Bowling News & Notes

Friday Fun Day: So what are you doing this Friday, or for that matter, any Friday around 11:30 am? Come join us at Lakeview Lanes for Friday Fun Day! Friday Fun Day is a great way to get to meet other fun-loving and not-too-serious bowlers. It is colored pins day and scores just aren't important (unless, your score ends in 0 – if it does, you can collect 25 cents. Just come in, sign up and put your name on a lane; there are no teams, just bowlers here for fun and the possibility of winning 25 or 50 cents for a lucky ball. If the number on the free ticket you are given when you register each Friday is called, you will have a chance to win \$5. Everyone cheers for everyone. It is just a fun way to spend a Friday so come on in to Lakeview Lanes and give colored pins a try.

Bowling Income: The Bowling Division has a positive variance of \$12,000 net income when compared to budget and \$7,000 positive variance when compared to the same period last year.

Warning Stickers: Warning stickers have been installed at the foul lines at both bowling centers. The notice will hopefully remind bowlers that the surface is slippery and that the foul line should not be crossed. It is our hope that the notice will help reduce slip and fall injuries by making bowlers more aware of the hazard. In addition, the new lane conditioning machines are programmable to prevent conditioner from being applied to the first 12 inches of the lanes; again, a new procedure to hopefully reduce slips and falls.

Buildings & Infrastructure News & Notes

Solar Project: Solar installations for both thermal (water heating) and photo voltaic (electric) continue to progress. The thermal solar projects are now submitted to Maricopa County Planning and Development Department for permits and the photovoltaic solar is just about ready for permit submittals. Work on these projects will commence once Maricopa County Planning and Development issues the permits. Contractors are Wilson Electric for the photovoltaic solar and Global Renewable Energy and Priceless Plumbing for the thermal solar.

Bell Lanes & Social Hall Roofs: The Bell Lanes and Bell Social hall roofs are being repaired and recoated in preparation for solar panel installations. Contractor is Starkweather Roofing. **(Cost \$244,233)**

Bell Wood & Metal Shops: Preliminary floor plan drawings are completed for the recently approved Bell Wood and Bell Metal shop expansion. The preliminary drawings were used by both clubs to design their shop space including stationary tool layouts, etc. A meeting was held on April 23, 2012 to discuss and confirm these shop layouts so detailed drawings can be completed by the RCSC architect. Once completed, the drawings will be submitted to Maricopa Planning and Development for permit and also sent to construction companies for competitive bids. Once the bids are received the project will be forwarded to the RCSC

bid commission for final approval.

Bell Library Lighting Fixtures: The Bell Library interior light fixtures are receiving either an upgrade or replacement. The can lighting is being converted to LED fixtures using the existing metal can outfitted with a full replacement insert. The fluorescent lighting is being replaced or upgraded to T-8 tubes with electronic ballasts. The new light fixtures will improve the light in all areas and also reduce RCSC's energy costs. This project will commence as soon as materials and equipment is received from the suppliers. Contractor for this project is Wilson Electric. (Cost – \$64,646)

Lakeview Spas: Both Lakeview Spas are closed and being repaired and upgraded to meet current Maricopa County Environmental Services requirements. The work includes the replacement of the interior finish with pebble sheen, installing new water line and step edge tile, replacement of drains, repair of the electrical systems, replacement of the filtration system, installation of an ADA pool lift on the West spa and replacement of the decking surface with an epoxy deck surface. Since my last report it was determined that the underground plumbing systems around both spas has been leaking in several places and must be replaced. This additional work increased the cost of the project. Contractor is Aquatic Builders. (Updated Cost - \$164,000)

Financial News & Notes

Privilege Cards: RCSC's privilege card income has continued to increase by almost \$30,000 more than last year, which is primarily due to the short-term (30-, 60- & 90-day) cards that were instituted on April 29, 2010. Notably this has also produced additional revenue in other divisions, with \$47,000 more in cardholder green fees, \$12,000 more in cart rentals and \$17,000 more in food & beverage sales this year from last.

Collections: Payments made by property owners in outside collections dipped in March to \$8,109 with payments from 25 property owners. During March our internal collector processed payments from past due property owners totaling \$58,819 and property-related transfer fees totaling \$195,195. This past month the collections of past due fees was impacted by the phenomenal increase in the volume of property sales and transfers that occurred during the month. Even with this focus shift, past

due balances increased by just 0.6% at the end of March and offset the gains made in February. At the end of March, outstanding balances related to property transfers decreased and now represent 52% of receivables due and 51% of past due balances.

Trustee Sales: Property trustee sale notices on Sun City properties was relatively unchanged and ended March at 80. The number of bank-owned properties decreased 16% during March with the total now at 83 properties owned by lenders. This change was also a contributing factor to the sales volume this past month.

PIF: The Preservation and Improvement Fees collected in March were the highest ever and finished at an astounding \$838,100, or 105%, over budget. Year to date PIF fees are \$746,800, or 74%, over budget.



Golf News & Notes

Golf Rangers Need You: Rangers volunteered a total of 220.5 hours in April. Course totals: Quail Run: 4.5 | Riverview: 14 | South: 46 | North: 43 | Lakes: 37 | Willow: 10. More Rangers are needed. If you have a few hours a week and want to have fun and provide a great service to Sun City golf, consider volunteering as a Ranger. Golf Revenue: Total revenue for March missed budget by \$20,643 or by 3%. Green Fee/Cart Fee revenue alone missed budget by \$27,421 or by 4%. Merchandise and Driving Range revenue both exceeded budget by \$2,306 and \$1,935 respectfully. Get Golf Ready revenue for the month was \$2,562. We are looking at changing the start time to 7am beginning in March to open up more prime time green fees.

Total revenue for the quarter was \$70,484 ahead of budget (3%) and \$95,129 ahead of prior year (5%). Up to \$48,475 of this increase can be attributed to activity generated by Short Term Privilege Cardholders. Public play declined \$9,400 from previous year; increased play from within Sun City was a contributing

factor to this decline. Driving Range and Merchandise revenue was also up considerably over prior year. It is also important to note that without the lack of rainfall, these revenue gains would be lower.

Aerification: Green Aerification began May 3 Please remember to check the aerification schedule (below) for a complete listing of dates. Aerification is necessary to remove organic matter buildup in the soil profile and to relieve compaction. It is our goal throughout the summer to impact 20%-30% of the putting green surface. The first aerification is performed with a 1/2-inch tine and impacts approximately 10% of the surface. The second aerification uses a larger 5/8-inch tine and impacts approximately 15% of the surface area. The larger tine is used for the second aerification as it occurs during the peak growing season for our Bermuda greens.

Rainfall: The lack of rain year to date continues to affect our golf courses. March rainfall allowed the golf courses to save 49 acre feet of water to budget; however, we are still 54 acre feet of water over budget for the year.

Szentmiklosi, a Sun City resident, serves as Executive Coordinator with RCSC. In this role, she performs numerous duties on behalf of the Board of Directors and the General Manager requiring a strong knowledge of the organization and community management. Such duties include preparing agendas, minutes, reports, correspondence and research for the board and general manager, as well as helping to maintain the organization's corporate records and acting as a liaison to cardholders and visitors on behalf of the Board and management.

"Deanna is the woman behind the scenes who works tirelessly to ensure the board and I function smoothly," said General Manager Jan Ek. • How to evaluate your management systems and efforts

Upon completion of the M-100 course, CMCA candidates must sit for the CMCA Examination, a three-hour, 120-multiplechoice question test. To maintain her CMCA certification, Szentmiklosi will have to continue education and training on an annual basis.






