not had a successful petition in years and you'd think that with 4,000 potential signers that would not be the case? Perhaps if you have ever signed such a petition, you would want to inform her to cease and desist representing you in any way.

Anne Randall Stewart's baseless arguments that the RCSC should operate under the Planned Communities Act under Title 33 of the Arizona Revised Statutes could create some serious consequences for Sun City homeowners and RCSC Members. RCSC Members could no longer cast their vote by proxy and the additional costs of meeting notices alone (the Act requires notices to be "hand-delivered or sent by pre-paid U.S. mail") would add conservatively \$100,000 to RCSC's annual budget. Any increase in RCSC's operating expenses for such requirements would have to be borne by Sun City homeowners who pay their annual property assessments. Anne

Randall Stewart's groundless arguments regarding Title 33 (insofar as they can be understood) cost RCSC members money because she has, at various times, presented these arguments as fact to Arizona legislators. To their credit, the legislators would check out Ms. Stewart's statements. This has required, however, the time of RCSC employees to research, accumulate and present the correct facts to the legislators to show Anne Randall Stewart's arguments are false.

Along this same line, regardless of the facts, Anne Randall Stewart continues to claim that RCSC gets a "common area" property tax exemption which is afforded under the Planned Communities Act, which does not apply to RCSC. The property tax relief afforded the RCSC was acquired in a lawsuit brought in the Superior Court of the State of Arizona, whereby RCSC, the plaintiff, sought relief from Maricopa County, the defendant, in the values

set forth on RCSC's land and improvements. The final judgment and order signed on February 5, 1991 by Judge William T. Moroney, set taxable values on RCSC's land and improvements and provided reimbursement from Maricopa County to RCSC for overpayment of property taxes through 1990. Anne Randall Stewart's continuing ranting regarding this issue could bring unwanted attention to this matter and Sun City homeowners could have some adverse consequences with Maricopa County. Perhaps Ms. Stewart would like to pay for any increased property taxes on the RCSC property?

As created by Del Webb, the corporate documents do not require Member ratification of decisions made by the Board of Directors. The decision-making process is the sole reason Members elect a Board of Directors. The Board of Directors invites and appreciates the input of the Members which is evident in the Board's willingness to change a

previously determined direction as a result of such Member input. Members are given the opportunity to amend the Articles of Incorporation and Corporate Bylaws and Board Policies as well as elect the Board of Directors as set forth in the corporate documents.

Anne Randall Stewart's recurring threat of Board recall is also very costly to Sun Citians as less and less Members are interested in running for the Board as a result. In our retirement, our golden years if you will, who wants to be accused of being a liar, a thief or a cheat who cares nothing about their community or their neighbors? Certainly not I and I would assume not you either. Fellow Sun Citians we must unite for our common purpose as responsible Sun Citians for the health and welfare of our beloved community we call home....Sun City!

members were grandfathered. Therefore, her committee, made up of RCSC Members, asked for this revision and the Board gladly complied.

What planet are you living on Anne Randall Stewart to publish such a statement as; "Instead of obeying the law, the RCSC is paying a lobbyist and establishing a Government Affairs Committee?" First of all, RCSC does obey the law. Secondly, RCSC has had a paid lobbyist for many years and any connection to your statement regarding such is absurd. The lobbyist informs RCSC about bills at the Arizona Legislature that would have an effect on Sun City. Finally, to be paranoid about the development of a Government Affairs Committee is incomprehensible. Surely you must be aware of RCSC's role in fighting the Arizona American Water rate case and bringing the public hearing of the Arizona Corporate Commission to Sun City at the Sundial Recreation Center last year. I would also hope that you are aware of RCSC's participation in the fight against the Charter School in Sun City last year. With these events and the need to stay on top of legislation, the RCSC Board of Directors felt it very important to establish a Government Affairs Committee as it is too much for the Board and staff to take on without some additional help. We have several issues that need the attention of such a committee at this very moment, such as the rate case of Southwest Gas, which includes decoupling. Are you familiar with decoupling Ms. Stewart? Might I suggest you use some of your tenacity and persistence to benefit Sun City?

The Legal Affairs Committee has no connection to the membership quorum process and has not been an active standing committee for over a year, which is why the Board is removing it as a standing committee at this time. A standing committee is established to aid the Board in accomplishing its duties on an ongoing basis. The Legal Affairs Committee would not be asked to convene on anything that was under advisement by RCSC's legal counsel, as the members of the committee were never licensed to practice law in Arizona and most had not practiced law for many, many years in the states from which they originated. Therefore, it certainly would not be advisable for the Board to use the Legal Affairs Committee to provide advice on anything that required a legal opinion.

The previous membership quorum of 100 was less than one-half of a percent (.3%) of the total membership and left RCSC and its Members at risk of being controlled by a small minority. Someone with 100 proxies could have made changes with numerous unintended consequences that could have done a great deal of harm to RCSC and Sun City homeowners. Following the advice of RCSC's legal counsel, the Board eliminated this provision thereby causing the RCSC to be subject to the default provisions of ARS §10-3722 which sets a nonprofit corporation's quorum at, "one-tenth of the votes entitled to be cast" until such time as RCSC could form an Ad Hoc Committee with the Membership at large to come up with a more reasonable number. I was the Chair of this Ad Hoc Committee and we met on several occasions and in the end made a recommendation to the Board who adopted a reasonable and attainable 1,250 membership quorum, which includes proxies. We know that this number is attainable because it was easily reached in person with no proxies at the meetings regarding the water rate case and the charter school.

Quite frankly Ms. Stewart, if I were

property that she does not occupy.

Ms. Stewart is claiming that the purpose of the Long Range Planning Committee's tour of the RCSC recreation centers on Thursday, March 24, 2011, was to determine what recreation center would be closed. I am not sure how she came to this conclusion as she has not attended a meeting of the Long Range Planning Committee, so it is second hand information at best, or what I commonly refer to as just one more thing erroneously produced by the Sun City rumor mill to which she appears to be a significant contributor. Ms. Stewart goes on further to claim that there are plans to close Oakmont, which is an outright deception. There are no long range plans for any recreation center at this time, let alone Oakmont. That is the point; the Long Range Planning Committee is in the process of creating a long range (strategic) plan for the Recreation Centers of Sun City. In order for us to do so, we needed to start by having firsthand knowledge of the facilities and what better way to accomplish this than by taking a tour of them. Has the Long Range Planning Committee asked the question, "Will we be able to sustain all of the recreation facilities we have now in the future?" Absolutely, they would be failing to fulfill their duty if they didn't. Are there members of the committee that feel RCSC has too many facilities to maintain now? Possibly, but remember one or two members of a committee do not create a plan and the committee is not that far into the process to make any such recommendation to the Board at this time. The Board and committee have already committed to taking the plan to the community prior to adopting it. So contrary to Anne Randall Stewart, do not over react, there are a lot of discussions to be had by the committee prior to recommending a long range plan for RCSC and remember Members are welcome to attend the committee meetings. You can find the meeting schedule posted on the website www.sunaz. com under the Board tab. As always, we have nothing to hide.

Anne Randall Stewart's implication that there may be some mismanagement of funds in regards to projects and bids is absurd or that there is anything inappropriate or uncommon happening at RCSC in regards to this process is a fabrication. I am not sure who her "expert" is this time, but obviously there is very little practical knowledge about how the process works. I dealt with projects, bids and contracts for my entire professional career and RCSC follows good sound business practices. Let me describe how the process commonly works and how it works at RCSC: Prior to Board approval of the operating and capital budget, or any unbudgeted project, the management team obtains an estimated cost of the project, which is either based on the cost of previous similar projects or estimates (not bids) received from architects, engineers, potential bidders, etc. Once the Board approves the project a Request for Proposal ("RFP") is prepared based on the scope of work and is submitted to as many potential bidders as possible. Every attempt is made to receive at least three bids. Once the bids are received a bid packet is prepared which includes all submitted bids and management's recommendation. If management for some reason does not recommend the lowest bidder, there is an explanation as to why they are not doing so enclosed in the bid packet, but that rarely happens. The bid packet is signed by the Controller to verify it is within the operating or capital budget approved, or the Board approval of an unbudgeted project. To complete the process before any work can commence, three Board of Directors must sign the bid packet and approve the contractor(s) and project total. Each project is tracked and monitored by

May is transition time

The warmer weather brings the dreaded word "transition." Although the benefits of overseeding bermudagrass with ryegrass are clear, the transition from winter ryegrass to summer bermudagrass can be troublesome. Several maintenance practices have been going on and are in process to make transition happen as quickly as possible. The golf courses have lowered mowing heights to allow sunlight to get to the bermudagrass. Shade from the ryegrass can cause the bermuda to die. Spot watering and application of wetting agents are being applied to areas that have poor irrigation coverage to allow soil moisture to reach the bermudagrass roots. Aerificaiton and vertical mowing are being done to promote lateral growth of the bermudagrass and to "wake" it up from winter. A complete fertilization of the golf courses will be done in May to push the bermdagrass growth while the ryegrass becomes stressed from the warm temperatures.

The process that disrupts play for golfers the most is the removal of winter ryegrass with a herbicide. This herbicide kills the winter ryegrass over several weeks. This is an effective way to ensure that bermudagrass receives 100 days of growth before being overseeded again. RCSC golf courses have adopted the procedure of removing ryegrass with a herbicide on four golf courses per year. This year North, Quail Run, Lakes West and Willowcreek golf courses will remove the ryegrass using an herbicide. This is the third year of a five year process. Research shows that this process takes up to five years to have improved results. Golfers can expect for overseeded areas to be thin after removal of the overseeded areas. The date of removal of winter ryegrass will be set according to soil temperatures toward the end of May or first of June.



Bell Lawn Bowl: A little bowl history

Although early Homo sapiens probably developed various games, lawn bowling only appeared in the 13th Century. While rocks were originally used, even chipped and shaped ones were entirely too random for suitable gamesmanship; soon blocks of wood were being shaped into more uniform, asymmetrical bowls.

Lawn bowling origins seem unclear, but probably originated in the British Isles very early in history. It could be (but probably never was) said "the sun never sets on lawn bowling," for wherever the British went they took lawn bowling with them, and its popularity

grew apace.

In one of history's lighter sidebars, Sir Francis Drake was reputed to have been playing a game of bowls with Sir Walter Raleigh when he received word of the approach of the Spanish Armada. Legend holds he insisted on completing the game before rejoining his fleet to defeat the Spanish.

He also had to wait for flood tide to maneuver his ships out to sea to meet the Spanish, but why clutter a good story with fact? Want to learn the sport of Sir Francis? Just call Amy Heidebrink at Bell LBC (623-583-4432) and ask about free lessons.

Oakmont Lawn Bowl: Bowl history

Lawn bowling didn't arrive on the Mayflower, but wasn't far behind. Towns, schools, parks, even a university, were eventually named or known as Bowling Green.

By the mid 1700s it was popularly established. With the unpleasantness of the latter 1700s the popularity of lawn bowling waned due to its close association with anything British. The War of 1812 did much to assuage Yankee angst, and eventually, lawn bowling was reestablished on this side of the pond. In 1879 a small lawn bowls club was established in New Jersey, and the rest is history. Still, it was a

slow, laborious process transporting such a civilized sport across the rowdy American west. Now there are sanctioned lawn bowling clubs in 22 of the 50 United States. A dozen of those clubs are in Arizona and five of them right here in Sun City, with two more in Sun City Grand and Sun City West.

On February 21, the Lakeview Lawn Bowling Club voted, by approximately 60%, to modify their required wearing of whites (white trousers/skirt & white shirt/blouse) when bowling on Lakeview greens. 
Palo Verde Judged Art Show



the accounting department and the accounting processes are audited by an accredited Certified Public Accounting firm annually.

Contractors will not continue to bid projects for an organization which puts something out to bid before they even know if they are going to complete the project and the Board cannot approve a project for which they have no estimate of costs. For Anne Randall Stewart to imply that there is something wrong because we have an estimated cost for the repair of the Sundial monument is ludicrous. The Board is approving this unbudgeted project based on this estimate. This is similar to when the Board approved the unbudgeted creek project for Willowcreek golf course which was based on the cost of RCSC's last creek project. Anne Randall Stewart having a problem with the actual bids coming in considerably lower is evidence of her lack of comprehension of how it works. Matter a fact, Anne Randall Stewart's admittance that she interfered in this process with Pacific Aguascape is an example why RCSC's policy is to protect contractor's confidentiality and competitive bidding process. Anne Randall Stewart asked RCSC to submit a RFP to Pacific Aquascape for this project, which RCSC did and they replied that they were not interested in bidding the project. However, that was not sufficient for Ms. Stewart and her group evidently, because Tom Beckwith attended a Board/Member Exchange meeting where he proudly announced that they had obtained a bid from them, obviously Ms. Stewart and her group decided to take matters into their own hands. RCSC was most definitely not grateful for this interference because it causes problems with vendors and contractors when Members take matters into their own hands as would be evident to any business minded individual.
