


It's no Millennium Falcon!

Car pooling process

If you need a ride or can give a ride, please send an email to: **suncitybirders@gmail.com** and indicate whether you need a ride or you can give a ride to one or more. A member of the Carpool Committee will get back to you and let you know if we can accommodate your request. As soon as an "open seat" becomes available, they will notify you with the name of the driver you will be riding with and where the carpoolers will meet. Generally, this will be at the Bell Center. "Open seats" will be filled first come, first served. If a seat is not available, you will be notified prior to the day of the trip. If a person that requests a ride is able to be matched with a driver, it is expected that the person requesting the ride helps the driver to help cover their gas expenses.

Suggested gas expense assistance for short trips: The Glendale Recharge Ponds \$5 (all rides up to 50 RT miles \$5 minimum).

On top: The tiny **Verdin.** Barely larger than a Hummingbird. This Likely immature male would have small rufous patches on his head & wing and stronger yellow color on his head If he was an adult. Only seen in 5 western states and Mexico, they love small one flower Hummingbird feeders. **Below:** We saw two species of Gnatcatcher on this trip. This **Black-tailed** was observed at the Visitor Center where we were treated to quite a few of them. The **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher** was seen at the Wildlife Ponds and eluded all efforts to be photographed.

eBird Rare Bird Alerts You may not be aware that eBird has a daily

rare bird alert service driven by eBirder listings. This is a free service and If you are a birder that loves finding a "life bird", one new to your life list, this will help you to find them. Life lists are not for everyone and there is no requirement to keep a list of species you have seen, but some of us enjoy the chase. Below is an example of an eBird Alert that shows an early migrater that is rare by it's early arrival. I have attached an example below with an entry generated by our Gilbert Riparian Preserve eBird listing. The fist part below is a list of rare birds generated by an eBird listing determined from the previous days birding lists. Note Black-and-white Warbler listed. After that they list a description of each rare bird's details such as It's name, date, time it was reported, and who submitted the observation. On the third line it has map/location information so you can drop everything and go find the bird. Finally checklist link and comments are listed.

Tom Worcester was determined to get photos of the dozens of swallows flying frantically above us. They rapidly changed direction to consume insects employing long evolved evasive maneuvers. His photos yielded ID-able diagnostics achieved thanks to Tom's persistence. Not pictured here were the much more numerous **Northern Rough-winged Swallows**.

Clockwise from top left & right:

Violet-green Swallow - Very white below, vivid green on top with white saddle bags on rump.

Cliff Swallow - Cream colored rectangle on the forehead and rufous over tail coverts,

Tree Swallow - similar to the Violet green but without the rump white saddle bags.

Middle left: We only saw Anna's Hummingbirds but additional species are coming like the Black-chinned Hummer.
Middle right: There were plenty of Yellow-rumped Warblers. We also saw Lucy's, Wilson's, and Yellow Warblers.
Lower left: and right: Mr. & Mrs. Vermillion Flycatcher. Good news, more here now than in the previous 2 years.



Upcoming April 2025 field trip

Rio Vista Community Park

When: Monday April 7th at 6:30 am Leader - Tom Locascio

We can expect to see 25 or more species. Shorebirds, Raptors, Green and Blue Herons, 99 Great-tailed Grackles guaranteed, and the usual Riparian and Desert species. Ducks and Cormorants are a constant, and a Roadrunner pair are a welcome site. Great spot for photography.

Meet at: The open area just South of the Bridge (X on map below)

Cost: No cost

Difficulty: A 1 1/2 or less mile walk on flat ground

Carpooling: No carpooling available on local trips at this time.

I saw 30 species including a Peregrine Falcon on my last visit here. Migration is slowly proceeding. I'm hoping the two **Greater Yellowlegs** that usually show in the catchment basin south of the pedestrian bridge Will be present and take the **Wilson's Snipe** with them. As usual, on the back page, there are links to the previous months field trips on listed on eBird.

This is the best "close" birding venue to us and one of the two best birding hot spots in Maricopa County with 299 species. You will observe waterfowl & shorebirds like Stilts and Avocets, as well as desert residents and migrants. In addition Gulls, Terns, Geese, Eagles, and Falcons may be seen. A large variety of ducks are present. Last month we saw 40 species. Check last page details.

The water levels and feeding opportunities change daily and the species present reflect that.

Meet at: On the SE corner of basin #6.

Difficulty: A two or less mile walk on flat land.

Hassayampa River Preserve

When: Wednesday April 23rd at 7:30 am Leader - Tom Locascio

The third best birding spots in Maricopa county with 290 species. Rare to Maricopa County birds are likely to show up here as it presents a unique habitat that seems to emulate a higher elevation and is a Riparian area. Passerines like the White-breasted Nuthatch and genus brother Brown Creeper may show as well as the flocks of Westen Bluebirds and Cedar Waxwings. Hutton's Vireo, Ruby-crowned Kinglets and Northern Red-shafted Flickers are here. There will be of course Coots, our favorite Pied-billed Grebe, and the possibility of a Heron or Egret of sorts lurking in the reeds. As usual, we will bird the **rewarding** road between parking lots until the gate opens

Meet at: Hassayampa Visitor Center Parking Lot or by the feeders in front.

I will send you directions for highway or (streets) if you request them when you sign up.

Cost: \$5 per car entry fee. Your Maricopa Regional Parks pass works here!
