## From the Board: News & Notes

Beginning this month, SunViews will feature even more news and information from RCSC. But instead of more full-length articles, information will be presented in a news briefs format. We believe this will allow people to browse and find the information that is important to them more quickly, and allow us to provide as much information as possible to keep cardholders better informed about the happenings at RCSC.

**2011 Board Election:** Candidate packets available July 5. Pick up in person at Board Office at Lakeview Center. Must have RCSC Card. Four seats up for election: 3 three-year terms and 1 one-year term. More information: [boardoffice@sunaz.com](mailto:boardoffice@sunaz.com) | 623-561-4620.

**Medians.** Residents constantly contact RCSC about the medians in the southern section of the community (like those along 107th Avenue) asking about water usage and general maintenance of these areas. County officials are working on installing irrigation in one area and they are continually studying whether to keep grass or convert the medians to desert landscaping. The issue is that residents love the grass, but it is expensive to water the large swaths of grass. At the May 26 Board Meeting, Sun City resident Jim Powell

shared that county officials spend roughly \$150,000 a year on water for the medians and is testing a new sprinkler system that should save water and money. Over the long term, the county will look into shrinking the size of the grassy area by possibly combining grass and desert landscaping, with desert landscaping on the sides adjacent to the street and grassy areas in the middle.

**Golf cart crossings.** In a recent meeting with county officials, the Board discussed a few issues related to golf cart crossings. Firstly, the Board explained RCSC's efforts to repair the North Golf Course crossing on 107th Avenue. The head of the county transportation department apologized for any delays and failures to communicate on the project and has since taken steps to ensure the project gets done in a timely manner. Secondly, the Board brought up the issue with marking golf cart crossings as regular street crosswalks, which has created safety concerns because some vehicles stop for carts to cross while others do not. County transportation officials said they would look into the matter and explore other options to mark the crossings so they are not as confusing.

## Board of Directors News & Notes

**Sun City walls.** According to county officials, responsibility for walls around Sun City depends on where the wall is situated. If residents have questions about walls around their residence, they will need to obtain a surveyor to confirm property lines.

**107th Avenue south of Grand Avenue.** Anyone who has driven around the intersection area between Oakmont Recreation Center and Fry's grocery store knows what a challenge it can be. The numerous turns and stops can be extremely confusing and therefore, presents a safety concern for our community. The director of Maricopa County Department of Transportation has agreed to immediately pursue a safety study as the first step toward possible resolutions.

**Golf carts and white stripes.** The reason some streets in Sun City have solid white stripes along their sides is to deter people from thinking the wider streets have two lanes, which they do not. County officials have told the Board that the stripes are appropriate and necessary because of this reason, and that golf carts may move over into the marked area when other traffic comes up behind them. County officials said they have no plans to change any of the stripes because they are appropriate for their purpose.

**Transportation.** A void has been left in the community since Sun Cities Area Transit (SCAT) shut down operations this past year. Benevilla hosts a meeting on transportation for the Northwest Valley region and RCSC is involved with these meetings. The Board asked if Maricopa County could send a representative to these Benevilla transportation meetings, and county officials agreed. Transportation is an important issue to not just Sun City, but the entire Northwest Valley region. At the May 26 Board Meeting, resident Jim Powell shared that the state is in the middle of a comprehensive \$250,000 study of the region's transportation needs. The study should be completed within the next 18 months or so.

**Permit process.** We have received comments from several vendors and contractors expressing hesitation to bid on Sun City projects because of the county permit process. Maricopa County officials have said they feel that they have resolved many of the permit process issues that existed in the past and have expressed their willingness to work directly with us to resolve any future issues that may arise. They also encouraged residents and others to contact the county directly with any concerns about a specific permit if they believe there are any unnecessary delays.

**ZIP code 85373.** This ZIP code issue is a federal matter and RCSC will look to become involved with other groups that have already taken the lead on it, such as the Sun City Visitors Center.

**State Reps. & Corporation Commission.** In addition to meeting with Max Wilson and Maricopa County officials, the Board recently sat down with state representatives Debbie Lesko and Rick Gray, as well as Gary Pearce, Chair of the Arizona Corporation Commission. At this meeting, we discussed legislative actions, bills and utility rate proposals that may have an impact on Sun City, such as Southwest Gas Company's current rate case which includes decoupling and another APS rate hike request forthcoming.

**Board Meeting Summary:** At the May 26 Board Meeting, the Board of Directors approved changes to Board Policy #4 Board Meetings & Member Exchanges that changed the name of the "Morning After" report to "Board Meeting Summary," which is more representative of what is included and expanded the areas where the summary will be posted. The Board Meeting Summary is a summary of the most recent Board Meeting and is posted at RCSC facilities and on the corporate website. It is also emailed to subscribers of the RCSC Email List.

**Irrigation as-builts and evaluation of green surfaces:** The Board of Directors approved a motion that will continue RCSC's process with developing master plans for each of the golf courses and therefore, approve that irrigation as-builts be established by Marvin Mills for Riverview at a cost of \$19,500, and the evaluation of green surfaces and preparation of the master plan be completed by Gary Brawley, senior golf architect for Tripp Davis & Associates, at a cost of \$13,000.

**Board Policy #12A & Lawn Bowls:** The Board of Directors approved changes to Board Policy #12A Chartered Clubs Rules & Regulations that deal with events sponsored by the various lawn bowling clubs. Per the changes, all special events and tournaments sponsored by the lawn bowling clubs will be submitted and approved by the Lawn Bowling Advisory Committee instead of the Club Organization Committee.

**Press interviews:** Changes to Board Policy #19 Press & Media approved by the Board at its May 26 meeting provides the process that will be used by the RCSC Board of Directors and staff for interviews with the press and media.

## Human Resources News & Notes

**Hiring:** RCSC has hired 24 individuals since the first of the year to fill vacant positions. All new hires go through an orientation process that includes completion of documents required for payroll purposes and for compliance with federal, state and local laws, such as withholding forms, right to work in the US forms, acknowledgements of receipt of corporate policies and safety rules to name a few.

**Safety:** As of the end of May, seven employee injuries have been reported with four of those being minor requiring first aid only. The other three required medi-

cal attention and/or time away from work and have an impact on our worker's compensation insurance rates. Managers and supervisors strive for an accident-free work environment and regularly conduct safety training with employees.

**Policies:** Recently the Full Time Employee Benefits Manual has been reviewed and updated to comply with changes in several labor laws including the Family Medical Leave Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act. We have also reviewed our Social Networking Policy and will re-distribute it to all employees.

## Financial News & Notes

**Budget:** RCSC ended April 2011 well within operating budget both for the month and year-to-date. Every division has operated within its operating budget year-to-date and overall RCSC is doing well.

**Collections:** In April, RCSC received \$15,036 from 48 property owners in outside collections. Through April a total of \$25,354, or 27%, of the total amount referred to outside collections year to date has been collected. In May, the internal collector processed payments from past due property owners totaling \$29,007 and property related transfer fees totaling \$102,239.

**Property Assessments:** April was a difficult month for assessment collections in Cardholder Services. Payments on past due assessment balances were in line with historical trends but RCSC saw all past due categories increase for the first time since

June 2010. Total increase of past due balances was 5.5% overall. Over 30 day balances saw the largest increase in the past seven months at \$12,486, or 21%. This increase reflects the continued accounts receivable aging impact of the largest billing month of the year as the month of March has now fully aged 30 days.

**Bank Owned Properties:** Property trustee sale notices on properties decreased in April and as of the end of May RCSC has 133 properties in this position. In April, 30 new properties were transferred to lender ownership while 23 were sold by lenders. At the end of the month RCSC reflected 141 properties owned by lenders.

**Property Inquiries & PIF:** Property sales and inquiries have begun to drop off slightly. Preservation and Improvement Fee income still exceeded budget in April by \$49,100, or 11%, and year to date by \$444,637, or 31%.

## Buildings & Infrastructure News & Notes

**Area Supervisor:** Barry Masloff recently joined RCSC as the second South Area Supervisor. Barry will supervise the evening shift, Monday through Friday, at Lakeview, Oakmont, Fairway, Mountain View and all utility work at the golf course pro shops south of Grand Avenue. Barry shares the southern area responsibilities with Michael Carmen who oversees the same locations Monday through Friday during the day.

**Project Manager:** Lester Mast has accepted the role as RCSC Project Manager. Lester has been working for the RCSC as a part-time utility worker at Bell Center since September 2010 but has vast project management skills and experience in his former life. Lester replaces Mel Mead, who resigned his position in April.

**Fairway project:** Phase 2 remains on schedule with work completed as follows:  
 1. Sheet rock and texture has been completed throughout phase 2 of the building.  
 2. Painting is nearing completion throughout the building.  
 3. Wall and floor tile is being installed in the lobby and shower room areas.  
 4. Walking track is being prepared for rubberized flooring next week.  
 5. Cabinetry is installed. Vanity tops, check-in counter tops and plumbing still incomplete.  
 6. Exterior stucco work and painting still underway.  
 7. West facing "Fairway Recreation Center" sign ordered.  
 8. Fitness equipment has been ordered.  
 9. Lawn bowling green has been excavated and is being prepared for concrete forms and artificial turf sub base.  
 10. The pools and spa have been excavated, rough-in plumbing has been installed; reinforcing steel has been set in place. Shot-crete work is still being held up by Maricopa County Planning and Development.

**Mountain View pool restrooms:** After roughly six months, the newly remodeled pool restrooms at Mountain View Recreation Center reopened at the end

of May. RCSC appreciates all cardholders' patience and understanding during this lengthy project and apologizes for delays encountered with this project. Contractors for this project included Trades Unlimited, Custom Cooling and Ken McIntyre Construction. (**Cost - \$218,851**)

**Oakmont:** One heating and air conditioning unit was replaced at the Oakmont fitness center. Contractor was Custom Cooling. (**Cost - \$11,168**)

**Lakeview:** RCSC recently received the permit for the Lakeview spa remodel project. The project will now be sent out for contractor bids before being submitted to the RCSC Bid Commission for approval.

**Bell chiller:** Phase 2 of the chiller project is complete. Contractor for this project was Bel-Air Mechanical. (**Cost - \$217,125**)

**Bell library roof:** Re-roofing of two mansard roofs at the Bell library is complete. Contractor was Trades Unlimited. (**Cost - \$18,409**)

**Bell tennis courts:** Resurfacing work on the four Premier Tennis Courts began this past month. Contractor was Southwest Sport. (**Cost - \$18,855**)

**Sundial pools:** Ultra Violet light equipment has been installed on both pools at Sundial Center. The Ultra Violet Light units will eliminate cryptosporidium in a timely manner, reduce chloramines in the air and reduce the amount of chlorine needed to maintain county health department water chemistry standards for swimming pools. Contractors were Aquatic Builders and Accel Electric. (**Cost - \$75,000**)

**Marinette social hall:** New flooring, mirrors, and cabinets were installed in the social hall. The new flooring will provide a cushioned surface for dance while also meeting the needs of other clubs who share this space. Contractors were Interior Logic and the RCSC Skilled Trades Department. (**Cost - \$37,000**)

## Golf News & Notes

**Golf rounds:** Total golf rounds were down in April compared to last year, but a slightly higher average green fee helped to compensate for the difference. Much of the round difference can be attributed to a rainout April 9. Golf still achieved 97% of targeted revenue. Expense savings helped to offset the revenue shortfall. Tournament play remained strong in April with actual revenues of \$7,100 to a budget of \$4,600.

**Get Golf Ready:** May marked the end of the Get Golf Ready program for the season. Twelve individuals participated in the May classes. The program will begin again in November. It's a great program for anyone who has wanted to take up golf but didn't quite know how to get started. Look for the new schedule of classes in the fall.

**Riverview cart path:** Some concrete was replaced at the golf cart pathway and paver area by the 10th tee box at Riverview. Although this repair was not planned for this year the work needed to be done to address safety concerns. Contractor was National Turf, Inc. (Cost - \$15,000)



**Aerification:** The first round of greens aerification was completed in May. The greens were aerified with ½ inch hollow tines and top dressed to fill the holes. Greens were fertilized with a quick release fertilizer to assist in recovery of the holes. The greens also received an application of calcium to help in flushing of salts. Fairways were aerified in June. Greens will be aerified a second time in August.

**Transition:** On June 13, RCSC applied an herbicide to remove the winter ryegrass at Quail Run, North, Lakes West and Willowcreek golf courses as part of the summer transition process. Killing the ryegrass is the first step in the three-part summer transition process that RCSC started two years ago to improve the courses' fairways. Removing the ryegrass with an herbicide is done to improve the health of the bermudagrass, which needs 100 days of growing weather without competition from ryegrass to improve in health. This is the first year that North completed this process, which will result in thin fairways and the possibility of bare areas on the course. It will look similar to how Riverview appeared last summer. The process can take six to eight weeks until the fairways are filled in and covered with bermudagrass. This transition process focuses on giving the summer bermudagrass more time to grow without competition from the winter overseeding and removal of organic matter that has built up in the fairways. It can take up to five years to complete.

**Willowbrook play:** When Willowcreek closed for its renovation project, Willowbrook was closed in the afternoons with the latest tee time at 11am. This decision was made because of safety concerns related to hauling sand from Willowcreek bunkers to bunkers on Willowbrook and the historical lack of afternoon play on Willowbrook during this time of year. After seeing how things are working with the transfer of sand in the construction project, there are no further safety concerns for cardholders golfing Willowbrook in the afternoon. Golfers may play Willowbrook after 11am based on the following: 1) After 5 Golf Cardholders can now play Willowbrook any time after 3pm 2) All Course No Fee Annual Golf Pass holders may play Willowbrook any time after 11am without checking in with the pro shop 3) All other golfers may play after 11am so long as they check in with the pro shop before it closes.

**Willowcreek project:** RCSC understands and appreciates the curiosity surrounding the project at Willowcreek, but, as a safety precaution, RCSC asks all onlookers to stay on the cart paths while they observe the ongoing project. RCSC thanks golfers for their understanding.

**Riverview Wi-Fi:** Wireless Internet is now available at the Riverview Snack Shop. Cox Communications completed installation of the service earlier than anticipated. RCSC cardholders may now log onto the Internet via wireless devices at Riverview. Wi-Fi hotspots are also available at Lakeview Center, Lakeview Lanes, Fairway Center, Willow Snack Shop and South Snack Shop.
