Governor Jan Brewer Signs Cart Legislation

Sponsored by the Sun City Home Owners Association and co-hosted by RCSC, the event was also attended by State Representative Debbie Lesko (R-Dist. 21) who spearheaded this legislation after being contacted by concerned citizens, Maricopa County Supervisor Clint Hickman and Sheriff Joe Arpaio.

"This is a great day for golf cart drivers and we have the citizens of Sun City to thank for bringing this issue to my attention," Lesko stated.

The gathering crowd was entertained by members from the Sun City Ukulele Club prior to the start of the "parade of appreciation" before moving indoors for the ceremonial bill signing.



Golf Report

Pro Shops

Total rounds increased in June slightly over prior year, with 15,530 golfers braving the summer heat. Year-todate rounds remain well ahead of prior year and ahead of recent averages.

Once again this year we will participate in Patriot Golf Day. Patriot Golf Day was organized, with the help of PGA of America, to raise funds for the Folds of Honor Foundation. The money raised is used to fund scholarships for spouses and children of military service men and women killed or disabled while serving our country. Starters will be collecting donations through the pro shops until September 1. In addition to our normal fundraising efforts, we will be hosting a Skins game on August 29, open to all golfers, proceeds from the event will be added to our fundraising efforts. The event begins at 7:00a.m. with a shotgun start.

Snack Shops

Snack Shop revenue benefitted from increased play, exceeding budgeted revenue by \$2,400. Snack Shop hours beginning in September are 6am to 3pm.

Courses

The bunker renovation at Quail Run is complete, in all 6 bunkers were removed, 5 were rebuilt and 1 new bunker was added. In addition, some tee work was completed on holes 4 and 5, as well as drainage work on hole 5. The overall plan was to increase playability in the bunkers. To date reviews by Quail golfers have been positive.

Aerification on all the courses went well (except Riverview which was not done this year) and have made great recovery this year. We are always looking for ways to minimize the impact that necessary agronomic practices have on course playability. Changes made to our aerification process this year were designed with this in mind, including moving to one dual aerification.

July and August are great months for growing grass. We make every effort to keep up with the growth, however any minor disruption to staff or equipment can lead to quick deterioration of cut quality and height.

The North Course renovation continues to move forward and is currently on schedule. The greens are undergoing their fertilization program and are responding as expected. Greens are currently being hand mowed two times per week. The mowing frequency will be increased in August to four times per week. Some areas of disturbance have been identified as needing additional sprigging. These areas are scheduled to be re-sprigged the week of August 4th.

Bowling Fun Facts - Did you know...

- The circumference on bowling balls (used in USBC certified competitions) is a minimum of 26.7" and a maximum of 27.002."
- Maximum ball weight is 16 pounds. There is no minimum weight.
- Pin weights vary between 3lbs. 6oz. and 3lbs. 10oz.
- Pin height is fifteen inches, each pin is a distance of 12 inches from its neighbor and a proper strike comes into contact with four pins the 1, 3, 5, and 9 pins.
- The length of a lane is 60 feet and the width is 41 inches, excluding gutters.
- A "292" is the rarest score to get.



- Leaving only the 5, 7 and 10 pins standing is called "The Stooges."
 A bowling ball strikes the lane with an impact of
- A bowling ball strikes the lane with an impact of 1800 pounds per square inch.
- Lane surfaces are (or should be!) level within 40/1000 of an inch.
- A "messenger" is a pin that shoots across and takes out the final pin.
- You may want to kick THIS bucket when four pins are left standing in a diamond shape cluster, it's called a"bucket."
- 70 million people bowled at least once in 2011.
- Bowling balls were made out of wood until around 1906, when the composition became rubber. The 1960s and 70s revolutionized bowling with production of plastic and polymer balls
- The youngest person to bowl a 300 game was Chaz Dennis at the age of 10 years, 2 months in Columbus, OH.

Time is Running Out Candidate Packets Due October 1

The deadline for submitting a completed Candidate Packet for upcoming RCSC Board of Directors elections is rapidly approaching. If you're considering putting your hat in the ring, you may want to stop in at the Corporate/Board Office and pick up your packet as soon as possible. The Corporate/Board Office is located on the lower level of Lakeview Center.

In order to collect a packet, you must inquire in person and present a valid RCSC Member card. In the packet you will find an RCSC petition that needs to be completed by obtaining 100 or more valid signatures (signatures from RCSC Members that are in good standing). The completed petition, along with other forms provided in the Candidate Packet, must be submitted to the Corporate Office no later than noon on Wednesday, October 1, 2014.

Requirements to become a candidate are:

- Must be at least fifty-five (55) years of age;
- Must not be related by marriage or birth to any other member of the Board, Senior Management Staff, or Board Candidate;
- Must be a Deeded Real Estate Owner of property in Sun City, Maricopa County,
- Arizona as well as a resident of Sun City;
- Must be a Member in good standing;
- Must reside in Sun City, Arizona and be available at least ten (10) months of the year;
- Must meet the requirement to hold an Arizona liquor license;
- Must be eligible and available to serve a three (3) year term; and
- Must attend Board Candidate Orientation(s).

A Board Candidate that withdraws from his/her candidacy for any or no reason may not elect to re-establish candidacy in the same election year.

A successful candidate will:

- · Have a strong desire to serve Sun City;
- Be fair and courteous;
- Use good common sense;
- Have good communication skills;
- Be willing to work as part of a team;
- · Ability to prioritize policy and projects; which will have the greatest benefit for the most members; and
- Be willing and able to dedicate the necessary hours to be an effective Director.

Candidates will be introduced at both the October and November Board meetings (held on the 4th Thursday) and two candidate forums will be held in the fall. Dates will be announced at a later time.

A Moment with President Brasher - Changes Help Sun City Grow

Controversies have always been present in Sun City, and many have led to positive changes for the community.



Even something as mundane as the subject of walking dogs in the medians of streets south of Grand Avenue was a contentious issue in the earlier days. It took a petition drive in favor of the practice to get the homeowners association to approve the practice, which continues until today. Perhaps those medians were the original Sun City dog parks.

In the 1980s some 30 members started a movement to ban smoking in our recreation centers. It was eventually a ballot question and a smoking ban was enacted. Later in that decade the pro-smokers were successful in getting the issue on the ballot. The smoking ban was confirmed – and continues to this day; recently, e-cigarettes were in included in the ban.


When Sun City was formed, deed restrictions prohibited children under age 19 from living in our homes. In 1983 it was noted that these

restrictions were not strictly enforced. A few concerned residents mounted a door-to-door campaign to obtain signatures of 75% of Sun City residents and took the issue to the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors who established the senior overlay we still enjoy today.

A major controversy erupted in Sun City in the early 1960s when some residents agitated for Sun City's incorporation. The subject persisted for many years and the issue was last apparently settled in 1992. We remain an unincorporated island in Maricopa County, benefitting from their attention to our road and traffic needs as well as protection by the County Sheriff's Department.

The issue of whether Sun City should be operated under Arizona State Statutes Title 10 or Title 33 is still viewed as contentious by at a least a small minority of residents who wish to challenge the status quo. Even a brief review of the statues will affirm the appropriateness of operating under Title 10.

While being recognized as a showcase for the performing arts for decades, even the Sun Bowl has had its share of controversy. In 1980, when DEVCO's John Meeker proposed the RCSC could take it over for \$10, the matter was hotly debated. A two dollar fee increase was

proposed for operations but was strongly opposed by some members. The case was finally settled in 1984 and the Sun Bowl remains under the control of RCSC. The venue is very popular not only among our residents but also among many in the surrounding communities, resulting in many residents being concerned about the number of non-residents who attend our free shows. Sun Bowl shows are advertised as free only to RCSC Cardholders and their guests, but under the pres-

ent configuration (open seating, no fences, etc.), we welcome all who attend without attempting to turn away anyone. The Sun Bowl is viewed by many as a great "marketing" tool for Sun City, and the seasonal Sunday night shows often play to capacity crowds.



All of the above controversial subjects and more have contributed to the excellent situation we now enjoy in Sun City. The future will surely see many more changes as the RCSC Board of Directors and Management consistently strive to maintain and improve facilities and ensure our residents continue to have the best quality of life available in any active senior adult community.

Updates

Financial Report:

Since there is no monthly Board meeting in the month of July, I will include the Treasurer's report information in my monthly report. The balance of unrestricted funds as of June 30, 2014 was \$11,221,061 which includes a \$2.5M cash reserve. Restricted funds include the Preservation and Improvement Fund ("PIF") and the Capital Reserve Fund. As of June 30, 2014, PIF had a balance of \$11,363,501 plus \$575,260 collected in June that was transferred into the PIF account the first part of July 2014. The Capital Reserve Fund had a balance of \$1,500,044 as of June month end.

We have completed our second quarter well within our operating and capital budget year-to-date. Matter of fact, every division has a net operating positive variance from budget.

Investment Report 2nd Quarter 2014: RCSC's Investment Policy (Board Policy 33) is stringent in its requirements with the priority of investment objectives to be placed in this order: 1) safety, 2) liquidity, and 3) yield.

At the end of the second quarter, the Franklin Templeton unrestricted money market fund had an ending balance of \$5,013,843.98 and the restricted Franklin Templeton money market fund had an ending balance of \$7,840,962.66.

As of June 30, 2014, RCSC had invested in three fixed income funds: Franklin Adjustable U.S. Government Securities Fund Class A, Franklin Low Duration Total Return Fund Class A, and Franklin U.S. Government Securities Series Class A.

At the end of the second quarter in unrestricted funds, RCSC had invested \$2,500,000 into the aforementioned four fixed income funds with an ending value of \$2,513,439.69 as of June 30, 2014, showing a .54% increase in value of \$13,439.69.

At the end of the second quarter in restricted funds, RCSC had invested \$5,000,000 into the aforementioned four fixed income funds with an ending value of \$5,080,002.09 as of June 30, 2014, showing a 1.6% increase in value of \$80,002.09.

Cardholder Services:

Payments on past due assessments in July were reversed from June and were above the monthly average for the past year. June billings went past due at a rate of 6.2% and continue the trend of being below the rate for the same month the prior two years. May balances went 60 days past due at a rate of 3.2%. This is below the monthly average for the prior year, which reached the lowest level for the 60 days past due rate in the past three years.

Total accounts receivables increased by 3.8% in July. This increase is most attributable to the increase in accounts receivables related to property transfers which increased by over 12% in July. Current receivables, those not past due, for property transfer related balances increased by 90% in July due to a significant increase in property transfers this past month. Outstanding balances related to property transfers now represent 55% of all receivables due and 51% of past due balances.

Trustee sale notices on Sun City properties stayed steady at 49 properties at the end of July. The number of properties owned by lending institutions increased slightly in July and is now at 59 properties.

Preservation and Improvement Fees (PIF) collected in July totaled \$441,000, which is 47% more than budget. Year-to-date PIF

income is \$4,185,238, which is 65% over budget for the year. Remember that we intentionally budget PIF income very conservatively to assure that we have money available prior to the onset of any capital projects budgeted for PIF.

Human Resources:

In an effort to control costs and to protect RCSC's assets which includes employees as well as property, accidents and incidents are investigated by teams of employees to: determine what happened; why it occurred; what caused it; identify any deficiencies; take immediate corrective action; and look for new and better ways to perform and to communicate expectations. During the month of July, five accidents/ incidents have been under review, and have been resolved.

Project Updates

General Centers Projects and Information

• As part of the permit process for electronic signs, the RCSC is currently seeking to obtain set back variances so the signs can be set closer to the property line. The total project is expected to be completed in early 2015. Contractor is Bootz and Duke Signs. (PIF Cost - \$782,103)

Mt. View Center

• The stage flooring in the Mt View auditorium will receive termite and water damage repairs and will be sanded and refinished the week of August 18, 2014. Contractor is Enmar Flooring. (Cost - \$10,000)

Oakmont Center / North Pro Shop



• The Oakmont pool/spa, equipment building and Facility Attendant Station project has been completed and reopened to cardholders on July 11, 2014. Contractors included: CCBG Architectural, K.L. McIntyre Construction and Aquatic Builders. (PIF Cost -\$777,069)

• Permits have been approved by Maricopa County Planning and Development for the North Golf patio cover project. Demolition of the old patio cover is now completed and the block work is about 80% complete. The new larger patio cover will provide shade for more golfers to enjoy time together. Contractors are CCBG Architectural and Ken McIntyre Construction. (Cost - \$167,505)

Quail Run Maintenance

• The repaving of the Quail Run maintenance yard is now completed along with the cement pads for bulk sand and materials storage. Contractor was Regional Paving. (Cost – \$34,135)

Lakeview Center / Viewpoint Lake

• Planning and scheduling is underway for construction of the fish habitat for Viewpoint Lake this fall. If you have not signed up to help out with this very important project, please call the RCSC Administration office at (623) 561-4600 and put your name and contact information on the list.



In addition, there have been delays in getting the threadfin shad (forage fish for bass, bluegill and catfish) due to a supplier inventory shortage. Once quantities are available, the shad will be delivered and introduced into Viewpoint Lake.

Sundial Center/Riverview Pro Shop/Lakes Maintenance

• The (2) layers of roofing over the Sundial auditorium and vestibule were removed and a new coated built-up roof was installed. Contractor was Progressive Roofing. (Cost - \$234,775)

• Floors in the auditorium and East/West Halls were repaired, sanded and coated with polyurethane. Contractors were Enmar Flooring and Coit Cleaning Services. (Cost - \$35,862)

• During the month of August 2014, new partitions will be installed between the auditorium and East/West Halls. Contractor is Hufcor Az, Inc. (Cost - \$98,430)

Bell Center

• The RCSC has acquired the permit for the Bell tennis project and demolition is scheduled to begin August 4, 2014. The project includes demolition of the current (8) tennis

courts and the installation of (10) new tennis courts. The new updated complex will also include a shaded gathering area, courtside canopies with benches, water and electric to each court, tables and benches for spectators and planters in the common areas. Contractors include Lloyd Sports Engineering as architect and project manager and Sunland Sports as building contractor. (PIF Cost -\$1,778,074)



• The two 100 gallon domestic hot water heaters, providing hot water for the showers inside the fitness building, have been replaced with (5) new Rinnai tankless water heaters. This tankless technology is working out very well on the outside pool shower rooms at Bell so the same equipment was used again to replace the two inside shower room water heaters. Contractor was Sunland Plumbing. (Cost - \$22,280)

• Lighting control cabinets and switches were installed at the Bell social halls to eliminate the use of circuit breakers to control the lighting and allow staff to lock the equipment rooms. Contractor was Supercharge Electric, Inc. (Cost - \$22,590)

Marinette Center

• The Marinette Center expansion is progressing nicely with demolition, sewer main, fitness building footings and stem wall all completed. The Marinette Center expansion and renovation project includes a 4,000 s.f. fitness center, rubberized outdoor

walking track, a total of 20 Pickleball courts, an outdoor spa, thermal solar systems for pool water and shower water pre-heating, new doors, new windows and exterior stucco of all remaining buildings. Contractors to date include: CCBG Architectural, Robert Porter Construction and Aquatic Builders. (PIF Cost - \$4,387,373)



• Bids are being received and preparations underway to remodel the Marinette Clay club including new sinks with clay traps, enlargement and re-organization of kiln room, electrical work, expansion into the former china paint room and some new shelving and cabinets.

Skilled Trades Department

• The RCSC Skilled Trades department completed 172 work orders during the last half of June 2014 and the 1st half of July 2014.

Grounds Department

• The RCSC Grounds Department, which includes the Lawn Bowling greens, has been reassigned to the RCSC golf division under the leadership of Golf Director, Brian Duthu. While I really enjoyed working with this team I know that Brian and his head superintendant David Dube will utilize their turf-specific training and expertise to further enhance the RCSC properties.



Water Conservation: Use it Wisely

More water saving tips and tricks to consider. What we don't use today will be there tomorrow - and for future generations!

- 1. While staying in a hotel, or even at home, reuse your bath and hand towels.
- 2. When running a bath, plug the bathtub before turning on the water. Adjust the temperature as the tub fills. If you prefer a shower, check to see if your shower fills a one-gallon bucket in less than 20 seconds. If it does, replace the showerhead with a WaterSense® labeled model.
- 3. When washing your hands, turn the water off while you lather.
- 4. While you wait for hot water, collect the running water and use it to water plants.
- 5. Turn off the water while washing your hair and save up to 150 gallons a month.
- 6. If your toilet flapper doesn't close properly after flushing, replace it.



7. Consider installing an instant water heater near your kitchen sink so you don't have to run the water while it heats up. This also reduces energy costs.

8. Cook food in as little water as possible. This also helps it retain more nutrients.

- 9. Select the proper pan size for cooking. Large pans may require more cooking water than necessary.
- 10. Soak crusty pots, pans and dishes instead of rinsing them under running water and scrape dirty dishes rather than rinsing them before washing.
- 11. Consider hiring a plumber to re-route your greywater (wastewater from baths, sinks, washing machines and other kitchen appliances) to trees and plants rather than the sewer line. Check with your city and county for codes.
- 12. When you give your pet fresh water, don't throw the old water down the drain. Use it to water your trees or shrubs.

13. Collect the water you use while rinsing fruit and vegetables



14. To measure sprinkler output, catch water in an empty tuna can. 3/4 to 1 inch of water is enough to apply each time you irrigate.

and use it to water house plants. For hanging baskets, plant-

ers and pots, put ice cubes on top of the soil to give your

plants a cool drink of water without overflow.

- 15. Use 2 to 4 inches of organic mulch around plants to reduce evaporation and save hundreds of gallons of water a year. Proper pruning can help your plants user water more efficiently. While fertilizers promote plant growth, they also increase water consumption. Apply the minimum amount of fertilizer needed.
- 16. Plant in the spring and fall when watering requirements are lower. Water dry spots by hand instead of letting the irrigation system run longer. Set a kitchen timer when using the hose as a reminder to turn it off. A running hose can discharge up to 10 gallons per minute.
- 17. Signs of over watering: Leaves turn lighter shades of green or yellow, young shoots wilt, and sometimes algae or fungi grow.
- 18. While cleaning sidewalks, the preferable method is to use a broom. If you feel you must "wash down" the driveway or sidewalk, keep in mind that a hose and nozzle use 8-12 gallons of water per minute. A pressurized Waterbroom® uses closer to 3 gallons. Check them out online; there are a multitude of styles and prices.


