for the 2013 calendar year. Upon completion an independent auditor will audit the Plan and the IRS Form 5500 will be filed.

The employment section of the Corporation's website and Intranet has been updated to include any changes including the addition of the golf maintenance staff.

Updates

Member Services:

Del Webb Days was a blast! Hundreds came out to enjoy the games, the shows and the gourmet food trucks! You do not want to miss this free event for RCSC Cardholders and their invited guests, so mark your calendars now for next year, it will be the third Saturday in March!

The Sun Bowl Spring Series began Sunday, March 16 and what a way to start off the season with an Eagles tribute! Likely the largest crowd in Sun City AZ history, the 7,000 in attendance enjoyed every minute of it!

Project Updates

General Centers Projects and Information

The card access equipment for the Fairway installation has arrived. Meetings are being scheduled with dedicated clubs at Fairway to discuss the new systems and their room access needs and concerns. Once these discussions are completed and the software installed on the RCSC server, the installation of equipment will commence. This is expected to take place in early April 2014. The East entry door will also be addressed at that time and cardholders wishing to use that entrance will be notified about how to obtain their access clearance. Contractor is Multi Card Company. (Phase 1 Cost – \$52,000)

Mt. View Center

Concrete was poured for the (7) new pickleball courts at Mt. View on Tuesday March 18, 2014. Prior to the concrete pour, additional work had to be done to remove (5) large building footings buried years ago, replace electrical feeds to the Mt. View sign and flagpole light that was wired underground with romex wire, upgrade the fencing to accommodate wind loading for wind screens and install a trench drain to properly drain the existing tennis courts and the south side of the new pickleball courts. The cost of this additional work is reflected in the adjusted cost below. Please remember now that the post tensioned concrete is poured, there is a 28 day waiting period for the concrete to cure before the final colored top coatings can be applied. In the meantime, the contractor will be setting up the court lighting, pouring the small gathering area and doing some fencing work. The two tennis courts at Mt. View will remain open for tennis play and pickleball players are asked to use the Marinette Center courts during this construction. Contractors are Sunland Sports and CCBG Architectural. (Cost – \$288,580)

Recently a plugged sewer line was discovered at the restrooms by the Lawn Bowling green. This sewer line was damaged during the installation of one of the solar carport posts. The contractor for the solar project was notified and the line was repaired at no cost to the RCSC.

Oakmont Center

The Oakmont pool, spa and equipment room project continues to progress well. The pool structural steel has been installed and the shot-crete work is expected to be complete this week. The footings and stem walls for the equipment room addition are completed and the concrete floor is about ready to be poured. During this work it was discovered that the north

canopy wall has internal damage and structural issues. The fire system piping, which runs through this area is also a concern to the Sun City Fire Department. It was also determined that the footing on the South block wall was not structurally sound. Due to these conditions, the RCSC has decided to remove this north canopy wall and install a block and steel wall in its place. The South block wall will also be removed and a new block wall constructed. Due to this additional work the adjusted cost for this project is shown below. Contractors to date include CCBG Architectural, K.L. McIntyre Construction and Aquatic Builders. (Cost – \$620,855)



Lakeview Center

Construction of the upper and lower ramps for the east (red) entrance at Lakeview Center is completed and the ramps are expected to open for use sometime after the final inspection on Tuesday March 25, 2014. The improved ramps are expected to benefit cardholders and their guests by having a more gradual slope making access to the Lakeview facility much easier.

Cardholders and guests will also enjoy the new bicycle parking area equipped with bike security loops. Contractor is Ken McIntyre Construction. (Cost – \$120,975)

The Lakeview patio, located off the East side of the social halls is being resurfaced with an epoxy coating resembling flagstone. The resurfaced patio will provide a much nicer area for social gatherings such as the Mother's Day Brunch to be held May 11. Contractor is Desert Rose. (Cost – \$9,502)

Irrigation replacement on the Lakeview Hillside Park (Mountain) will commence April 15, 2014. The park will be closed to all cardholders and guests (including fishing) for about 6 weeks. The irrigation improvements will ensure that water reaches all plants and trees in the park thus making this setting more beautiful than it already is. Contractors are AAA Landscaping and Marvin Mills Irrigation. (Cost – \$100,000)

Riverview Pro Shop

A new standing seam metal roof is being installed on the Riverview cart barn. The new roof will match the one put on the pro shop last year. Contractor is Starkweather Roofing. (Cost – \$12,198)

Bell Center

Architectural drawings are now submitted to Maricopa County Planning and Development for the new Bell tennis project. Bid packets are being sent out to contractors and proposals are expected back in about 3 weeks. Once received, the project will be submitted to the RCSC bid commission for final approval. The project includes demolition of the current (8) tennis courts



and pushing out some of the existing block walls in preparation for (10) new tennis courts. The new updated complex will also include a shaded gathering area, courtside canopies with benches, water and electric to each court, tables and benches for spectators and planters in the common areas. Contractor to date is Lloyd Sports Engineering.

The replacement of (7) monument signs and installation of (2) additional monument signs is now completed. The new backlit signs are positioned around the center in front of each activity area. Contractor was Tag Team Signs. (Cost – \$39,710)

Two new shade sails will be installed in April at the Bell Lawn Bowl facility. The labor and materials cost for these shade sails has been generously donated to the RCSC. Contractor is Sun City Awning. (Cost – \$9,057)

Final preparations are underway for the re-opening of the Bell Lawn Bowl greens on Monday April 14, 2014. The new greens were constructed using Tiff Dwarf Bermuda grass and are expected to offer many years of Lawn Bowling enjoyment to cardholders and their guests.

Marinette Center

The Marinette expansion project plans have been returned to Maricopa County Planning and Development Department with the required changes and corrections and we are waiting to hear back from them. The building plans have also been sent out for Contractor proposals. Once the proposals are returned, in about three weeks, the project will be submitted to the RCSC bid commission for final approval. Contractor to date is CCBG Architectural.



On Monday March 10, 2014 the Marinette China Painters were relocated to Fairway Center and merged with the Fairway China Painters. The china painting clubs were very cooperative and a pleasure to work with, resulting in a very smooth transition.

Sun Bowl Ballfield

A new roof will be installed soon on the Ballfield restroom building. The new roof will replace the current one which is leaking and not properly vented. Contractor is Starkweather Roofing. (Cost – \$3,458)

Skilled Trades Department

The RCSC Skilled Trades department completed 97 work orders during the last half of February and the first half of March 2014. This total does not include other routine and specialized work completed outside of the work order system.

Grounds Department

The RCSC Grounds team has been working very hard to keep all Sun City properties looking spectacular. Even while short-handed they still managed to cut all grass at centers locations, cut and maintain the Sun Bowl Ballfield and Amphitheatre, mow, clean and roll the Lawn Bowling greens, kill off and haul away dead grass and weeds from the Sun Bowl retention area, prune and trim bushes and trees at various locations, perform a full day of clean up and maintenance at Duffeeland Dog Park and repair irrigation problems.

Right Plants Can Help Save Water

Xeriscape (pronounced "Zeer-i-scape") is a form of landscaping that utilizes native plants and has been around since, well forever, if you think about it. However, it was the City of Denver's water department where the Xeriscape concept was coined and trademarked in the late '70s and early '80s, a time when the City needed landscaping that was more eco-friendly to their drought-stricken area.



Xeriscaping is exactly what's happening in Sun City, thanks to the help of the Sun City Prides. The ornamental orange trees that have lined the medians on Del Webb Boulevard for nearly 50 years are coming out and drought resistant plants such as Lantana, Ocotillo, Little Johns, blue Agave, Fairy Dusters, Valentine Emu bushes and a mixture of cactus are replacing them. These new plants are all native to the area, thus require lower amounts of water.

Valentine Emu Bush

While some of the older fruit trees are declining in appearance, suffering from bark bleeding (a disease that promotes the growth of wood-rotting fungi) and drop sour, inedible

fruit at the end of the season, water conservation is still the primary force driving this landscape change. According to one source, mature citrus trees can soak up as much as 135 gallons of water per day. Another source states that if the ground around the tree is dry to the touch, then the tree needs water. Still another suggests to water only every five to seven days in the summer and ten days in the winter, but in copious amounts. Any way you look at it, that's a lot of water.

Comparative to the 135 gallons of water a day for a fruit tree, Lantana will use approximately one-half to one gallon of water per day, depending on soil type and weather; and Ocotillos take very little water once established, and not much between planting and establishing.

Xeriscaping can actually reduce landscape water usage by more than 60% and if done correctly, can be lush, colorful and easy to care for. There are seven principles to the Xeriscape concept: Planning and designing, limiting turf areas, selecting and zoning plants appropriately, improving the soil, using mulch, efficient irrigation and maintaining the landscape.

So if you're considering changing out some tired fruit trees or other landscaping that is looking rather shaggy and takes a lot of water, visit www.azwater.gov, type "plants" in the site search, and enjoy the wealth of information on drought tolerant plants. Then perhaps you should take a drive up Del Webb Boulevard and see how the Sun City Prides have not only helped beautify our Sun City, but how they are helping to conserve water for future generations. You may be able to borrow some Xeriscape design ideas and help do your part in water conservation.

- Resistance exercise focuses on individual muscle groups, taking them to fatigue through repetitions. If resistance exercise is done correctly, muscle strength improves and new tissue is formed. Because muscle moves the body and dictates metabolism, it is vital for balance, mobility and weight management, as the body ages. After age 50, it's important to do a balanced assortment of Resistance exercises, with appropriate breathing, form and rest segments.
- Stretching major muscle groups is imperative, because flexibility decreases as muscles tighten and shorten with age. This phenomenon adversely affects posture, gait, and other biomechanical movements."





She had to learn everything all over again - and I mean everything, walking, talking, math, writing, reading, everything. Mom stayed until Erin came home.

I was so grateful and told her so many times. Mom is gone now and I miss her every day but I have great memories.



referred to your doctor or a recommended Podiatrist. *Q. I have heard of over-pronation, but what does it mean and why is it a concern?*
