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### **Bowling News & Notes**

Sun City Open: The 24th annual Sun City Open Bowling Tournament was held at Lakeview Lanes and Bell Lanes. Bowlers came from all over the state plus one team from California. The tournament was very successful; it produced approximately \$4,000 over a period of two weekends.

Lakeview Liquor License: On May 5, 2012, the liquor license was transferred from Mojoe's Café to Lakeview Lanes. Lakeview Lanes will offer the same products as Bell Lanes and the pricing will be the same. Liquor sales and expenses were not budgeted for Lakeview Lanes. Although there were some initial unbudgeted expenses, we feel income from liquor sales will more than offset those expenses and produce an overall positive effect. As of April 30, 2012, the bowling division had a net positive variance of \$23,000 when compared to budget with these unbudgeted expenses.

### **Buildings & Infrastructure News & Notes**

Solar Project: Solar projects, which include thermal (Water heating) and PV (Electricity producing), are still going through the plan review and plan correction process with Maricopa County Planning and Development Department. Solar contractors include Wilson Electric for the photovoltaic solar and Global Renewable Energy and Priceless Plumbing for thermal solar.

**Fairway Sign:** The West facing sign for the Fairway building is now in place and functioning as designed. Contractor was Apollo Sign Company. (Cost - \$4,074)

Irrigation Systems: Planning and prepermit work is underway for the replacement of the irrigation systems and turf at the Sunbowl ballpark and park area south of the ballfield. Upcoming work will include complete replacement of the irrigation systems, re-grading of the ballpark and park area, planting new grass and installing decomposed granite material alongside the foul lines of the ballpark. Once the civil engineering, irrigation design and architectural work is completed the project will be submitted to Maricopa County Planning and Development for permit and sent out for construction bids. After bids are received the entire project will be submitted to the RCSC bid commission for final approval. Current planning/permit service providers include: CCBG Architectural, Marvin Mills Irrigation Consulting and Broderick Engineering.

Lakeview Lanes Roof: The Lakeview Lanes roof is being repaired and recoated in preparation for solar panel installations. Contractor is Roofing Consultants of Arizona. (Cost - \$60,800)

Lakeview Social Halls: As soon as materials arrive, new vinyl flooring will be installed in the Lakeview social halls. The new vinyl flooring replaces the existing tile which is delaminating from the substructure and requires extensive maintenance to keep it looking good. The new floor will correct the delaminating problem and greatly reduce maintenance costs. Contractor is Puckett's Flooring. (Cost - \$38,086)

Bell Lawn Bowling Irrigation: Planning and pre-permit work is underway for repairs to the Bell Lawn Bowling irrigation system and lawn bowl greens. Once preliminary work is completed the project will be submitted to Maricopa County Planning and Development for permit and sent out for construction bids. After bids are received the entire project will be submitted to the RCSC bid commission for approval.

Marinette Pool Deck: Spot repairs to the pool decking at Marinette Center were completed in late May. Contractor is Desert Rose. (Estimated Cost - \$10,284)

### **Financial News & Notes**

**April 2012:** RCSC has ended April 2012 well within its operating and capital budget. Let me remind you that when you are looking at accounts receivable – assessments balance this year compared to last, you must also include the pre-billed assessments under liabilities as a part of your calculations, as we now book all billed accounts receivable, although it is for the future.

**Budgeted Expenses:** For those of you who really delve into the financial statements, it is important for you to understand that we have approximately \$600,000 in budgeted expenses which have not been completed year-to-date, therefore, our positive variance from budget is overstated as these expenses will be completed in the future. Also remember that we have just completed our two largest billing months, so

our cash and investments always grows at this time of year to accommodate expenses forthcoming in the future.

**Trustee Sales:** Property trustee sale notices on Sun City properties was increased by 10% in April and ended the month at 88. The number of bank-owned properties decreased slightly down to 81 properties owned by lenders.

**PIF:** The Preservation and Improvement Fees collected in April continued the volume trend in March; finishing the month just under the March high at \$830,475. Year-to-date PIF fees are \$1,142,875, or 79%, over budget.

### **Golf News & Notes**

**Golf Rangers Need You:** Rangers volunteered a total of 220.5 hours in May. Course totals: Quail Run: 6.5 | Riverview: 13 | South: 57.5 | North: 4 | Lakes: 16 | Willow: 11. More Rangers are needed. If you have a few hours a week and want to have fun and provide a great service to Sun City golf, consider volunteering as a Ranger. **Revenue:** Revenue for April was slightly ahead of year, with total revenue finishing just over \$2700 ahead or 1%. Green Fee/Cart Fee revenue was slightly behind, falling \$1466 short of prior year. As with previous months merchandise and driving range revenue were ahead of last year. Merchandise revenue exceeded prior year by just over \$5,000 and Driving Range revenue exceeded prior year by just over \$2,500. Total revenue for the month missed budget by \$3,992. Year to date revenue is \$66,000 ahead of budget and nearly \$98,000 ahead of prior year. Public play YTD is \$15,000 behind prior year; however this deficit has been offset by big gains in cardholder and guest play. Utility cost for the year is nearly \$19,000 (after accounting adjustment) more than last year; the bulk of this increase is due to increased well water pumping.

**Agronomist Visit:** On May 8 we had our yearly visit by an USGA agronomist. Brian Whitlark visited Willowcreek/Willowbrook, Riverview, Lakes West/Lakes East and Quail Run as well as held a meeting with the RCSC Board of Directors. His overall impression of our courses remains positive and his full report will be posted on the RCSC website when available.

**Snack Shops:** Snack shop revenue for April finished \$2,120 ahead of budget. Snack

# **BELL: Sec. of State speaks July 4**

Francis Scott Key (Bob Brown) and Uncle Sam will share the Pledge of Allegiance in a most interesting and educational way!

Francis Scott Key will introduce the keynote speaker, Ken Bennett, Arizona's Secre-

tary of State. Statewide office is the newest chapter in a record of public service that spans 25 years for Ken, who was appointed by Gov. Jan Brewer to fill the remainder of her term as Secretary of State. He was elected to a four-year term in 2010.

Mr. Bennett's career in public service began in 1985 with his election to the Prescott City Council. In 1998, he was elected to represent legislative District 1 where he served four terms in the Arizona Senate, the final four as president before being term-limited from office.

Leaving the legislature, Bennett re-entered the private sector to work with companies in the development of alternative energy sources and energy-efficient building technologies. Bennett has served as CEO of Bennett Oil Company and continues on its board of directors as well as the board of the Cancer Treatment Centers of America.

An Arizona native, Eagle Scout and ASU graduate, Bennett was born in Tucson, raised in Prescott, and currently resides in Phoenix with his wife, Jeanne. They have three grown children: Ryan, Dana and Cliff.

Sun City has a replica of the Liberty Bell. The Ringing of the Bell ceremony led by Uncle Sam will conclude the activities at 10am. Everyone attending will have the opportunity to proclaim the principles of liberty as stated in the Declaration of Independence by ringing the bell. Light refreshments will follow the event.

Shops year to date are nearly \$19,000 ahead of budget and prior year. Snack Shops have begun closing at 3pm on a regular basis and beginning in June will close at 1pm. Adjustments to the schedule may be made depending on business.

**Greens Aerification:** The first round of green aerification is complete using a ½ inch hollow tine followed by a fertilizer application. The fertilizer application consists of 1 pound of nitrogen and potassium, .14 pounds of phosphorous. An application of calcium was also used to flush salts from the root zone.

**Herbicide:** Four RCSC golf courses (Riverview, South, Lakes East and Willowbrook) will chemically remove the winter rye grass using a herbicide. Golfers should expect to see the overseeded areas turn brown and die during this time. Overseeded areas will be thin and some areas may be void of turf. Although this process is inconvenient for golfers it is showing a reduction in the time it takes to go through transition. We estimate that time spent in transition was reduced by 8 days in 2011.

**Fairway Aerification:** Fairway aerification begins June 4 at Willowcreek. Each course will be closed during the aerification process. Please check the RCSC website for the full listing of course closures.

**Rainfall:** The lack of rain in 2012 continues to have an adverse affect on our courses. The light rainfall in April allowed us to save 22 acre feet in water to budget. Year to date the golf courses are over our water budget 31 acre feet or 10 million gallons of water

# Behind the red, white & blue: Mike Lindquist plays Uncle Sam

Most call him Mike. On July 4, he'll go by Sam.

This month, Sun City resident Mike Lindquist will don a red, white and blue suit and top hat to help celebrate America's birthday as part of the annual Ring That Bell ceremony at Bell Recreation Center.

When first asked to take up the role of Uncle Sam, however, Lindquist didn't want to.

"I thought that was a bad idea," Lindquist said.

But, two years ago, when he heard fellow Sun Citian and former Uncle Sam, Ray Mills, share how important Uncle Sam was, Lindquist's interest was piqued. He told Mills he'd think about it over a summer trip.

When he returned, Lindquist said he had decided to decline.

"But when I left (Mills' house) I said yes," Lindquist said. "He is a very convincing quy."

For at least the past two decades, Uncle Sam has been a red, white and blue staple of the Ring That Bell ceremony, which takes place each July 4th at Bell Recreation Center.

Lindquist has portrayed Uncle Sam for the past two years, following an impressive 18-year run by Mills, who had been looking for someone to take up the mantle for a while before he convinced Lindquist to do so.

"I'm glad I did it," Lindquist said.

In his role as Uncle Sam, Lindquist participates in numerous community events throughout the Phoenix area in addition to Sun City's annual Ring That Bell.

For example, Lindquist donned the red, white and blue to participate in the city of El Mirage's 50th anniversary celebration last year, and he speaks in front of school children throughout the Valley speaking on themes such as the U.S. Constitution.

"The greatest thrill of the whole thing is with these kids," he said, "to educate them on patriotic things they may not have known. There are always tons of questions and their attention is sky high."

This month will be Lindquist's second Ring That Bell event at Bell Recreation Center as Uncle Sam. In addition to his duties as Sam, Lindquist also served as the chair of the whole event, coordinating and planning the whole program.

During his first Ring That Bell last year, Lindquist was amazed by the positive response from residents.

"Never in a million years would I have anticipated the excitement of residents ringing that bell," he said. "The whole thing went on for a good 45, 50 minutes. It blew me away."

Though, when in full garb, Lindquist goes by Uncle Sam, he claims he's merely "nephew."

"I told Ray (Mills), I'm Nephew Sam. There' sonly one Uncle Sam and that's you," Lindquist said. "The greatest compliment someone could give me in this role is if in 18 years someone says, 'You were as good as Ray Mills.""

# Board candidate packets available July 2

RCSC Board candidate packets will be available at the Board Office beginning Monday, July 2. Three 3-year terms will be open for the December 11 election.

The following are the minimum requirements to run for a position on the Board of Directors:

- Must be at least fifty-five (55) years of age;
- Must be a Deeded Real Estate Owner of property in Sun City, Maricopa County, Arizona as well as a resident of Sun City for a minimum of two (2) years prior to December 1, 2012;
- Must be a Member in good standing;
- Must reside in Sun City, Arizona and be available at least ten (10) months of the year;
