Board of Directors considers bylaw amendments

The RCSC Board of Directors recently revealed that they have been considering bylaw amendments. "During my election it was no secret that I wanted to address the concerns Sun City residents had been expressing regarding the 'two card' issue," stated Cord Angier who started his three year term on the Board

in January 2011. After months of obtaining data, discussing unintended consequences and researching benefits and drawbacks, the RCSC Board is prepared to release changes being considered to RCSC Bylaws.

In all considerations following, please note that up to two cards would be pro-

vided as a part of the annual property assessment regardless of the assessment basis

Underage Owners: Currently, RCSC has 2,244 owners (5%) under the age of 55 years old. Of those 320 are Members through the spousal exemption, of which 63% are currently 51 years or older.

It appears that the spousal exemption was adopted as a result of the Maricopa County Senior Citizen Overlay Zoning Ordinance which became effective June 1984. The ordinance does not allow an underage owner to continue to occupy the property if the qualifying owner should no longer reside there unless the

Redistricting could divide Sun City

In November 2000, Arizona voters passed Proposition 106, an initiative that amended the Arizona Constitution by removing the power to draw congressional and state legislative districts from the state legislature and reassigning this task to the newly created Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC). Redistricting is the redrawing of legislative and congressional district lines following the decennial U.S. Census. The lines are redrawn so that districts are of very nearly equal population as required by the Arizona and United States Constitutions. As a result of Prop 106, the Arizona Constitution mandates that redistricting begin with a grid map. This is to ensure that each IRC starts from scratch, therefore, not con-

sidering previous district boundaries. In the initial grid map, Sun City has been divided, putting north of Grand Avenue in one district and south of Grand Avenue in another. In drafting the new district maps, commissioners must modify the grid maps to account for the following criteria:

- Equal population;
- Compactness and contiguousness;
- Compliance with the U.S. Constitution and the Voting Rights Act;
- Respect for communities of interest;
- Incorporation of visible geographic features, including city, town and county boundaries, as well as undivided census tracts; and

107th Ave. Median: We are happy to report that after working directly with Maricopa County officials, the median crossing on 107th Avenue at the North course has been repaired and others are to follow.

Light Poles: With Maricopa County's assistance, we have been able to make the appropriate contact at APS to get all the light poles on 107th Avenue close to Oakmont and the North course working again after several months of being out.

ZIP Code: The Sun City Visitors Center, RCSC, and Representative Rick Gray have been working with USPS and City of Peoria officials to resolve the 85373 zip code issue, whereby homes located in Peoria have been given this zip code as well and therefore have a Sun City address.

Human Resources News & Notes

Safety: The Management Team at RCSC takes safety very seriously, not only for our cardholders, but for our employees as well. Employees are expected to follow all safety procedures and policies. Serious disciplinary action is taken with personnel and/or supervisors who fail to follow and enforce all safety practices.



underage owner is a spouse. While it is impossible for RCSC to determine exactly how many underage owners would qualify, (400 max) the RCSC Board of Directors is proposing that if any underage owner, regardless of marital status, meets the qualifications as currently outlined in the bylaws to obtain the spousal exemption, such underage owner shall be considered a Member with voting privileges and use of the facilities provided that two Member cards have not already been issued for that property.

Spouses Who Are Not Deeded Owners nor Trustors, Grantors, or Settlors of the trust who own the property, however, meet every other qualifier (occupancy and age) may be entitled to a RCSC card, free of charge, provided that the annual assessment is on a per property basis, the other card issued on the property is to their spouse, and they can provide a license as documentation of their marriage.

Lifetime Use is granted through a trust document generally to spouses who are not beneficiaries of the trust. This is done so that a spouse can be guaranteed they will have a place to live for their lifetime despite the fact that the property will become owned by the beneficiaries of the trust when the Trustor/Grantor/Settlor passes. The Board's intention is to provide the same benefit as described above in "Spouses Who Are Not Deeded Owners," however, this benefit will extend past the death of the spouse who was the Grantor/Trustor/Settlor of the trust until such time the lifetime

• Creation of competitive districts where there is no significant detriment to other goals.

Currently, all of Sun City is within District 9 and it should remain such as that meets the criteria to respect communities of interest. The commissioners of the IRC should be made aware of how important it is that our retirement community, Sun City, remain in the same district and not divided!

Secondly, based on the initial grid, Rep. Debbie Lesko would no longer live in our legislative district. As you know, Debbie has been a real friend to Sun City and is involved regularly and year-round. Debbie doesn't just come around when an election is coming up, she's always here for us and understands Sun City. Loosing Debbie's representation would be a significant loss to Sun City.

Please contact the IRC and make the following recommendations for district #9 boundaries:

- 51st Avenue on the east because it is a good boundary line that separates Glendale and Phoenix and also maintains the Peoria school district;
- Aqua Fria River on the west because it is a natural boundary line between District 9 and District 4;
- Beardsley Road on the north because that is the boundary line for the Sun City community, which should remain all in one district and would include Westbrook, also a retirement community of similar interest who use the same shopping amenities and is currently in legislative district #4 which needs to reduce its

population; and

• Northern Avenue on the south because this includes all of the Sun City community to the south which is important that Sun City not be divided in order to respect communities of interest and Sun City and south Peoria should be kept together because Sun City resident primarily go to Peoria for additional shopping and entertainment.

Additionally, please send another email to the IRC, as this is also extremely important to Sun City. Prop 106, which the people of Arizona passed to have a non-partisan commission draw the lines, is being rewritten by the current commissioners. The attempt is to prioritize "competitiveness" as the most important requirement. Currently the demand to make the creation of competitive districts a priority has a four to one lead over the demand for the other criteria. This would be very detrimental to Sun City, as it would take precedence over the requirement to have respect for communities of interest, which supports Sun City not being divided. If the commissioners do not hear from you, they will believe that "competitiveness" is the most important to you too. New Owners - PIF

Accounts Receivable: Accounts Receivable – Assessments are \$225,000 greater as of June 30 than one year ago. Bank owned properties make up \$150,000 of this variance, with Preservation & Improvement Fees (PIF) unpaid by owners other than banks being another \$55,000 of this variance and lien and collection fees making up the balance of the variance at \$20,000.

PIF: Preservation & Improvement Fund (PIF) restricted income is \$726,580 more than the conservative budget used annually to assure that PIF projects such as Fairway are not scheduled prior to being able to reasonably know that they can be paid for in cash. In the first six months of 2011, we have collected \$238,080 more than the same period last year. As of August, we have received \$614,850 in PIF fees from lenders in 2011. Please note that PIF is not recorded as income in our financial statements until it is paid in full.

Collections: During the past two months \$36,345 was collected form 84 owners in outside collections. This has increased over prior months this year. During this same time period our internal collector processed payments from past due property owners totaling \$58,762 and property related transfer fees totaling \$261,275.

Past Due: Past due balances decreased in June and July by 1% overall. We had above average payments on past due balances during the last two months but saw the oldest aging group of Over 90 day balances increase considerably during this summer. As of June 30 the increase in outstanding receivables from 2010 can be most notably attributed to properties transferred to lender ownership as these properties attributed to 53% in the increase from last year. Overall PIF and Transfer related fees for all property owners accounted for 62% of the increase over this same time period while past due related fees accounted for 24% of the increase.

Golf News & Notes

Golf Rangers Need You: Rangers volunteered a total of 76.5 hours in June. Course totals: Quail Run: 0 | Riverview: 2.5 | South: 26 | North: 9 | Lakes: 39 | Willow: 0. More Rangers are needed. If you have a few hours a week and want to have fun while providing a great service to Sun City golf, consider volunteering as a Ranger. Training is provided, hours are flexible, and Rangers receive \$1 per hour for the use of their own golf cart plus one large bucket of balls for every 10 hours volunteered. For more information contact Carey Shore (623-972-1675) or Don Barber (623-876-8082) or attend a meeting: 3pm the last Thursday of each month at Talisman Hall.

Patriot Golf Day: RCSC pro shops collected \$716 during Labor Day weekend as part of the Patriot Golf Day, the primary fundraiser for the Folds of Honor Foundation. It is an annual event to raise money for post-secondary educational scholarships for children and spouses of military service men and women killed or disabled while serving.

Golf Revenue: Total revenue was up 6% in June and July compared to the same period last year. All revenue categories had increases; merchandise sales led the way with a 60% increase over June and July 2010.

Willowcreek Project: Sprigs and sod are in the process of growing in, despite having difficulties with the pump to our well. We are fortunate to have had

an adequate backup plan for obtaining water. All pump repairs have been completed and the pumps are back online. During the renovation it was determined that the Variable Frequency Drive was in need of replacement. The drive controls the variance pumps attached the irrigation system and monitors pressure in the system. Replacement of this system was completed.

Heavy Rough: Through overseeding heavy rough can be expected at all courses. Our standard rough mowing frequency is 1.5 times per week. With higher humidity this time of year, growth will be heavy

Equipment Audit: RCSC is in the process of auditing our equipment that is used by National Golf Maintenance for the upkeep of our golf courses. This audit is being conducted in accordance with our agreement with NGM and ensures that our equipment is properly cared for. The audit is expected to be completed in early September.

Rainfall and Lake Levels: The lake levels have also been affected by the lack of rainfall, which is down 6 inches from last year. Through July we have only recorded 2.5 inches of rain. In order to maintain the health of our golf courses we have had to rely heavily on our well water. The well on 103rd avenue is running constantly to maintain lake levels which will not rise at this time of year without rainfall.

Daily Fitness: Fitness Over 60

By incorporating strength training, aerobic exercise and stretching into her weekly schedule, Karla can avoid the physiological pitfalls of aging: loss of muscle mass, weight gain, decreased strength and stamina, poor balance, coordination & flexibility, and diminished bone mineral density."

Buildings & Infrastructure News & Notes

Fairway: Construction on Fairway Phase 2 continues, and much has been completed in the past few weeks to move us closer to completion and opening of the eagerly awaited second phase of Fairway Center. The following has been completed this month:

- **1.** Installation of walking pool and spa sail structure poles.
- **2.** Pouring of the concrete decking around the pool. Application of the final cool deck topping and paint is currently in process.
- **3.** Installation of water line tile in the pool and spa.
- **4.** Final installation of lighting around the pool and
- **5.** Partial installation of the chlorine and acid systems for the pool and spa.
- **6.** Completion of the steel fencing and gates on the north side of the pool area. (Still requires painting)
- **7.** Striping of the parking lot and the installation of tire blocks. Tire blocks will also be added around lawn bowling green.

In September, we also saw the final lacing and painting

of the cool decking around the pool and spa. Once this finished, the pool and spa received final interior finishing, floor drains, hand rails, lifts and ladders. When this work is completed the pool and spa will be filled with water and chemically treated and balanced prior to the 1st request for final inspection by Maricopa County Environmental Health Department. After the health department is satisfied and gives final approval, the entire Phase 2 building must pass a final inspection by the Maricopa County Planning and Development Department, before the county will issue a certificate of occupancy.

We know all of Sun City has been eagerly awaiting the second phase of Fairway to open. Based on the progress of these final pieces to the project and no delays in getting final sign-off by both Maricopa County agencies, we anticipate an early October opening for Fairway Phase 2.

Lakeview Center: Exterior painting of all remaining Lakeview Center buildings was completed in September. The work included painting all exterior areas of Lakeview Center, Lakeview Lanes and the Mini Golf building.

In addition, the fabric on the shade canopies around the pool will be replaced. Contractors will be Quality Painting and Arizona Bag and Shade. (Cost - \$48,937)

Bell Parking Lot: The south side of the Bell parking lot will receive repairs and a rubberized asphalt overlay very soon. Since more motorcycles and scooters are parking at the center, two more parking spaces have been designated for these vehicles. Contractor for this project will be Pinnacle Paving. **(Cost - \$237,000)**

Project Manager: Bob Teske was hired, as the new RCSC Project Manager, on July 25, 2011 to oversee the Skilled Trades department and the successful completion of repair and maintenance work orders and projects. Bob replaces Mel Mead who resigned his position April 29, 2011.

Snack Shop Misters: New mister systems have been installed at all (5) RCSC snack shop patios. Contractor is DB Mist Systems. **(Cost - \$15,000)**




Bell Woodworking Club

use clause has expired.

Tenants, renters, lessees, occupants of property in Sun City (non-owners) have the option to purchase annual or 30, 60 or 90 day privilege cards. The Board has no intention of changing this policy and here is some information that may help you understand why

The RCSC Board of Directors has a fiduciary obligation to maintain RCSC assets. Annual assessments are set by the Board at a rate that ensures those fiduciary obligations can be met. To cover the privilege card income budgeted for 2011 (\$465,449), **it would** require an increase in assessments of \$10 annually for those on a per person basis and \$20 annually for those on a per property basis.

Non-owners have no personal investment if they are not required to pay for the privilege to use RCSC facilities, which is believed to bring more value, care and consideration to that privilege. In view of RCSC's recreational, social and fitness facilities available, the annual cost of a privilege card is very reasonable, one-half of the annual property assessment per person.

All owners benefit from higher property values as a result of the recreational facilities, golf courses and other amenities provided by RCSC, therefore, an owner receives value regardless if cards are issued as a result of the annual property assessment. In addition, any investor who has purchased property in Sun City for occupancy by someone other than themselves has done so understanding that the overall cost is very fair and equitable as the combination of Sun City property taxes and RCSC annual assessments is considerably lower than other surrounding area's property taxes alone.

"Although I was only elected to a one year term," confirmed Carole Martinez, "it is very important to me that we address these issues and get resolution to them before my term has ended, although I hope to be re-elected there is no guarantee." The Board has directed GM Jan Ek to begin writing amendments to the bylaws to adopt these new guidelines.
