Delays with Fairway Phase 2

Up until this past spring, Phase 2 of the Fairway project was on schedule and on target to open by the end of July. But, despite past assurances to the contrary, Maricopa County Planning and Development Office requested that we obtain an additional permit for construction of the pools and spa at Fairway. When we initially filed our construction plans for Fairway Phase 2, the planning and development office directed our architect to leave out all engineering information pertaining to the pools and spa since that information would be needed for a separate permit issued by Maricopa County Environmental Services.

After the Fairway Phase 2 project was well under way, Maricopa County Planning and Development required RCSC to submit for another structural and electrical permit for the pools and spa. This process required hours of additional work for our engineer and architect and several rounds of responding to comments with county planning and development officials. All in all, this process took from April 13 to July 8 before the additional permit was completed and ready for pick up by RCSC personnel. During this time, the pools and spa sat idle, ready to be shotcreted. Since the issuance of the permit, RCSC's general contractor has been working diligently to get sub-contractors back to work on the pools, decking and sails structures. To date, the pools are now shotcreted and footings for the spa/walking pool sail structures are being installed.

While RCSC is pleased that the pools and spa construction is again under way, there is still more pool and spa work to complete before RCSC receives its Certificate of Occupancy and can open the Fairway Phase 2 facility. As soon as we have new work schedules from the pool and sail structure sub-contractors, RCSC will provide a new estimated opening date. RCSC extends a special thank you to all RCSC cardholders for their continued patience and understanding during this highly anticipated and large-scale project.


Cool off at Dive-In Movie

Buildings & Infrastructure News & Notes Sundial monument details

The Sundial monument repair project has garnered much attention and, unfortunately, this attention has resulted in some misinformation related to the project cost and repair process. RCSC hopes to clear up all confusion by providing our cardholders and the Sun City community with this detailed account of what the process has been to repair the beloved monument.

Earlier this year, RCSC hired a licensed structural engineer who found significant deterioration on the monument's three T-steel support legs. Upon further inspection, it was determined that the deterioration occurred because the concrete steel leg footings did not extend above grade thereby leaving the steel legs unprotected against water generated by rainfall and the irrigation system used to water the landscaping around the monument support legs. Because the monument was a safety concern, RCSC hired a company to shore up the monument and fence it off while permits and contractor repair quotes were obtained.

RCSC secured three bids for the project and chose K.L. McIntyre Construction, who had the lowest bid and has done good work for RCSC on past projects. RCSC then submitted all appropriate documents and site plans to Maricopa County for the appropriate building permit. As part of the repair process, portions of the monument also had to be tested for asbestos before work could begin.

The actual repair process required excavation around the three legs and a thorough repair by sandblasting the rusted / deteriorated metal clean, followed by having a certified welder weld steel plate material over the damaged areas. This procedure required several inspections before and after the welding process by an Arizona certified structural engineer and the Maricopa County building inspector. After welding was completed, the three legs were layered with a special coating to prevent any future rust or deterioration. Next, each leg was encapsulated in a rebar-reinforced concrete footing which now extends above grade. Finally, the construction crew encapsulated the monument legs with reinforced wire and a stucco application.

In addition to repairing the legs, RCSC replaced some cracked and broken Roman Numeral markers, replaced the entire concrete decking around the monument, removed the irrigation system at the base of the monument, replaced the lighting, painted the monument and installed new decorative rock.

The total cost for the Sundial monument project was \$41,310.02. As we have explained above, the entire project cost reflects permits, consultants, fencing and shoring, other needed repairs in addition to the actual repair of the monument's support legs. Now that work has been completed Sun City has a totally refurbished monument which is not only safe but will also provide many years of enjoyment to all who visit the Sundial Recreation Center.

Please stay on Willowcreek cart path: RCSC reminds curious golfers and Sun City residents that it is imperative to keep their golf carts on the cart path if they wish to observe the progress at Willowcreek to avoide damage similar to what occurred several weeks ago. The picture shows damage to the fairways where a cart completely destroyed the new sprigs that that were planted



Willowcreek is scheduled to reopen after overseeding in October. Since the project is still ongoing, what you see today is not indicative of what the course will look like when completed. Large amounts of water are necessary to ensure the bermuda grass takes hold in places that were sprigged (tee boxes) and recovers in areas that were used for sod (fairways). We want residents to have the opportunity to observe the progress but we need your cooperation in keeping the renovation on track and your carts on the cart path.

Daily Fitness: At the 'core' of fitness

Jan Powell made a commitment to exercise over a year ago. Her Body Mass Index placed her in the obese category, and she was diagnosed as a pre-diabetic. Jan looked to Daily Fitness for help and began working with personal trainer Jane Fortier.

"One of the most commonly observed changes that contributes to diabetes is a decline in muscle mass that starts around age 40," Jane explained. "Less muscle raises the risk for diabetes because muscle is the receptor site for most of the body's blood sugar (glucose). Muscle burns or stores glucose. Strength training is a form of exercise that increases muscle tissue, therefore increasing the body's glucose storage capacity and metabolic rate. As we age, we not only lose muscle but gain fat, especially the deep visceral fat that is linked to diabetes. Recovery from exercise is fueled primarily by fat, so the more strength training and aerobic exercise a person does, the more fat is burned 24 hrs a day."

Jan Powell has used strength training and aerobic exercise to change her body composition to more lean body weight and less stored body fat. Making



a lifetime commitment to exercise and healthy eating has gotten her blood glucose and lipid levels under control, and brought her Body Mass Index number down to the normal category.

RCSC partners with APS Peak Solutions

With seemingly constant increases in utility rates, the RCSC Management Team is always looking for ways to save on energy costs and cut down on energy usage. With these goals in mind, RCSC recently partnered with APS in their energy-saving program called APS Peak Solutions. The free program requires participants to voluntarily reduce electrical demand in response to grid emergencies or high energy prices. During demand response events, customers agree to reduce certain non-essential energy loads in exchange for financial compensation. To RCSC, this means reducing use of our air-conditioning systems, increasing temperature in all rooms included in the program, then receiving a check from APS based on the amount of kilowatt hours we saved during the year.

As part of the program, APS installed free programmable thermostats in the rooms designated as part of Peak Solutions. These thermostats allow APS to remotely raise the temperatures during extremely high demand days that APS calls demand response events. APS says these events usually occur no more than two times a year. When they do, the electricity company provides Peak Solutions participants with a two-hour advance notice.

In July, RCSC had an opportunity to experience a demand response event when we were part of a test conducted by APS for the Peak Solutions program. The test required a decrease in electricity use and a corresponding increase in room temperature at RCSC facilities for a four-hour window in the late afternoon. When RCSC received the notice on the day of the test, personnel communicated with staff at the affected facilities, who then informed any clubs or cardholders who were meeting at those facilities. An email was also sent via the RCSC Email List to inform cardholders who may have been on their way to any of the affected facilities. This is the same process RCSC will follow for all future demand response events.

Because we have a variety of facilities and energy uses and needs, not all RCSC facilities are part of the Peak Solutions program. Those facilities not included, and thus not





Board Policy No. 3 must be followed and a form for corporate information completed and provided to the Board Office. The Board or RCSC staff will ask for submission of the form if required. Board Policies and required forms are available on the RCSC website at www.sunaz.com.

The Board may not always respond to a Member's comments at a Board/Member Exchange or Board Meeting simply because the Member may have expressed an opinion which does not require a response. The Board may not always agree with opinions expressed by Members just as Members may not always agree with the Board's opinions or decisions, but the Board encourages a positive and polite exchange of information at all times.

If any Member contacts the Board Office and does not receive a response, please follow up with the Board office. There are times when messages will be left asking for a call but no name or number is provided in the message. There have also been occasions where letters were sent from the Board, never returned to RCSC as undeliverable, but also not delivered to the Member. Unless communication is returned to RCSC for some reason, we have to assume our response was received. Members should feel free to contact the Board Office anytime you are expecting a response and have not received one, so follow-up can be done.

Finally, there is a misconception that suggestions provided to the Board are not considered. This is not true and all ideas are considered. There are not too many issues, however, on which all Members will agree. We are a community of people from all over the United States, from all different backgrounds, and have Members of varying ages so a difference of opinion on any idea should be expected. The Board has to consider all Member input and make our decisions based on what is in the best interest of RCSC and the majority of its Members.
