### **The Falcon's Roost**

#### Hi Birders,

September has arrived and hopefully have left the overnight lows of 90 degrees behind. There number of field trips will increase as the days grow shorter. A wider range of field trips will be available in October through April featuring the October Tres Rios inner sanctum trip on October 11th. Other September trips past the 18th are TBD at this time but may include the Gilbert Riparian area and some of the local community parks. A reminder at least one week before a trip will be announce via email.

#### Feeder watch:

The Black-headed Grosbeak Male and Females are still with me on August 4th and a new situation is quite interesting. A bunny of generous proportions was enjoying shade when I noticed that there was a Ash-throated Flycatcher in close proximity. He seemed to like being close to the bunny even though it nosed him away. The Flycatcher would shortly return and seemed to admonish the bunny. The bunny dug a deep hole in the soft dirt to the extent only part of his ears were showing. An hour later they are still together face to face! The Grosbeaks and flycatcher have moved on leaving my remaining feeder participants noticeable in their molt process.

# I'm Molting.....Molting!



European starlings (Sturnus vulgaris) molt once a year, usually in June or July, but they don't shed their feathers like many other birds. Instead, they grow new feathers in the fall with white tips that give them a spotted appearance. By spring, the tips wear away, leaving the feathers dark and iridescent brown. This process is called "wear molt" by scientists

Above is a link to an interesting article showing some of your favorites in the molt process. The Eclipse phase of ducks and geese is covered here as well. The question of "where have all the male mallards gone?" can be found as well.

While Starlings do not shed their feathers, most other birds do. This is a phase in our bird's life that may go unnoticed. Molting affects flight and could increase predation. One tends to see less birds on a bird walk. My usual feeder birds all show signs of molting. One of my favorite sightings was a Great-tailed Grackle without his great tail feathers. Even while traveling with the last clutch of offspring, Gamble's Quails are already in the molt process some times sporting a bare neck. White-Wing Doves are greatly diminished. Northern Mocking birds lose their white wing patches. Have a gander before the spectacle comes to a close.

### **Car pooling process**

If you need a ride or can give a ride, please send an email to: suncitybirders@gmail.com and indicate whether you need a ride or you can give a ride to one or more. A member of the Carpool Committee will get back to you and let you know if we can accommodate your request. As soon as an "open seat" becomes available, they will notify you with the name of the driver you will be riding with and where the carpoolers will meet. Generally, this will be at the Bell Center. "Open seats" will be filled first come, first served. If a seat is not available, you will be notified prior to the day of the trip. If a person that requests a ride is able to be matched with a driver, it is expected that the person requesting the ride helps the driver to help cover their gas expenses.

#### Suggested gas expense assistance for short trips:

The Glendale Recharge Ponds \$5 (all rides up to 50 miles \$5 minimum). Longer trips such as Gilbert Water Ranch \$10, (51-100 miles) Really long trips such as Boyce Thompson Arboretum could be \$15 or more.

# **Paloma Community Park**

#### When: Friday September 6th at 6:30 am Leader Tom Locascio

Bordering on the Peoria Preserve Open Area, there is a surprising representation of waterfowl and desert birds with close up viewing possible. I've seen some interesting birds here such as Pyrrhuloxia, Sage Thrasher, Rock Wren, Horned Lark, American Pipit, Black-headed Grosbeaks, I expect to see 25 or more species. Sorry, ducks not here yet except for Mutant Mallards.

**Meet at:** Between the parking lot and man made lake

Cost: no cost

**Difficulty:** A two or less mile walk on flat ground, with 50% walking on dirt trails that are a bit rocky. Wear sturdy footwear.

**Carpooling:** No carpooling available on local trips at this time.

#### **Directions:**

Go North on 99th Ave

Left on Lake Pleasant Pkwy.

After passing West Wing there is a sign saying the park is 1/2 mile ahead. Take a right turn into the park entrance. Follow the entrance road until you see the lake on the right. Park and meet your comrades on the South edge of the lake. Cows and/or Donkeys may show.

# Hassayampa Regional Park

The third best birding spot in Maricopa county with 293 species observed. We may see Red-shouldered, Cooper's, Gray, and perhaps Black Hawks. As for Warblers, we may see Yellowrump, Black-throated Gray, Lucy's, and Orange-crowned Warblers. Hermit Thrushes, Dark-eyed Juncos, Cardinals, Hummingbirds, Waxwings, Vireos, & If we are lucky, instead of just hearing them, perhaps we may actually see a Yellow-breasted Chat. Bridled Titmouse, White-breasted Nuthatch, Brown Creeper, Orioles, and Grosbeaks may be on the menu.

#### **Meet at:** Hassayampa Visitor Center Parking Lot or by the feeders in front.

I will send you directions for highway or (streets) if you request them when you sign up.
