# **Web Portal and Elections Update**

# **RCSC Elections and Web Portal**

RCSC Cardholders continue to sign up for the new RCSC Web Portal in preparation for this year's Board of Director elections which will be held completely online.

Electronic voting will allow members to vote from any computer, anywhere - whether they are out of town or right here in Sun City. Safeguards restricting each qualified member to only one vote will be in place and confidentiality will be maintained throughout the process. Eligible RCSC Cardholders will have access to the election portion of the portal beginning one month prior to Election Day starting on November 11. For any members without access to a computer, in-person voting will be held at Lakeview on Election Day (December 10) from 8am to 4pm.

Candidates will be introduced at both the October 31 and November 21 Board meetings. Two candidate forums are scheduled: November 11 at 6:00pm in the Marinette Auditorium and November 19 at 1:30pm in Fairway Arizona Rooms 3-4. The forums are a great opportunity for Members to meet and talk with the candidates. Look for more details on the candidates and the forums as the election process continues.

# **New Email System Update**

As part of the web portal rollout, RCSC is also using a new email system to communicate with Members. All Cardholder email prefer-

ences were brought into the new portal and emails were sent to members with information on managing their email preferences. If you have not been receiving recent RCSC Email Alerts, you are urged to contact the Cardholder Services Office at the Lakeview Center or by calling 623-561-4603 to confirm that your current email address is in the system. In addition, Cardholders are advised to add tegcampaigns@tegcampaigns.totalegolf.com and rcsc@sunaz.com into their address books to avoid emails from RCSC going directly into Junk Email folders.

# **Updates**

### **Financial Report:**

All divisions are within their year-to-date gross income budget excluding the golf division, which was \$150k under its budgeted y-t-d gross income, a \$15k increase in negative variance from June month end financials. All divisions are under budget for their wages, taxes and benefits and general operating expenses y-t-d. As of July 31, 2013 we have spent \$1,033,382 less than budget in repairs and maintenance y-t-d, however, as I have explained many times previously, this is to be expected as project completion runs behind budget to ensure that sufficient funds are available. It is important to recognize that this \$1M+ positive variance will not remain as projects are finished. Overall the corporation has operated within its budget for the 2013 fiscal year.

### **Bowling Centers:**

In August, bowling management met with all league Secretaries and Presidents. Director of Bowling Randy Johnson updated league officers on policy or procedural changes. Representatives from the Metro Phoenix USBC also attended and provided awards and rule updates.

Leagues are coming in stronger than originally anticipated. The Sun City Scratch Classic league increased from thirteen teams to twenty-two teams requiring them to swap bowling centers with a smaller league. The Thursday night Sun City Scratch Classic league is becoming one of the most elite leagues in the Metro Phoenix area. Many of the bowlers on the league average over 230. Several of the bowlers are also members of the Professional Bowlers Association. We are expecting several high games and series during the season, so if you are in the area of Lakeview Lanes next Thursday, stop in and see some serious bowling.

### **Cardholder Services:**

The payments on past due assessments fell in July and were consistent with monthly averages over the past year. June billings went past due at a rate of 7.2%, and also are right on the monthly average rate. June balances went over 60 days past due at monthly rate of 5.2%, which is 13% above average. Outstanding balances related to property transfers increased by just over 5% in July and represent 53% of all receivables due.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties reduced again to 50 for the end of July. The number of properties owned by lending institutions remained steady at 87 this month.

The Preservation and Improvement Fees collected in June were \$519,000. Year to date PIF fees are \$4,227,440, which is \$1.7M over budget year-to date. PIF budget is

Here in Sun City we are fortunate to have a great number of organizations manned by dedicated volunteers who help keep our community the great place in which we live.

As we go about our daily activities we routinely see the results of their efforts. Our streets are neater and trimmed vegetation more eye-appealing thanks to the Sun City PRIDES; when we visit Banner Boswell Hospital we can't escape the attention to our needs by their army of volunteers from the time we exit our vehicles through the reception area and to our final destination; in the Sun City Visitors Center volunteers are eager to answer questions and provide detailed information about the area; and nearby in the Sun City Library volunteers assist visitors and staff in the used book store. Often overlooked are the dedicated residents who staff the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum housed in one of the first of five model homes built here which provides a great overview of our community's history. We must also recognize the efforts of our volunteers who work with Sun City Meals on Wheels to provide essential meals to many housebound residents.

Committee volunteers work quietly behind the scenes and are of immense value in helping our Board of Directors make decisions. We encourage all interested residents to consider becoming members.

One of the most popular regular events in Sun City is the Thursday Night Bingo thanks to the efforts of the Sundial Men's Club. Their hard-working club members volunteer time to put on this weekly event, working tirelessly throughout the evening to ensure an enjoyable time for everyone. # **Setting the Record Straight**

This past year, a new website came online - http://talkofsuncity.com/forum. php - which is a unique online gathering place for all things Sun City. Posters leave any number of threads on a wide variety of topics. One particular thread prompted the rebuttal below entitled "Setting the Record Straight," written by Bill Pearson (not as an RCSC Board Director but as a private citizen) in an "attempt to educate, inform and give people the opportunity to make up their own minds" regarding RCSC issues being discussed on this website. With his permission, this is being reprinted in its entirety.

I danced around issues in the Let's Talk thread but rather than continue the Arizona two-step, let's get real. I want to be clear: I am doing this as a public service to those participating in this forum and as a resident of Sun City and not a board member of the RCSC.

Rather than posting snippets of the Articles of Incorporation to make arguments supporting claims I am trying to get buy-in for, I will post the link to the Articles and also cut and paste the pertinent ones. Using bits and pieces almost always works...at least until we look at them in their entirety.

We've been told how the RCSC is violating its own "rules." Interesting when you consider the boards making those decisions did so in conjunction with the attorney who helped formulate them a good number of years back. Seems some feel they know better than both the boards that did it and the attorney that advised them.

But let's dispense with the banter and get to it. The two main charges are the RCSC is spending money without a vote of the membership and that we are treating residents "unequally." Both serious allegations on its face, but what do those pesky Articles of Incorporation really say?

First off, we keep hearing the RCSC can't spend more than \$750,000 without a vote of the membership. Here is the article they site: Article X - The highest amount of indebtedness or liability, direct or contingent, to which the Corporation may at any time subject itself shall be limited to \$750,000 or any greater amount which may be authorized by three-fourths (3/4) of the Members present at a duly called and noticed meeting of the membership, or in such amounts as may be authorized by the Arizona Corporation Commission.

So what does this mean? Simple, the corporation cannot incur debt of more than \$750,000 without a vote of the members. Back in 1999 the RCSC Board of Directors saw the amenities aging and understood there would come a time when replacing them would be essential to preserving the way of life we all enjoyed. There were options and one of them was to ask residents to yearly vote on assessments to remodel, repair or replace them. It would have been disastrous and left the community in ruin.

# **Project Updates**

### **General Centers Projects / Information**

 All Photo Voltaic (PV-Electricity producing) systems are completed and only the connection of the monitoring system remains on a few systems. Cardholders continue to express their appreciation for the solar canopies which provide shaded parking during this hot

### Mt. View Center/Sunbowl Ballpark & **Amphitheater**

- The Mt. View pool lighting system and mini golf pole light is underway with the footings installed. Contractor is Accel Electric. (Cost -\$40,000)
- Mt. View Center pickleball court expansion project is approved. RCSC will be replacing the existing (4) courts and adding (3) courts in 2013. All (7) court surfaces will be constructed using post tension concrete. A final court plan has been developed and drawings are currently in production. The drawings will be submitted to Maricopa County for a building permit and to contractors for bid proposals. Once bids have been received, project will be sent to the RCSC Bid Commission for final approval.
- Sun Bowl Ballfield project is complete and grass is filling in nicely for upcoming play-

ing season. Contractors: Wadsworth Golf Construction Company and Western Fence. (Approximate Cost - \$200,848).

• Sun Bowl Amphitheater project is nealy complete with only the exterior painting remaining. Contractor: Wadsworth Golf Construction, Accel Electric and Ironwood Gates and Welding. (Cost - \$245,883)

### **South Golf Maintenance**

• The replacement 6,000 s.f. Maintenance building is nearly complete with fire system and new electrical service yet to be completed. The new building will be more fire retardant, offer improved mechanic and maintenance areas and increase security for storage of valuable golf equipment. Contractors include Bunger Steel, Inc, Jokake Construction and CCBG Architectural. (Budgeted Cost – \$600,000) (After insurance)

### **Oakmont Center**

• Remodeling work continues on Oakmont shower rooms. Project includes new flooring, wall tile, toilet partitions, vanities, lockers, light fixture change outs and water extractors for the swim suits. Contractor is Ken McIntyre Construction. (Cost - \$194,808)

### Fairway Center/Quail Run

· Slump block wall repair made following damages caused by a motorist who veered off the roadway on Grand Avenue and took out section of Quail Run wall. Good news is we receivee payment from the motorist's insurance company for the amount of the repair. Contractor was Ken McIntyre Construction. (Cost - \$4,900)

### **Lakeview Center**

- · Mini golf and lawn bowling restroom remodels are complete. Contractors include **RCSC Skilled Trades Department and Interior** Logic Flooring. (Cost \$33,774)
- Permits are being obtained to install Ultra Violet Light Systems on the pool and both spas. New systems will reduce chlorine usage and further eliminate any bacteria in the pool/spa water. These systems are part of the RCSC's Healthy Swimming program and have proven effective at Fairway and Sundial pools. Contractor: Aquatic Environmental Services. (Cost - \$100,000)

### **Bell Center**

• Renovation of the two Lawn Bowl Greens Center is nearly complete as the sprigging of Tiff Dwarf Bermuda grass is complete and growing in nicely. Pole lighting maintenance underway and the installation of shade canopy will occur soon. Contractors: Ken McIntyre Construction, National Turf, Accel Electric and Wood Bay Turf Technologies. (Cost - \$484,308)

- Replacement of the last (4) clay tile mansard roofs, with standing seam metal roofing material is now complete. Contractor: Starkweather Roofing. (Cost - \$28,185)
- Tile flooring in kitchen, dishwashing area and back freezer room at Memo's Café removed and red quarry tile installed. Also, the 100 gallon water heater and ice machine were replaced. Contractors: Puckett's Flooring and Sunland Plumbing. (Cost – \$14,500)
- Ultra Violet Light Systems on both pools and spas will be complete soon. New systems will reduce chlorine usage and further eliminate any bacteria in the pool/spa water. These systems are also part of the RCSC's Healthy Swimming program. Contractor: Aquatic Environmental Services. (Cost - \$102, 178)

Site and floor plan drawings are on display for cardholders at various centers, including Marinette, Bell, Sundial, Lakeview and Fairway.

# **Skilled Trades Department**

always done very conservatively to assure that cash funds are available for all budgeted projects.

# **Human Resources:**

RCSC and other employers in Arizona are concerned about the rising cost of Workers' Compensation insurance and carriers providing coverage work closely with employers to control claim costs. Effective loss management and loss control practices rely on the immediate notification of claims. As a result, RCSC employees are trained to report any work related injuries/illnesses immediately to their supervisors and the HR department so claims management begins immediately as well. Year-to-date we have had a total of seven reported claims with three being closed and four remaining open. Medical costs of \$32,560 and lost time wages of \$5,743 have been paid to date. Lost time wages have been kept to a minimum due to RCSC's return to work/light duty program and is an important source in controlling costs.

On July 2, 2013, the Treasury Department and the White House announced in separate blog posts that the Pay or Play Rule (also called Employer Shared Responsibility) is delayed for one year. The surprise announcement was extremely welcome news for employers which had been working quickly to come into compliance. With the delay, the Rule will now be effective in 2015.

In summary the Rule requires employers with 50 or more fulltime-equivalent employees to provide acceptable health plan coverage or face a tax penalty. The blog post states that the delay was needed to coordinate the Rule's penalties and requirements with additional reporting rules. No guidance has yet been issued and we continue to watch this legislation.

As in 2011, Aetna was required to rebate part of the premiums it received in 2012 because they failed to meet the "Medical Loss Ratio" standard of spending at least 85% of the premiums on health care services. Early in July, RCSC received a rebate check from Aetna for the calendar year 2012 in the amount of \$4,132.89. The funds were allocated between the RCSC and the employees who were covered by the health insurance on which the rebate was issued, based on the respective proportion of the premium

amounts paid by each. Employees received their share of the rebate in checks issued Friday, August 30, 2013.

# **Golf Report**

### **Pro Shops**

July revenue fell \$15,500 behind budget, Prepaid Green Fees constituted \$5,903 of this deficit. Daily Green Fees/Cart Fees fell \$8,807 behind budget and Driving Range revenue fell \$1,018 behind budget and Merchandise revenue fell \$247 behind budget.

Total Operating expenses in July were \$5,265 under budget and Total Cost of Sales were \$351 under budget. As a result of these savings Net Operating Excess was trimmed to a \$9,884 deficit for the month.

In July the pro shops and cardholder services began collecting donations for the families affected by the Yarnell Fire and the 19 fireman that lost their lives fighting the fire. In addition to the donations a fundraising tournament was held on August 2nd, with 102 participants. In all RCSC was able to raise nearly \$1,900 in donations. As a result of the statewide fundraising effort the Southwest Section PGA was able to raise in excess of \$100,000 for the affected families. We thank everyone that participated in the event or placed a donation in one of the boots.

### **Snack Shops**

Snack shop revenue followed golf course revenue and missed budgeted revenue by \$3,036, bringing the YTD revenue deficit to \$14,071. Expense control has enabled the Snack Shops to exceed their YTD Net Operating Excess budget by \$1,773.

### Courses

The bunker renovation at Willowbrook has been completed and the back 9 is open for play; we do not expect the front nine to be open for play prior to overseeding. The course has been rated as being slightly more difficult following the renovation. The USGA course rating was raised to 58.7 from 57.8 and the USGA slope rating has been raised to 89 from 84.

In preparation for overseeding rough heights will be raised beginning in August and continuing through September. Higher rough heights are necessary to provide a better playing surface in the rough once the Bermuda enters dormancy. Fairway heights and green heights will also be raised prior to overseeding.

Palm tree trimming has been completed on all courses, with the exception of North. North will not have the palm trees trimmed this year due to the upcoming renovation.

All courses are spraying for weeds, including Nutsedge. As the Nutsedge dies it will turn a noticeable yellow. In addition all courses will begin spraying a pre-emergent to control winter weeds.

As a reminder, North Golf Course will not undergo overseeding this year, due to the upcoming renovation. As a result the North course will remain open during the entire overseeding process. Conditions at North will be largely dependent on the weather, particularly in November. Golfers can expect the course to play hard and fast as the weather turns colder.



Strength Training is a form of exercise that increases muscle tissue, therefore increasing the body's glucose storage capacity and metabolic rate. As we age, we not only lose muscle but gain fat, especially the deep visceral fat that is linked to diabetes," notes Fortier. "Recovery from exercise is fueled primarily by fat, so the more strength training and aerobic exercise a person does, the more fat is burned 24 hrs a day."

Getting started with exercise is often the hardest part. Daily Fitness trainers can help with that. They design programs that address needs, goals and medical issues. # **Museum Reveals Expanded Marinette Display**

Visitors to the Del Webb Sun Cities Museum now walk first past images of the early community located on land, which was to become Sun City, as they enter the small 1960s model home located at 10801 W. Oakmont Dr.

The Museum unveils "Where It All Began - Marinette," an expanded exhibit covering the years 1895 to 1959. The new display in the living room of the smallest model home to open on January 1, 1960, was mounted after the museum closed for the summer in June.

The wall display is divided into three time periods and is illustrated with old photos, many of which were provided by Amanda Durand, who grew up in Marinette and still lives in the Sun Cities. The last panel describes the area in which her parents ran the General Store, and many family photos add a personal touch to the displays. A grant from the Arizona Historical Society made the display possible.

Museum hours are from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday until enough volunteers are available to provide guides five afternoons weekly. Please allow at least 45 minutes to tour the historical displays, which include a short promotional film from the 1960s.



# **Water Usage Facts**

Here in the desert Southwest, we all need to do our part in helping to conserve water. Below are some water facts for you to consider:

- Humans use more and more water each year.
- Americans use five times the amount of water that Europeans use.
- Humans daily use about 50 gallons of water.
- A person pays about 25 cents for water use on a daily basis.
- Two thirds of the water used in a home is used in the bathroom.
- To flush a toilet we use two to seven gallons of water.
- In a five-minute shower we use 25 to 50 gallons of water.
- To brush your teeth you use two gallons of water.
- For an automatic dishwasher nine to 12 gallons of water is used.
- Saving a bottle of cold water in the fridge is better that taking it from the tap, because it saves time and water.
- While brushing your teeth, instead of leaving the tap running, you should fill up a glass to rinse your mouth.
- Baths use less water than a typical shower. Soaking in a partially filled tub will
  use less water than a short shower.
- The average person spends less than 1% of his or her total personal expenditure dollars for water, wastewater, and water disposal services.
- Less than 1% of the water treated by public water systems is used for drinking and cooking.
- Bottled water can be up to 1,000 times more expensive than tap water and it may not be as safe.
- Today, at least 400 million people live in regions with severe water shortages.



Instead they looked at the history of Sun City and used a Del Webb technique incorporated in its earliest design. Every house he built had an impact fee attached to it. In essence he had the buyers pay for the amenities when they purchased their homes. In fact, each subsequent phase had higher fees as amenities grew more lavish. When he deeded them to the community, he simply gave us back what those owners had paid for at point of purchase (and got DEVCO out from under having to manage/run them).

It was in 1999 when the board passed what we now know as the Preservation and Improvement Fund (PIF). It started at \$700 and has increased to its present day \$3,000. The simple fact is the PIF has insured Sun City would never incur any debt because we pay for those improvements with cash in hand...hence no need to ask members to vote as we are incurring no indebtedness. It was a stroke of genius and done so as to avoid passing costs on to those least able to afford it. And, was almost identical as to how Webb funded Sun City's amenity package.

The second round of moaning is about how every member has to be treated "equally." Mind you, I love equality as much as the next guy, but ultimately we have to go to the written word to see what it really says (I am posting the often sited Article 8 Section 5 as the one that cries for equality):

Article 8

5. The Bylaws of the Corporation shall prescribe the qualifications of Members and the terms of admission to membership, provided that the voting rights of all Members shall be equal and all Members shall have equal rights and privileges, and be subject to equal responsibilities. Such Bylaws shall also provide the method for determining assessments to be paid by the Members.

When reading it one can easily get caught up in some imaginary intentions but the language is clear on its face. The by-laws are the document that define

membership and determining assessments. Those are to be set by the board and cannot be in opposition to the Articles of Incorporation. It does say that the voting rights of all Members shall be equal (they are, one member, one vote) and all Members shall have equal rights and privileges (they do as their membership gives them access to the facilities, clubs and other amenities).

What it doesn't say is everyone will pay the same amount. I know some folks want it to say that, but the language giving the board the right to set the level of assessments is without question within their purview. The reality is during the life span of the RCSC, various boards have waffled back and forth on single lot assessments versus a per person payment. I personally hate to see that type of bouncing around and hopefully our current structure is the one we will stay with.

There's way more, but frankly I have devoted more time and effort to this discussion than it deserves. People have the right to disagree and to state their opinion, but doing so by posting half truths and portions of the documents is wrong (perhaps even more wrong than begging for money so we can sue ourselves).

Here is the bottom line in Sun City: We have been a self-governed community from almost our earliest beginning. There's been 1000s of Sun City residents who have given freely of their time and talents to make it what it is today. It has been an evolution of growth and change the experts said would be an abysmal failure. They were dead wrong, and after 53 years, we have stood the test of time and are arguably the best value in the country. We have the most amenities at the least cost and virtually every day we update them with little or no cost to those who have lived here the longest.

I hate to be blunt...but Sun City is that darned good.
