Marinette Center Now Fully Open to Cardholders

Marinette Center opened to RCSC Cardholders on March 23, 2015 after nearly nine months of extensive renovation that has Sun City's northern-most recreation center getting much attention and praise. A Grand Opening celebration is being planned for later this fall.



The line started forming early in anticipation of the 8:00a.m. opening as RCSC Cardholders were eager to see the renovated Marinette Center.

The Marinette renovation included expansion of the fitness center (to 4,000 square feet), 20 pickleball courts (of which eight are now covered) along with adjacent patio areas, relocation of the spa to outdoors, thermal solar system for pool water pre-heating, tankless water heaters for showers, water softening system, new doors and windows, and stucco on the exterior of the buildings.



The pool area at Marinette now includes outdoor spa and shower area along with additional seating areas for RCSC Cardholders to relax and enjoy time by the pool.

The state-of-the-art fitness center has been receiving rave reviews along with the pickleball pavilion and outdoor patio areas where the most common comment upon entering was simply, "Wow!" Have you been to the "new" Marinette yet?



Due to temperature concerns it took a few more weeks to complete the surfacing on the rubberized outdoor walking track, restricting access to the half-court basketball area and horseshoes. Cardholders are reminded that sports equipment is available at the Facility Attendant Station for their use.

Board Candidate Packets Available Next Month

While the RCSC Board of Director elections may be months away, it is not too early to begin thinking about giving back to the community by becoming a candidate for upcoming Board vacancies. There will be three vacancies to fill in this year's December election, with each vacancy being a 3-year term.

Candidate packets will be available for pick-up on Wednesday, June 3, 2015. Those interested in obtaining a packet must make this request in person at the Corporate/Board Office at Lakeview Center (lower level) and present their RCSC Member card. The deadline for packet submissions is no later than noon on Friday, October 2, 2015.

Requirements to become a RCSC Board candidate are:

- Must be at least fifty-five (55) years of age;
- Must not be related by marriage or birth to any other member of the Board, Senior

- Management Staff, or Board Candidate;
- Must be a Deeded Real Estate Owner of property in Sun City, Maricopa County, Arizona;
 - Must be a Member in good standing;
 - Must reside in Sun City, Arizona and be available at least ten (10) months of the year;
 - Must meet the requirements to hold an Arizona liquor license (RCSC holds liquor licenses which require Board officers to be included on the licensing);
 - Must be eligible and available to serve a three (3) year term; and
 - Must be available to attend Board Candidate Orientation(s).

Candidates must also submit a fully completed RCSC petition, signed by 100 or more Members in good standing, along with all other forms provided in the RCSC Candidate Packet.

- A successful candidate will:
- Have a strong desire to serve Sun City;
 - Be fair and courteous;
 - Use good common sense;
 - Have good communication skills;
 - Be willing to work as part of a team;
 - Ability to prioritize - policy and projects; which will have the greatest benefit for the most members; and
 - Be willing and able to dedicate the necessary hours to be an effective Director.

Candidates will be introduced at both the October and November Board meetings and at two candidate forums that will be held in the fall. Forum locations and dates will be announced at a later time.

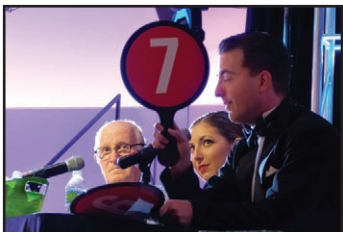

Golf Report

Pro Shops

February rounds played for all courses posted the 2nd highest total since 2009 and posted 462 more rounds than last year. Year-to-date rounds remain behind the prior year (due to January weather). Despite January performance year-to-date, rounds remain on pace with the prior eight year average.

The first annual Can/Am event was well attended with 100 participants. The field was evenly split with 50 participants each, representing America and Canada. In the end the American team prevailed by a margin of 26 strokes. Participants enjoyed a Texas Roadhouse catered dinner following play at the Fairway Center. The second annual event has already been scheduled for March 10, 2016; we are hoping to have a full field of patriotic participants.

The demo day on March 9 proved successful, with over \$1,000 in sales for the day. Well over 100 golfers came out to test equipment from Orlimar, Mizuno, Wilson and Cleveland. We thank everyone for their attendance and remind everyone that we can match prices on current year equipment with most vendors, which supports golf in Sun City.

We have scheduled our first night golf event of the season for April 25, at Lakes East Golf Course. Check-in will begin at 6:00 p.m., dinner will be served at 6:30 p.m., and play will begin at 7:30 p.m. The cost of the event is \$30 (includes dinner, first night golf ball, night golf accessories, prizes and more). Applicable green fees will be paid on the day of play. Sign-up sheets are available at each pro shop.

Snack Shops

Additional play and good weather continue to help snack shop performance as well. Total revenue for the month was \$5,187 ahead of budget. We continue to thank everyone for their support of the snack shops.

Golf Courses

The Riverview project remains on schedule, with irrigation complete on the front nine and in process on the back nine. Gravel blankets for the greens are in place on the front nine. We have taken advantage of the warm weather and have begun irrigating areas of disturbance from the construction wherever possible. Full grassing will begin late May or early June, once stable summer temperatures are reached. Grassing will be complete in July.

The new well at Lakes West has completed the airlift and development stage and the large rigging has been taken down. The next stage will be testing and determining the proper pump size for the new well. Once this process is complete, the pump will be ordered and work will begin on the required infrastructure.

We received test results back for the lake on hole 17 at the South Course. The brown tint is a result of type of pennate diatom named Achnanthes. The algae is brown in color and can result in a change of water color if found in significant numbers. We have contacted our lake specialist to provide treatment.

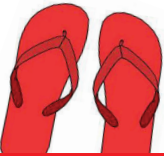

Bowling Lane Mapping Project Update

Perhaps the most controversial area in the sport of bowling is lane conditioning patterns and how they affect lane play and the scoring pace of any tournament or league-play session. Some of the inconsistencies from week-to-week and day-to-day have nothing to do with the oil pattern, but can be attributed to other factors such as the lane surface, lane shape, other bowlers, temperature, dew point, barometric pressure, humidity, etc. Most of these factors are beyond our control.

Each year the United States Bowling Congress (USBC) performs an annual inspection of the bowling lanes. Each lane is measured at three different points for cross-tilt, depressions and crowns. USBC regulations require these measurements to be 40/1000 of an inch or less. USBC does not measure topography. The shape (topography), of the surface can dramatically change the bowling ball motion. Technology is evolving all the time, and via reports and graphs produced by Kegel LaneMapper™ (see photo), it has become possible to study topographical conditions of bowling lanes in an easy understandable and readable way. The Kegel LaneMapper™ is able to measure crowns, depressions, crosswise tilts, and lengthwise level to an accuracy of 1/1000". Kegel LaneMapper™ can measure at any distance interval and across every board, including the pin deck area; and can record 744 measurements in about 12 minutes per lane. This is almost 70 times the number of measurements taken during the annual USBC lane inspection.



On April 20, 2015 Lane Analytics began the task of mapping the lanes at both RCSC Bowling Centers. Lane Analytics suggests lifting the panels and shimming under the original wood lane and panels to level the entire lane surface which will make the lanes play more consistent from day to day and lane to lane. The project did not require closing of the bowling centers.

In light of all of this, it is important to remember that bowling has always been about repeating good shots and accuracy, but it is also about "reading lanes" and making the right moves. Today, perhaps more than ever before, there are more choices to consider. There are far more lane surfaces, lane oils, bowling balls, and types of bowlers that can alter the bowling environment around you.

Architect's Report

Riverview Renovation Update

Wow, it seems like only yesterday that we started construction and now we are a couple of weeks until we start grassing.

Shaping of the golf features is complete and the lead shaper is now working on the construction of the bunkers. I personally paint all bunker lines and work closely with the shaper to make sure we get the site lines, lines of play out of fairway bunkers and depths correct.

The last couple of holes of irrigation are being completed. We are now completely running off of the new irrigation system and no longer rely on the old system to deliver water. The new west lake is filled and pump station is operable.

Greensmix is being installed on the balance of the greens and the contractor is soaking the profile to remove any pockets and voids before finishing the greens prior to planting. I will also closely review all the green surfaces, checking the slopes on all the greens to make sure the construction of the intended pinnable areas is correct. This is also our last opportunity to make any minor changes to the surface that will improve the playing experience.

Although the existing grass is growing and it looks like we could start planting today, we really want to wait until the soil temperatures reach a three day period in which it remains above 70 degrees. Bermuda grass likes it hot and humid so it is important to wait so we are not wasting time and effort and nursing the grass along until it is ready to really jump.

The golf maintenance staff has a good plan for the grow-in of the golf course so as soon as the temperatures heat up I think everyone will see a big difference.

Lawn Bowling News

Mrs. T Goes the Extra Mile for Sun City

Around the RCSC's offices she is lovingly known as Mrs. T; but on the lawn bowling greens, everyone simply calls her Helen. She has been a regular on Sun City greens since the mid 1970s. Helen and her husband both took a liking to the game of bowls, got lessons at Oakmont and began what has now become a storied second-half lifetime of involvement with lawn bowling.



Back in those early days when Helen started bowling, there was some 1,400 bowlers in Sun City. Club's were open every day and competed with one another for bowlers. Over the years, the game has evolved. Now club's work together with each having assigned days and bowlers moving about if they want to bowl every day. The numbers of bowlers has dropped, most likely because there is so much to do in Sun City. Like every club, the competition to attract new members is an ongoing challenge.

Those challenges are ever present and ongoing, and the commitment to keep the game alive is something lawn bowlers understand. Helen has made that commitment for 40+ years; and what makes Helen's efforts different rings out in that old adage: "Put your money where your mouth is." She has epitomized the values behind Sun City in that she has donated near on a half a million dollars to maintain the lawn bowls buildings, the care of the greens and the outside social areas. When a piece of equipment is needed; she is quick to write a check to cover the cost. Virtually every lawn bowl club has benefitted from her generosity.



But those monetary donations only tell half the story. Because beyond the checkbook, Helen has added so much more to the game. On the other side of 90, Helen still plays, stills gives back at tournaments, at special club fun days, and especially during open club bowling. Her "treats" are almost as legendary as the cash donations she has made. And they don't stop on the bowling green. General Manager Jan Ek noted how Helen often stops by the offices and "brings things we shouldn't be eating."

On March 30, approximately 150 lawn bowlers gathered at the Bell lawn bowling green's to honor and celebrate Helen; both as a long time bowler and for the incredible efforts she has made to keep lawn bowling alive and flourishing in Sun City. The breakfast saw RCSC board members and staff present to share with the lawn bowling community a chance to recognize this diminutive first lady of lawn bowling. A plaque honoring her was installed on the Bell bowls building, but more importantly the recipients of her generosity had the chance to collectively say "thank you."

Sun City is the kind of place that exists only because of what people living here are able and willing to give back to make it something special. In Helen's case, she's gone that extra mile and for that the community and especially lawn bowlers owe her a debt of gratitude.

Updates

Financial Report:

As is customary, we have ended February 2015 well within our operating and capital budget. Despite remaining slightly under budget in golf revenue, the golf division would be under budget overall except for repair and maintenance (R&M) expenses related to an issue with the 103rd Avenue well that put the golf division over their budget in R&M by \$68k at the end of February. This may be potentially remedied by insurance claims but, at this time, it reflects as operating expense. All other divisions have ended February 2015 within their respective operating budgets.

Cardholder Services:

Payments on past due assessments were lower in February compared with January. Past due assessments still decreased in February by over 3%. January billings went past due at a rate of 3.4% and December balances went 60 days past due at a rate of 2.4%. Both of these are the lowest rates ever for these balances. Past due annual property assessments are at their lowest level since January 2013. Payments from our third party collections firm have totaled \$24,712 year-to-date in 2015. This is 40% of the total collected in all of 2014 and five times the amount collected for the same time period last year.

Total accounts receivable increased in February by 1.5% with the increase being mostly attributed to property transfers. In February, property transfer related balances increased 4% and lender owned related balances increased 7%. Outstanding balances related to property transfers now represent 54% of all receivables due and past due balances.

Payments made by Cardholders through the online RCSC Web Portal in February totaled \$53,754. This is again the highest monthly total for online payments with March payments tracking greater than this amount. The online payment process is fully integrated with payments made through the web portal being posted to Cardholder accounts immediately. This is a great convenience option for Cardholders and allows for payments to be made outside of our regular office hours.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties decreased to 47 properties at the end of February. The number of properties owned by lending institutions stayed relatively unchanged in February and is now at 42 properties.

Preservation and Improvement Fees continued the strong start for 2015 and \$462,000 was collected in February, which is \$114,000 over the amount budgeted. Year-to-date PIF fees are \$947,000 which is \$347,000 over budget for the year. Again, a reminder that we intentionally budget PIF income very conservatively to assure that we have the cash on hand for any planned project as we remain debt free.

Bowling:

Replacements of masking units, which are panels in front of the pinsetters, were approved for the

2015 operating capital budget. Director of Bowling Operations Randy Johnson met with the Bowling Committee on March 5, 2015 and presented the available designs for the upcoming installation. The Committee and Randy agreed that the “Southwest” design would blend with the décor at both RCSC Bowling Centers.

The cost of the masking replacements is approximately \$25k and will be ordered at the end of April 2015 so that installation can begin during the summer season. Installation will be performed by the technical staff of the bowling center for a cost savings of \$3,500.

Replacement of the lane underlayment (support under the synthetic lanes panels) at Bell Lanes was also approved for the 2015 operating capital budget. Bids have been requested and hopefully the project will be scheduled by the end of April for installation in late summer of 2015. The replacement of the underlayment will

require closing Bell Lanes for a period of seven to ten days.

Human Resources:

As the months of renovation and construction work at Marinette Center drew to a close and opening of the center became a reality, H.R.'s priority task was to assist with staffing. RCSC's normal practice during a closure is to find positions within the corporation for employees whose jobs are temporarily eliminated and provide the option to return upon re-opening. With appropriate planning by the supervisory staff, all employees who wanted to remain working were placed in positions at various RCSC facilities and now have the option to return to their original facility. Returning those employees to their former positions means recruiting and hiring for the positions now being vacated, as well as finding additional staff for the renovated and expanded facility. In the past two weeks we have added 18 individuals to RCSC staff.

Total number of new hires year-to-date is 34. Currently there are 369 employees on staff, both part- and full-time.

Project Updates

General Centers Projects and Information

• The electronic sign project is now complete. Electronic sign project contractors included: Bootz and Duke Signs, Accel Electric and the RCSC Information Technology Department. (PIF Cost – \$850,775)

Viewpoint Lake / Duffeeland

• Eric Swanson, RCSC Viewpoint Lake consultant, is currently working with volunteers to install pea gravel in the shallow water around the perimeter of Viewpoint Lake. These gravel sites will be used by fish for spawning purposes. This particular habitat process is moving very slowly due to the weight of the gravel and slow boat speeds required to maintain a safe delivery to each location on the lake. A spring fish delivery is set up for April and May 2015. Fish deliveries will include channel catfish, largemouth bass, copper-nose bluegill, red-ear sunfish and white amur; threadfin shad are not available so we will be building up bluegill population. If you would like to volunteer for the Viewpoint Lake habitat project please call the RCSC corporate office at 623-561-4600 and add your name and phone number to our volunteer list.



• Assembly of contractor bid materials is still underway for the Duffeeland project. The bid materials will be sent to various contractors so they can bid their respective portion of the project. Currently, the target date for commencement of this project is May 2015.



Bell Center

• The Bell tennis courts are completed except electrical transformer and breaker panel work and coating of the three South courts. Coating of these courts was to commence March 19 but due to the rains, had to be rescheduled again. As soon as the electrical work is complete, we will begin calling for Maricopa County and Sun City Fire inspections. Hole #4 on the mini golf course was reopened

to cardholders this month. The tennis project includes demolition of (8) tennis courts and installation of (10) new tennis courts. The new updated complex will also include a shaded gathering area, courtside canopies, water and electric to each court, tables and benches for spectators and planters in the common areas. Contractors include Lloyd Sports Engineering as architect and project manager and Sunland Sports as building contractor. (PIF Cost – \$1,778,074)



Marinette Center

•Marinette Center re-opened on Monday, March 23, 2015. This included all areas except the track, basketball and horseshoes due to application of the rubberized track coating which is estimated to take about four weeks. Contractors for this project include: CCBG Architectural, Robert Porter Construction, Regional Paving and Aquatic Builders. (PIF Cost – \$4,709,422)

Sun Bowl Amphitheatre

• Eight concrete tire blocks were removed around the restrooms building and break-away post bollards were installed. This was done to prevent tripping since the cardholder traffic around the restrooms and food area is heavy. This work was completed by the RCSC Skilled Trades Department. (Material Cost – \$800)

Riverview Pro Shop Building

• The Riverview patio project continues to move forward with grading completed, wall footings poured and block work nearing completion. During removal of a section of the old patio, it was discovered that the meeting room on the South end of the building was formerly a covered patio with columns placed on a slab, with no footings. This means that a portion of the walls must be removed in order to pour new footings, which will properly support the new roof structure. Final approval was given by Epcor Water for the new Riverview fire line connection to their water main. Project improvements include new covered patios off the East and South sides of the existing building, a fire sprinkler system, parapet wall and roofing work, ceiling replacements, new lighting, new flooring and other interior renovations. Contractors include Ken McIntyre Construction, Accel Electric and CCBG Architectural. (Cost – \$524,236)

Willowcreek / Willowbrook Pro Shop Building

• The four outside entrances leading into the pro shop and snack shop have been repaired. Contractor was Baker Brothers Carpeting. (Cost – \$3,207)

Skilled Trades Department

• The RCSC Skilled Trades department completed 120 work orders during the last two weeks of February 2015 and the first two weeks of March 2015. The RCSC skilled Trades department also assisted with preparing Marinette Center for its re-opening.



Lake Management Plan Stays on Track with Fish Delivery

Volunteers have been hard at working building and placing fish habitat into Viewpoint Lake under the guidance of consultant Eric Swanson. Pea gravel has been added around the perimeter of the lake to provide spawning areas and additional hanging habitat has been placed on docks around the lake.

A delivery of fish stock from Arkansas arrived last month to further enhance the sport fishing opportunities for RCSC Cardholders. The chart to the right shows the species, size and amounts that have been stocked.

Bluegill and redear sunfish should be “voluntarily” released throughout the spring and summer. By keeping more adult sunfish of 5-7 inches in the lake during the April through August spawning seasons, we will be able to substantially increase the population of these sport fish and food fish (for bass) in the lake. Currently, Viewpoint Lake fishing regulations allow for 5 bluegill and/or redear sunfish per day.

All largemouth bass under 13 inches must be released immediately per current Viewpoint Lake regulations. Anglers may keep one bass 13 inches and over daily (we encourage release of these higher quality bass as an act of “recycling” fish for future enjoyment).

Water Conservation

Check Your Home for Water Leaks

We have mentioned in many of our water articles about how repairing a leaky faucet or toilet not only saves money on water bills, but also helps conserve water. But what about those leaks you don't see? How would you know if your irrigation system has a small leak? Here is one sure way to check for a leak in your home or in your irrigation system.

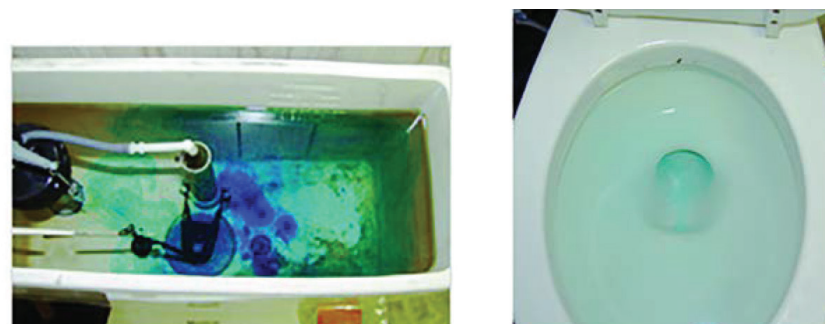
Step 1: Start by turning all water-using appliances off, both inside and outside your home, including: sinks, tubs, washing machines, pool auto-fillers and all other appliances that use water. Turn off the controller to your irrigation system and manually close the two double check valve assembly (DCVA) to isolate the irrigation system.



Step 2: Remove the lid to the water meter box and lift the meter's protective cover. Meters are usually equipped with either a red disc or a silver and black disc, commonly called a "leak indicator." If this is spinning, there is a leak in your system. If your meter is not equipped with an indicator, simply watch the meter dial hand. If it's moving, there is a leak; if the dial hand is still, make note of its position and check the meter in ten minutes. If the dial hand remains in the same position, your system is intact and no leaks are present. Movement illustrates a slow leak and you should continue with the following steps.

Step 3: Locate the main shut-off valve to the house (usually located near the meter box). Turn off the valve. By turning on a faucet inside the house, you should be able to drain the pipes, causing the flow to the faucet to stop. If water continues flowing from the faucet after several seconds, the shut-off valve is not working.

Step 4: Turn off the faucet if necessary and return to the meter. If the leak indicator is still moving, it means there is a leak between the meter and the customer-side shut-off valve. If the water is still flowing inside at the tap but the meter is not moving, you could have a leak the shut-off valve and the house. Check toilets, washing machines, faucets and other possible places for any leak.



To check your toilets, simply add a few drops of food coloring to the tank while the reservoir is still filling following a fresh flush. Wait about 15-20 minutes and check the bowl. If the food coloring has bled through to the bowl, the flapper valve needs replacing.

Checking your home for leaks not only saves you money right now, it also helps to preserve this precious resource for generations to come!

Sun City Gives Back -

The young students were intrigued by the method of decoration which involved fluffy clouds of shaving cream on top of wax paper, into which they swirled colors of their choice, and then rolled the white eggs.



Each pair of eggs was numbered inside, so that the right eggs could be returned to the correct student. The Club teams also assisted the class room teachers, Sue Bartram, Lori Murphy, and Ellen Turner, to decorate a slightly larger egg for themselves. After a few minutes, students and teachers carefully rinsed their eggs and Club members prepared them for transport back to the Club.



Club members were very busy over the next couple of weeks glazing the decorated eggs and getting them fired at 1700 degrees Fahrenheit in the Club kilns. Several extra eggs were also prepared by Club members, in case some children had been absent during the first visit.

On Monday, March 23, fourteen Club volunteers returned to Luke Elementary, with each student's two eggs in a baggie with Easter greetings from the Club. The completed eggs were stunning, in swirls of pastels, or in colors bright and bold, like agate or jade. The students and teachers were thrilled with the results, and proudly posed for more pictures with their beautiful treasures.

Tips for Seniors from Daily Fitness - Common Misconceptions about Exercise

"When we work with clients, we often hear misconceptions about exercise," states personal trainer Dick Fortier. The ones heard most often include:

- Stretching before exercise is important! – "Warming-up" is important before exercise because it increases blood flow to the muscles. This can be done with simple leg lifts & arm circles, or a 5-minute casual walk on the treadmill. Flexibility stretching, which involves holding a stretch, is more effective and safer if done after exercise, when muscle tissue is warm and pliable. Stretches that are held (static stretching) lengthen and de-stabilize fibers, making them less prepared for the strain of a tough workout.
- Ab Crunches will get rid of belly fat! – Doing ab crunches will firm up abdominal muscles, but will not specifically burn belly fat. "Building muscle anywhere burns fat everywhere." A full body workout that builds muscle everywhere will be more effective in reducing belly fat, than a workout that focuses only on abdominal muscle tissue.
- You have to lift a lot of weight to build muscle! – As an aging adult, the technique and form you use when lifting is more important than the amount of weight you lift. Taking muscle fibers to fatigue requires an understanding of the concentric, isometric and eccentric motions of the lifting muscle, and the importance of cadence with these motions. As muscle gains strength and mass, additional weight can be added to challenge it further.
- Exercise turns fat into muscle! – Reducing body fat and increasing muscle mass are individual processes. These processes can occur simultaneously, if an individual is exercising correctly. A well-designed program that includes both strength training and cardio exercise will result in more "lean weight" and less "fat weight," over a period of time.
